Union Official Is Indicted On Extortion Count

SPOKANE, Idaho—A former Pasco, Wash. union official was free on \$2,500 bond Saturday after a federal grand jury indicted him on charges of extorting \$1,000 from a construction company.

The secret indictment Friday was made public after Woodrow W. Cape was taken into custody. He is a former business agent for Pasco Local 398 of the Steamfitters and Plumbers union.

William B. Bantz, U.S. attorney here, said the indictment charges Cape extorted the money from the A. J. Curtis Construction Co. during natural gas pipeline operations in the Tri-City area in 1956.

He said the indictment accuses Cape of extorting the money in exchange for a promise of labor peace and noninterference on the pipeline laying job.

A second count of the lengthy indictment, Bantz said, charges Cape with attempted extortion of an automobile from the company.

The district attorney said the indictment claims Cape was paid the money by A. J. Curtis and Ben Niles.

Cape and the Pasco local's executive board engaged in controversy last year over his attempts to seek reelection to his union job.

The grand jury, after a three-day session, also indicted four men for the \$16,846 armed robbery of the North Richland branch of the Seattle-First National Bank on Jan. 17.

Hagerty Claims President's Gun Wasn't Loaded

THOMASVILLE, Ga. (AP)—James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, said Saturday President Eisenhower's shotgun wasn't loaded when he held the muzzle in the direction of his face.

Newsmen questioned Hagerty about the matter in connection with an episode which occurred Friday when the President was about to go quail shooting with his vacation host, former secretary of the treasury George M. Humphrey.

Photographers got pictures showing Eisenhower sitting in a hunting surrey with his 20-gauge double-barreled shotgun between his knees, muzzle pointed upward into his face.

Some of the photographs showed the gun was not open at the breach, a safety measure hunters are urged to take when their guns are not in use.

Gun experts here and elsewhere who saw the pictures regarded Eisenhower's handling of the gun as rather careless. They noted he spent 40 years in the Army and was thoroughly schooled on how to handle firearms properly.

Told at a news conference Saturday that some hunters apparently feel Eisenhower violated the basic rules of gun handling, Hagerty alluded to Friday's episode and said:

"I saw some (newspaper) stories on that. The gun was not loaded. The President was asked to hold the gun up by the photographers and he did."

500 Pounds Or More Army's Satellites Goal
WINTER PARK, Fla. (AP)—The Army plans to work progressively up to satellites of 500 pounds or more, says Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, head of the Army ballistic missiles agency.

The commander of the Army's development center at Huntsville, Ala., said Sunday night that another satellite launching attempt will be made by the Army "not earlier than tomorrow or later than the 1st of April."

The Army placed the first U.S. satellite in orbit from Cape Canaveral, Fla., on Jan. 31, using a Jupiter-C rocket as the launching vehicle.

He said the next satellite will be similar to the Explorer but with advanced instrumentation.

Canadian - U.S. Teams Stage Rocket Tests
FT. CHURCHILL, Man. (AP)—Canadian - American teams fired two rockets into the ionosphere early today in International Geophysical Year tests.

An Aerobee rocket sponsored by the Naval Research Laboratory of Washington, D.C., soared up 128 miles. Thirty-five minutes later a Nike-Cajon solid fuel rocket sponsored by the U. S. Air Force Cambridge research center and the University of Michigan rose 91 miles.

The tests, described as successful, gathered data on atmospheric pressure, temperatures, air density and winds at high altitudes.

Churchill Shows New Progress Over Illness
ROQUEBRUNE CAP MARTIN, France (AP)—Sir Winston Churchill was sufficiently recovered today from pneumonia and pleurisy to receive his first visitor since being put to bed last Tuesday.

The daily medical bulletin said the 83-year-old former Prime Minister's pneumonia "continues to resolve." Sir Winston's general condition is satisfactory, and the pleurisy is causing him less discomfort. It was the fourth consecutive day on which the doctors had issued an optimistic medical bulletin.

Nixon Claims U. S. Stronger Than Russia In Two Respects

WASHINGTON (AP)—Vice President Nixon said Monday that in the world struggle between freedom and slavery, "food may well prove to be a more decisive weapon than satellites."

Nixon made the comment in a brief breakfast speech before the National Food Conference, where he substituted for President Eisenhower.

Nixon said the United States is militarily stronger than the Soviet Union and is way ahead in industrial production.

"We have in our power," he said, "the ability to wage a winning war against poverty and hunger throughout the world."

He said the U.S. economy is free and sound and "much too strong to be talked into a depression by any group of politicians."

The conference brought together some 800 representatives of food industries, agricultural groups and other interested citizens for the promotion of nutrition and good diet habits in America.

worthy projects and a time of slack employment is the time to push them.

He said that to his mind, this is "only horse sense, so let's do that."

He sported at the idea of "going around with our tin cup" and looking at the ground thinking of troubles.

"Confidence is what this country needs," the President said.

Truman's Saturday night broadside against the "economic misrule" he said had produced a Republican recession was assailed by Eisenhower's GOP senators as disservice to efforts to slow the business downturn and to lift employment.

