

Yoncalla Nabs 1st Playoff Contest In District 4 Series, Beating Powers By 57-44

A high-powered band of Yoncalla Eagles took the first game of a best-of-three series to decide the District 4-B championship, from the Powers Cruisers Friday by a 57-44 tally in a game played on the losers' maples.

Hitting the nets at a 59.1 average and making use of its sharp defense, Yoncalla took an early lead and was never headed in picking up the almost-easy win.

Paced by the six points of 6-3 Leroy Noffsinger, Yoncalla raced to an 18-11 first quarter advantage and with Noffsinger and Dave Wiley each adding another four each in the second quarter took a 32-19 bulge at halftime.

After taking the 13-point bulge at halftime the Eagles were always in front by at least 10 points except for a brief spell in the third quarter, when the Cruisers moved to within six points at 40-34. At this point, single baskets by Don Reville, Bill Snider and Phil Edin increased the Eagles lead to 46-34 going into the final eight minutes of action.

With one more night of District 5-A-1 basketball action left, the Springfield Indians, who have completed their season, walked off with top place in the standings by edging third place South Eugene, 45-43, at Eugene Friday night, while the Roseburg Indians gained at least a tie for the runner-up spot and a trip to the state meet by slipping past North Bend, 48-45, at Roseburg.

In the only other league play for the night, the Marshfield Pirates took the measure of last-place Cottage Grove, 67-29, at Cottage Grove.

Both Springfield and South Eugene ended league play Friday night and will be on the sidelines tonight when Roseburg will attempt to take the second place berth in its game against Marshfield on the Pirates floor. The Indians will clinch the number two spot with a win, but can drop back into a tie for second with South Eugene should they be upended by the Pirates and a playoff game will be necessary to determine the state tourney entry.

The only other game left on the schedule is the Cottage Grove-North Bend game that will be played tonight at North Bend.

A tremendous third quarter rally by the Roseburg Indians Friday night gave them a come-from-behind 48-45 victory over the North Bend Bulldogs and assured themselves of at least a tie for second place in the final District 5-A-1 basketball standings.

The game, played on the Roseburg floor, saw the Indians bounce back from a 30-22 halftime deficit to take the lead late in the period for the first time in the game, and then hold on for the win.

Steele Hits In Clutch
The great third quarter rally was led by little 5-7 Bob Steele and 6-0 Gary Cripps. Steele accounted for only one basket in the period, but it was this one just as the final buzzer sounded that gave the Indians a 38-34 advantage going into the final eight minutes of action. Cripps dropped six points through the nets in the early part of the quarter, Roseburg had as much as a seven-point lead, but North Bend, behind the efforts of Habel and Tom Younker, always managed to pull up close.

Steele proved to be the man of the hour for the Indians again in the fourth quarter by hitting on a jumper from 16 feet out to give the Indians a four-point margin with less than two minutes left in the game. After a free throw by Habel and a tip in by Habel, again pulled the Bulldogs to within one point, with 30 seconds left in the game, Steele hit on a pair of free throws after the final buzzer to make the final margin three points.

Indians Start Cold
The opening half was one the Indians would not like to play over. They could hit the nets for only a 25-20 average, while North Bend was running wild with a .611 mark.

The Bulldogs raced off to a quick 5-0 lead on baskets by Habel and big 6-7 Bob Jacobson, but the Indians, with Wes Jackson and Tom Barrong hitting a bucket apiece, moved to within one point at 5-4 and managed to stay close up until the final minute of the quarter, when two baskets by Jacobson and two by Younker pulled the Bulldogs out to a 17-11 first quarter lead.

Jacobson, who along with Habel was high scorer for the game with 14 points, dropped six more points through the hoop in the second quarter as North Bend began to pull away. With six minutes left to play in the half, the Bulldogs held a 24-11 lead and seemed well on their way to an upset win, but the Indians rallied behind the seven points of Larry Sloan to close the gap to 30-22 at halftime.

