Reds Using Victims Of Hijacked Plane In Recognition Try

PANMUNJOM, Korea, (AP)—A six-hour Allied-Communist meeting on the possible return of two Germans and two Americans held in North Korea ended in a deadlock today over Red demands for negotiations between governments.

The Communists flatly rejected a U.N. Command proposal that the two American pilots and two West-German passengers of the South Korean commercial airliner held in North Korea since Feb. 15 be handed over at once to U.S. and West German diplomatic representatives present at a meeting of secretaries of the Allied-Red truce commission.

The North Koreans demanded that arrangements first be worked out by meetings between officials of the United States, West Germany and North Korea, which would like to get recognition in any form from the Western powers.

After arguments lasting into the night, U. S. Navy Capt. George W. Kehl, the U. N. representative, told the Reds the Allied side "has no intention to arrange a political meeting between government representatives."

The session adjourned indefinitely.

The Communists also refused to treat with representatives of the South Korean Red Cross concerning the 30 Korean passengers on the plane.

South Korea, like the United States, does not recognize North Korea.

Eugene Pondering Waste Disposal From Big Cannery

EUGENE — This city's best course of action in cleaning up the Willamette River pollution will probably be installation of secondary treatment facilities at its sewage disposal plant. The cost will be in the neighborhood of \$400,000.

This was the report which City Council members received Friday from Ralph Roderick, engineer with the Corvallis firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, designers of Eugene's treatment plant.

Roderick and several city officials conferred with Curtis M. Everts Jr., chief engineer for the State Sanitary Authority, earlier this week to find out what the state agency wants the city to do to cut down summertime river pollution.

"I was in a daze half the time," she told detectives at a Brooklyn police station.

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Tragedy On Fishing Trip Claims Four Of Family

SAN DIEGO — Sam Horner, 33, said today that if he had arrived minutes sooner he might have saved his father, his two young sons and a nephew from drowning in the All-American Canal near Yuma, Ariz., Saturday.

"The three little ones were lying side by side on the bottom of a slough next to the canal and Dad was just sinking," Horner related.

He discovered the tragedy when he returned to the family fishing camp from a grocery store a mile away.

The victims, all of San Diego, were Roy Horner, 37, and his three grandsons, Marvin, 15, and Morris Horner, 10, and Jackie Arnett, 7. The Arnett boy was a son of Sam Horner's sister, Mrs. Imogene Maxwell, San Diego. His father, Thomas Arnett, lives in Muncie, Ind.

Horner said his two sons were good swimmers. He expressed belief his nephew had fallen into the slough and that his sons became exhausted trying to save him. "Dad must have gone in then to try to help," he said.

The bodies will be buried side by side here Friday.

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