Sen. Wiley (R-Wis.) said that this is not a period when "men who have not been in high places can afford to ignore their responsibilities."

Citing income and employment statistics, Wiley said the country is not going to the dogs.

"But if the people are going to continue to be told that everything is haywire they are going to get in a mental condition where they will stop spending and then anything could happen," he said.

"What Harry Truman is doing is creating fear of the worst kind."

Sen. Francis Case (R-SD) agreed in a separate interview, while nearly a score of other Republicans issued weekend statements criticizing various parts of Truman's speech at a \$100-a-plate dinner.

The statements used such words as irresponsible, cynical, untrue, demagogic and reckless.

Approval For Truman
But Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont.) said he agrees with Truman's statements that the country is "tired of being bamboozled by the Republicans" and is likely to give the Democrats sweeping victories in this year's congressional races and in the 1960 presidential contest.

"The big issue in this year's campaign is spuds and not Sputniks," Mansfield said in an interview. "If the people don't have the spuds, there won't be any more Sputniks as far as we are concerned."

Truman said that the results of five years of Republican White House rule could be added up in five million or more unemployed, millions more working part time, increasing bankruptcies, neglected school programs, overcrowded colleges and hospitals and high wages in need of rebuilding.

Stevenson Joins Attack
Adlai E. Stevenson, who spoke to one section of the double-header dinner, said that five years of Republican rule had been "stained by heavy failure in many areas—the excesses of McCarthyism, the disintegration of our alliances, the loss of confidence in us abroad, the decay in our military position and now the decline in our economic vitality."

Truman implied that if the Democrats were returned to power, the country could be assured of prosperity.

Case said that if Truman really wants to see the country's economy bolstered "he has shown a poor way of doing it."

"If there is a seasonal recession now, Harry seems to be doing his best to turn it into a psychological depression to support the cries of the Democratic National Committee that the country is going to pot," Case said.

Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.) said in a separate interview that while Truman was in the White House "the Democrats didn't solve any of the same problems they are complaining about now."

Socialist deputies in Parliament denounced the bishop's action as a violation of the Lateran concordat of 1929 establishing relations between the Vatican and the Italian government.

In his letter to Judge Paganelli, the bishop said his condemnation of the couple was within his rights as a bishop.

"The Italian constitution gives me full right to do so by proclaiming the independence and sovereignty between the church and the Italian state," he added.

If convicted, the bishop could get up to two years imprisonment or be fined 100,000 lire (\$200). The priest could get up to three years if found guilty of making the letter public.

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Model U. N. Votes Against Hungarian Delegates Ouster

EUGENE (AP)—Defeat of a move to oust the Hungarian delegation from the United Nations was one of the opening actions Friday at a model United Nations meeting on the University of Oregon campus.

Some 415 delegates from high schools throughout Oregon were on hand as committee and Security Council meetings preceded the opening plenary session of the General Assembly scheduled for Friday afternoon in McArthur Court. The sessions will continue through Saturday.

Delegates from 41 high schools are representing nations in the model United Nations meeting.

The attempt to boot the Hungarian delegation from the model UN came in the Political and Security Committee when the Netherlands, represented by Jefferson

High School of Portland, said Hungarian delegates should not be allowed until Hungary becomes a free country.

Six Abstain
The move was defeated by a 38 to 1 vote, with six abstentions.

The Cyprus issue arose in another committee when Greece, represented by Sherwood High School, urged a plebiscite to give the people of Cyprus self-determination in choosing their form of government. The resolution was defeated.

The bulk of the resolutions introduced Friday morning concerned the Middle East.

One resolution introduced by Great Britain (Klamath Falls) would force Syria and Egypt to have only one UN delegation because of their merger two weeks ago in the United Arab Republic.

The United States delegation (Cleveland High School, Portland) urged that Egypt be forced to make payments to the Suez Canal Company for loss of the Suez Canal. But Egypt (Beaverton) had a counter-resolution saying that Egypt should retain control of the canal because it was built with Egyptian labor.

One of the strongest resolutions was introduced by the delegation from Israel (South Eugene High) which wants to freeze all Egyptian foreign assets, quit all loans and grants, and stop all technical assistance.

In the complaint, filed last summer, Reece alleged malpractice on the part of Halladay. The complaint alleged Halladay, whose offices are in the Pacific Building in Roseburg, was negligent in the setting of a broken left arm.

The suit was dismissed with prejudice and without costs to either party.

Three Beach Walkers Feared Swept To Death
ANCHORAGE, Alaska—A high tide which rose around them as they walked along a beach on Middleton Island, 150 miles south of Cordova, in the Gulf of Alaska, drowned three and possibly four airmen Sunday.

The airmen, whose identity has not been released by the Air Force, were stationed at a radar station on the island.

Three bodies were recovered. The fourth man is missing.

Details of the terrain were not known here but it appeared the airmen were trapped at the foot of a cliff as the water swirled in around them.
