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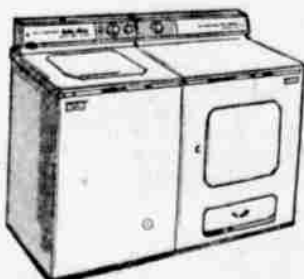

Sparkman Proposes Plan To 'Untaint' GOP Fund

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.) said today the only way the Republicans can "untaint" \$100,000 raised at a controversial Texas GOP dinner "is to get it out of political channels entirely."

"They had better give it to some educational fund," Sparkman said in an interview.

He was commenting on an announcement by the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee Friday that it had been informed it will not be offered any part of the money raised at the dinner in Houston on Feb. 19.

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Holmes Criticizes The Policies Of Administration

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Robert D. Holmes Saturday criticized the policies of the Eisenhower administration in dealing with the recession and unemployment.

"The wait-and-see-it-gets-better policy... is, I think, highly dangerous and offers very little to the man who is now without his weekly paycheck," Holmes said.

Gov. Holmes made the statement after receiving a reply from President Eisenhower to a telegram which Holmes and a number of other governors sent him, urging a speedup in federal works projects.

The President's telegram to Holmes said, in part: "I believe that the underlying growth factors in the economy remain vigorous and every indication is that they will reassert themselves later. Our history shows that economic recovery and growth is not a matter of Washington stop-gap panaceas. It is as necessary to avoid doing the wrong things as to do the right one."

TRAGIC TABULATION—Accidental deaths last year, paced by highway slaughter, totaled some 200 more than in 1956, reports the National Safety Council. But because of population increase the rate was down to an all-time low of 55.8 per 100,000. Nevertheless, one out of every 18 persons in the U.S. suffered a disabling injury in 1957. The estimated economic loss from accidents, both fatal and non-fatal, was put at almost 12 billion dollars.

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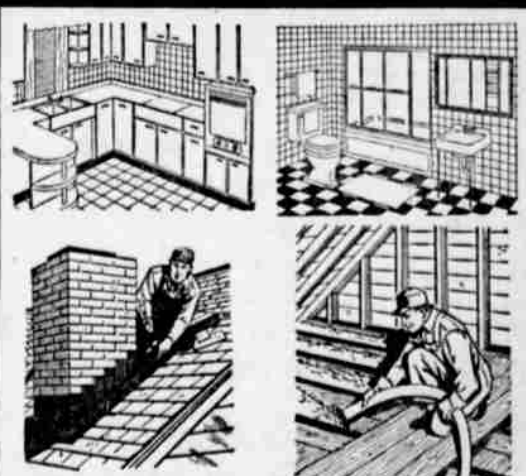
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
