Willie Pastrano Gets Rough Test

LONDON — A big, bruising mauler with a proud British fighting name came out of nowhere Tuesday night to give one of America's top heavyweights the scare of his life. Brian London, hard swinging son of a former British champion, hustled the immaculate Willie Pastrano around the ring for a good part of their 10-round heavyweight contest. And though the elegant stylist from Miami Beach was awarded a points decision, a majority of ringside observers thought the verdict should have gone the other way. Even in defeat, London — virtually unknown outside these shores — gained a lot in stature. Although only fourth ranked in this country, he put up the best showing in a decade by a British fighter against a top class American. Pastrano admitted later: "It's very lucky that I did not take London lightly for he is a crash and bang fighter who keeps coming at you." London, 32, was never overawed by the third ranked contender for Floyd Patterson's world crown. He piled on the pace from the start, rushing at Willy Willie and swinging with everything he had. From ringside came shouted advice from his father, former British heavyweight champion Jack London. London finished so strongly the Associated Press scorecard had him ahead on six rounds to Pastrano's four — but British referee Bill Williams thought otherwise. For all his weight advantage of 17 pounds at 204½ to 187½, London could not land a rock-a-bye punch. London told newsmen later: "I thought I won. I believe I did better than Pastrano. But why worry? There are more fights to come and among them, I want to meet Pastrano in a return." British promoter Jack Solomons called it "the most wonderful heavyweight fight I have ever seen" and also said he thought London won.

Pumice Block Section In Gill Coliseum Falls

CORVALLIS — A 60-foot section of a pumice block partitioning wall inside Gill Coliseum, on the Oregon State College campus here, collapsed under Monday night's mile-a-minute winds. Oregon Frosh Scoring Led By Denny Strickland

EUGENE — Denny Strickland of Bremerton, Wash., is the new top scorer on the University of Oregon Frosh basketball team. Strickland Monday night scored 22 points against Grays Harbor Junior College to run his total to 167 for the season. His Monday night total enables him to surpass Burch Kimpton of Klamath Falls, who has scored 154 points for the Frosh. Strickland has played 14 games and Kimpton, who suffered a foot injury, has appeared in 13.

Three Lead Archery Group In Its Shoot

Walt Cody, Irv Klein and Betty Miller led Douglas Yeomen archers in their regular shoot last week. Cody scored 558 in the men's instinctive, and was followed by Floyd Ward with 550. In men's freestyle, Klein's 653 topped Les Miller's 538, Jack Ulrich's 488 and Ralph Turner's 444. Miss Miller, at 508, was followed by Ruth Turner at 387 and Ida Ulrich at 457 in the women's freestyle. Eddie Arcaro and Sammy Boulmetis are the only American jockeys who have won the Laurel international race which has six runnings.

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Elk Trap Hunt Fails In Coos

An attempt to trap 18 elk for transport to the Umpqua National Forest went awry last week in Coos County when seven of the animals broke out of a rope-mesh enclosure. The Oregon Game Commission attempted the trap. Ron Shay, commission public relations officer, said the elk had been harassing residents along the Millicoma River near Allegany, about 20 miles from Coos Bay. The seven elk were successfully corralled within the rope-mesh enclosure, but the big animals went berserk, broke a quarter-inch steel cable fastened to the bottom of the 10-foot corral posts which held the webbing to the ground, then fought their way to freedom under the net through the small hole created. The band of elk has taken up permanent residence in a two-mile stretch of pasture along the valley floor. The adjacent hillsides are cutover lands growing up in brush and second-growth fir. Quite tame, the elk graze and bed down in the fields within a stone's throw of dwellings. Housewives often are startled to find several peering into kitchen or living room windows. On several occasions, housewives and children have been forced to retreat hastily when threatened by the marauding animals. Dogs are attacked on sight. Residents of the area are reluctant to have the animals killed, preferring to have them removed from the area alive if possible. Shay said trapping attempts will continue until successful or until the animals refuse to enter the trap. The commission had planned to truck the elk into the Umpqua National Forest and release them in the Quartz Mountain area last week.