Frosh Beat Rooks
EUGENE — Bob Hunt of Knappa scored 16 points Friday night in leading the Oregon Frosh to a 59-52 basketball victory over the Oregon State Rooks.

It was the last game of the season for the Frosh, and left the baby ducks with a 12-3 record.

The Rooks scored more field goals, 21-18, but the Frosh picked up their victory margin by sinking 23 of 25 free throw attempts.

Karl Anderson scored 19 points for the Rooks.

Tribe Gets In Gear
In the fatal third quarter for North Bend, a basket by Jacobson and single free throws by Younker and Stan Young were the only points that the Bulldogs were able to score, while the Indians broke loose for 16 points and what proved to be the margin of victory.

After their poor first half shooting, the Indians hit an even .500 average in the second half and ended the game with a .321 average, while North Bend ended with a .500 average on 17 out of 34 from the floor.

Another factor in the Roseburg victory was that the Indians cashed in on 12 out of 14 chances at the free throw line, while North Bend could connect on only 11 out of 17.

Three players from each team hit in the double figures, with the 14 of Jacobson and Habel leading all scorers. Younker also chipped in with 10 in the losing Bulldogs cause.

Sloan with 13 points led all Indians in the scoring column, but Jacobson with 12 and Cripps with 11 followed close. Steele also ended with nine points, but it was his four points in the last minute of the game that saved the day.

Phoenix took an early lead over the Glendale Pirates and held it throughout the game to take a 41-33 victory and earn its way into the finals of the Sub-District 6-A-2 basketball playoffs Friday at Ashland. Phoenix will meet Brookings in the finals to determine the team that will face the Douglas Trojans in district playoffs next week.

Other games played Friday in the tourney saw Brookings edge Eagle Point 35-32, and Henley Trinn Rogue River, 30-40. Glendale will meet Eagle Point Saturday night for third place.

After taking a slight 8-7 first quarter lead over the Pirates, Phoenix raced off to a 20-13 halftime bulge behind the eight points of Ray Witte. Ray Munyon was tops for the Pirates in the first half with six points.

Five Top-Ranked Oregon Preps Upset In Friday Night Games

Five of the top teams in the Associated Press Poll were upset Friday night in key Oregon prep basketball games.

The biggest upset came when unranked Sweet Home nipped No. 2 North Salem 52-50, on the strength of Jerry Miller's last-second field goal.

Fourth-ranked South Eugene was up-ended 45-43 by Springfield, No. 6 in the poll.

The victory gave Springfield a berth in the state Class A-1 basketball tourney. Wally Knecht led the upset with 21 points. South Eugene's ace, Charlie Warren, was held to only 13 points before fouling out.

Astoria Dumped
Astoria, fifth-ranked in the poll, lost 47-44 to unranked Parkrose in an overtime contest. Jack Hardin scored four overtime points for Parkrose.

Another upset occurred when Roseburg—which dropped out of the poll recently—clipped ninth-ranked North Bend 48-45.

One more victory would put Roseburg in the state tourney.

The other upset occurred in Portland League play, where seventh-ranked Roosevelt missed a chance to clinch a state tourney berth by dropping a 45-39 verdict to Jefferson.

The victory kept Jefferson in the running for the district's two remaining berths in the tourney by Grant, the state's third-ranked team, which Friday nudged Washington 43-34.

The poll's No. 1 team, Klamath Falls, had little trouble Friday night in rolling to an 85-59 victory over Central Point.

Hermiston Wins
Hermiston, No. 10 in the poll, took a big step toward the state tourney with a 71-56 triumph over The Dalles in the opener of a best-of-three-game series.

Pendleton, the poll's No. 8 squad, was idle.

The tourney hopes of Grants Pass suffered a severe blow Friday when the Cavemen were downed 62-50 by Medford.

Corvallis, however, kept its tourney hopes alive with a 56-34 victory over Lebanon.

One more victory will put Corvallis into the prep classic.

Only one berth for the Class A-2 tourney was won last night. That was taken by St. Francis of Eugene, which clipped Oakridge, 61-38.
