Boeing Scheduled For Big Contract

WASHINGTON — Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) was quoted by the Seattle Times Wednesday as saying it is virtually certain that Boeing Airplane Co. will be given a 440 million dollar contract by the Air Force for an additional wing of B-52G bombers.

He said the Boeing plant at Renton would construct an additional 33 KC135 tankers at a cost of 118 million dollars. Jackson made the statement after attending a meeting of the Senate Armed Services Committee attended by Defense Secretary McElroy.

He said the contracts would result in nine tankers a month being produced at Renton through 1960 with assurance that "a substantial amount of new work will be awarded the Seattle and Renton plants in the immediate future."

Fired Attache Named Ambassador For Rebels

LONDON — Anon P. Makaita, fired as commercial attache of the Indonesian Embassy, announced Tuesday he has been named ambassador in London for the rebel Indonesian government.

The British government has not recognized the rebel regime and Makaita admitted he might have some trouble getting accepted as an ambassador.

"I certainly hope I will be accepted," he said. "As a diplomat I don't pay income tax."

He added that the rebel government has sent him a substantial cash credit — "large enough to pay me and set up a diplomatic mission."

Reuther, Senator Engage In Name Calling At Probe

WASHINGTON — Walter Reuther called Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) a "political hypocrite and a moral coward" Wednesday. The senator came back with an accusation that the statement in which the union president attacked him was "a typical lie of Walter Reuther."

The name calling was offstage business as the long delayed Senate Rackets Investigating Committee hearing on the violence-marked 4-year strike at the Kohler Co. plumbing fixtures plant in Wisconsin finally got under way.

Reuther, whose United Auto Workers is the union on strike, wanted to be the first witness. He accused Goldwater of being the ringleader among Republican members of the committee who succeeded in getting others called ahead.

He said the idea was to hold him off until the union had been well smeared.

As the long-delayed hearings opened, Allan Graskamp, president of the UAW's Kohler Local No. 833, testified that the only violence he knows of in the marathon strike was aimed against the strikers.

Two Children Perish In Washington Blaze
EVERETT, Wash. — Two little children perished Wednesday when the roof of their fire-swept home collapsed as their mother made futile attempts to rescue them.
The victims were a 2-year-old boy and 4-year-old daughter, children of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Hauffe, who lived on the John Davis Road southeast of Everett.
Mrs. Hauffe said the children were upstairs about 11 a. m. when she heard the fire crackling. She attempted to reach them but was driven back by flames.

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
