Logging Conference Slated For This Week In Eugene

Subjects ranging from the highly technical one of log measurement to the vexing problems of watershed management and public relations will receive a full-scale review at the end of this week in Eugene.

The occasion is the 20th annual Willamette Valley Logging Conference at the Lane County Fairgrounds.

The conference, expected to draw between 400 and 500 loggers, foresters and millmen, will begin Thursday and last through Saturday. The final day of the session will be devoted to displays of the newest in logging and milling equipment.

L. L. Lowell, Myrtle Creek, conference president, will open the three-day meeting at 9:30 a.m. Thursday with a report on conference activities during the past year. The safety record of the Oregon Timber Transport Operators will be reviewed, following Lowell's report, by Jack Curtis, OTTO's safety engineer.

Panel Discussions

The remainder of the first day and all of Friday will be devoted to panel discussions. The morning topic will be utilization and integration, and will be moderated by W. L. West, head of the Forest Products Department of the School of Forestry at Oregon State College.

In the afternoon, Ike Gervais of Gervais Lumber Co., Riddle, will lead a discussion on methods of measurements of government timber sales.

A full day has been scheduled for discussion of various aspects of watershed management Friday. Men in several different fields of interest will speak their viewpoints on watershed protection in the morning. H. R. Glascock Jr., conference treasurer and consultant to the Industrial Forestry Assn., Eugene, will moderate the panel.

In the afternoon, Art Smyth, Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., North Bend, will moderate a panel on the logger and watershed protection.

president of the Oregon Wildlife Federation, who will speak from the sportmen's viewpoint in the Friday morning watershed panel.

Winners of forest news prizes will be announced at 1:30 p.m. Thursday.

PORTLAND (AP) — The state chairman of the Wallace for Governor said Monday Rep. Porter (D-Ore.) hadn't gone back far enough when he said he had backed Gov. Robert D. Holmes since 1933.

"If you go back to 1948 you can back Bob Holmes as a Republican," Porter said.

Army, Navy Ready To Launch New Test Missiles

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Both the Army and Navy's satellite rockets are being readied for firing in the next two weeks.

Complications are delaying the Navy's effort, Vanguard, an informed source said last night. It isn't likely that Vanguard will be fired until late next week.

Vanguard's troubles include a liquid propellant shortage, minor electrical difficulties and revision of some of the rocket's valves, pipes and fuel tanks.

An Army Jupiter-C rocket, which successfully launched the first U.S. satellite Jan. 31, will make another satellite launching attempt, probably next week.

It had been set to follow the Navy Vanguard attempt but Vanguard now has to wait repairs and the supply of one of the fuels needed by its three-stage rocket.

Informants said the needed propellant is being shipped by truck from a Northern state.

The Vanguard is now in the flight test stage. Two earlier Vanguard launches attempts failed. The Army Jupiter-C, besides launching the Explorer, is a veteran test rocket.

can," Bill Toomey, Wallace's chairman, wired Porter.

This was in reply to Porter's announcement in Washington Saturday that he was backing Holmes for re-election. Wallace will oppose Holmes in the Democratic primary.

Porter said he had been asked by Toomey whether he would remain neutral in the fight. Porter replied that "among the candidates for the gubernatorial nomination there is no question in my mind about my preference. I prefer Bob Holmes." He added that his backing of Holmes extended to 1933.

It was this last remark which prompted Toomey's reply that if

he had gone back to 1948 he could have backed him as a Republican. Holmes originally was registered in that party.