Elliott's best time is 3:58.7.

New Argentine Head Pondering Peronist Claims

BUENOS AIRES — The big problem facing Argentine President-elect Arturo Frondizi is what to do with the Peronists taking credit for his landslide victory. Frondizi told a news conference he was elected this week "by the Argentine people" and recognized no special political help. But clandestine weekly newspapers appearing after the results were known claimed his election was a triumph for backers of ousted dictator Juan D. Peron.

World War II Flier To Start Japan Church

TOKYO — A Texas missionary who strayed Japanese forces from a P-38 in World War II has started building a church in Tokyo. The Rev. William Jackson Jr. of Abilene will preside at ground-breaking ceremonies for the first English-speaking church in Japan, a Southern Baptist church. The 33-year-old missionary flew in the Philippines with the 49th Fighter Group during the war and served in the fighter escort when Gen. Douglas MacArthur landed to take over as supreme commander in Japan in 1945.

Shootings Recall Days Of Old West

OAK CREEK, Colo. — A pool hall shooting reminiscent of the Wild West killed three men here this week, wounded a fourth and left officers puzzled over the motive. Sheriff Ab Ritter said Frank Gabossi, 63, bricklayer and father of 10 children, shot three friends at the pool hall, returned home and killed himself while talking on the telephone with his wife. "He was laughing when he called his wife," Ritter said. "She said he told her 'Listen to this.' That was the last she heard. She didn't hear the shot that killed him."

Khrushchev Seeking To Up Private Farmland To Boost Meat, Dairy Production

WARSAW — Nikita Khrushchev is reported unofficially to be seeking to increase private farmland in the Soviet Union to boost meat and dairy production. This would be a reversal of communist doctrine and a partial return to rural capitalism. It would reflect a lesson taught by Polish Communist Party leader Wladyslaw Gomulka, whose great success since he won control of the Polish party in 1956 has been the upsurge in food production which has accompanied the cutting back of state and collective farms. The Central Committee of the Soviet Communist Party will soon hold an important meeting to debate Khrushchev's proposal to eliminate tractor stations in Russia and distribute their equipment among collective farms, the Polish Communist Party organ Trybuna Ludu reported Monday. But the Soviet party boss wants to go even further, unofficial reports say. He would trim down the size of collectives—the basic units of communism in the countryside—and turn the collectives into state-run grain farms. The land pared from them would increase the private plots of farm workers who would concentrate on meat and dairy production. Khrushchev apparently wants to take that radical step in an effort to fulfill his pledge to the Russian people of more and better food by outstripping per capita U.S. production of meat, butter and eggs by 1960. The Soviet communists turned back to private farming in the early 1920s to increase agricultural production. Once the private farms, known as kulaks, had served their purpose, Stalin wiped them out ruthlessly after 1930.

440,900 Persons Work In Non-Farm Jobs In Oregon

SALEM — The state Unemployment Compensation Commission estimated Tuesday that 440,900 persons were working in non-farm jobs in Oregon in mid-January. That compared with 464,200 in mid-December, and 455,400 in mid-January of 1957. Loggers and sawmill operators employed only 40,900 workers in the middle of last month, a drop of 4,100 from mid-December, and 18,800 fewer than last summer. Employment in retail trade was 73,600, down 5,000 from a year earlier. Other industries showing declines from a year earlier were construction, food processing, transportation and shipbuilding. The commission received 44,500 claims for unemployment compensation last week, a decline of about 5,000 from the January peak. But payments continued to total 1.5 million dollars a week. The unemployment trust fund is expected to fall to 32 millions by the end of this week. By the end of March, it will shrink to 29 millions. When the fund falls below 31.5 millions at the end of a quarter, a flat payroll tax on all employers amounting to 2.7 per cent of payroll is assessed. The present payroll tax varies from 5 of 1 per cent to 2.7 per cent.

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
