Patronage Refunds Are Distributed To Egg Producers

Patronage refunds totalling \$322,618 are currently being distributed to the farmer members of the Oregon Egg Producers, it was announced today by S. Van Zee, Roseburg branch manager.
 The dollar volume of business in excess of \$9,500,000 was shown in final audit figures for the 1957 operation of the farmer-owned marketing and purchasing association. Egg receipts increased by 12 percent and were the highest since 1945.
 The patronage refund being returned to local producers represents a refund of 8 1/2 percent in the feed department and a 4 percent on all farm supply purchases. The association closed the 1957 business year with assets exceeding \$3,375,000 and no mortgage indebtedness.
 The dollar volume of business in excess of \$9,500,000 was shown in final audit figures for the 1957 operation of the farmer-owned marketing and purchasing association. Egg receipts increased by 12 percent and were the highest since 1945.

Second Highest
 Although feed and supply volume declined slightly from the record high reached in 1956, sales for both departments in 1957 represented the second highest volume attained in the association's history.
 On Jan. 1, the association continued its policy of redeeming its capital certificates in five years by recalling the 1953 issue at the face value of \$583,810. In addition, \$125,444 was paid out to members as 1956 interest on outstanding certificates.

Altogether, according to Van Zee, the Oregon Egg Producers is currently distributing a total of \$1,231,872 to Western Oregon farmers. He pointed out that with 1957 agricultural markets again at depressed levels, these payments represent a welcome boost to local farm income.
 The egg producers pay taxes on the same basis as all business enterprises. Members pay income tax on all patronage refunds received. J. Clifford Hess, Route 2, Roseburg, is the local representative on the Oregon Egg Producers' Board of Directors and has held the position on the 13-man board since 1949.

Music And Science Entertains Kiwanis Members Tuesday

Music and science were on the agenda of the Roseburg Kiwanis Clubs weekly luncheon Tuesday in the Hotel Umpqua Gold Room.
 The club heard several musical presentations from two members of the "South Pacific" cast at Douglas High School and listened to a short discussion on the status of scholastic science from Ernest Spafford. He is conducting a seminar at Roseburg High School as part of a national movement to further science in the high schools of the nation.
 Spafford, representing the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies, told of the efforts of the National Science Foundation and U. S. Atomic Energy Commission to promote education of students in science. He said that there is an effort toward revised school standards towards scientific thinking.
 He said that American education "needs more science teachers and scientifically trained people." But, he added, it would be impossible to live with people of scientific minds alone.

To Interest Seniors
 Pertaining to the so-called American lag in scientific achievement, he did criticize the some 5 percent of American high school seniors who have neglected science. He said that the program he and

10 other scientists have now undertaken in high schools throughout the nation is directed toward interesting these seniors in the science program.
 As illustrations of the peaceable achievements of science, the speaker pointed to the examples whereby the British now have a nuclear-powered vehicle, and intrigued the membership with the fact that science has proved that nuclear energy can be produced from a gallon of seawater after removing the heavy hydrogen from it.

Ellis Vance and Ruby Ann Vance, leading characters in the Douglas High production of "South Pacific," to be staged at the school this weekend appeared before the club along with the school music instructor and the local play's producer, Mrs. Irene McLaughlin. Actually the entire cast was to have appeared, but road conditions

around the high school Tuesday morning prevented mass transportation.
 Miss Vance sang the "Cockeyed Optimist." Ellis Vance performed "Some Enchanted Evening" and the two joined to sing "Twin Soliloquies."

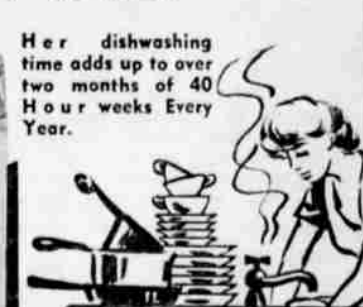
