White Family Entertains New Negro Neighbors

NORWALK, Conn. (AP)—A Negro family, in the process of moving into an all-white neighborhood, was feted at a party last night by a white family.

Host and hostess Mr. and Mrs. William Atkins said it was a "very successful" gathering. They had 10 other adults and 11 children over to greet the negroes, Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Randall and their three children.

The Randalls started moving into their \$35,000 home in all-white Apple Tree Lane, a development here. Mrs. Randall told a newspaper: "We have no qualms. We came here because we needed more room and space for the children, not to try to crash the social life of the community."

Randall works for a New York insurance firm. He is a graduate of Yale University.

Weekend Traffic Accidents Keep State Officers Busy

Investigation of traffic accidents kept state police busy Sunday. Four accidents — none with major injuries — were reported.

The day's work started about 5 a.m. with a two-car accident on Highway 99 at Calapooia Bridge north of Sutherlin.

Bobby D. Weiler, 30, Molalla, told officers he had been headed south in a 1938 coach when the battery cable came off and the car stopped. He said he had replaced the cable when he heard a car coming.

Weiler stated he had turned on the parking lights and then jumped out of the car with a flashlight and had tried to flag down the oncoming car.

A 1955 sedan drive by Mildred Tanere, 65, Lebanon, according to the report, skidded 47 feet and crashed into the rear of the parked car.

The Lebanon woman and her passenger, Gary W. Ellenburg, 64, also of Lebanon, were taken to Mercy Hospital by ambulance. She was treated for a lacerated lower lip and bruise on her right knee. Ellenburg was treated for a laceration and bruise on his forehead and for a heart condition.

Both Cars Damaged

The 1938 coach received heavy rear-end damage, while the late model sedan received a badly damaged front end. Police said it was foggy at the time of the accident and that the highway was icy.

The second accident of the day was observed by a state police officer who cited one driver. The crash occurred about noon on Highway 99 at the Quines Creek Junction.

Involved were Virgil Lee Kivett, 21, Los Angeles, driving a 1957 coach, and Roger Winslow Wright, 26, Azalea, operating a 1956 coach. Kivett suffered a broken bone in his right foot, a deep cut on his left arm and several small cuts and bruises on his body, police said.

Kivett was admitted to Forest Glen Hospital, Canyonville. A passenger in his car, Beverly Jean Press, 20, Los Angeles, was treated for facial bruises and released. Wright was uninjured.

Car Rolls Over

According to the accident report, Wright was traveling south and was signaling for a left turn onto Quines Creek Road when Kivett came from behind and attempted to pass on the right. His car clipped the right rear of Wright's car, skidded 176 feet along the shoulder of the road, then skidded broadside on the pavement and rolled 129 feet along the pavement.

Kivett, who was cited for basic rule violation, reportedly told police he was driving 65 or 70 miles per hour at the time of the accident. His car was a total wreck, while the other vehicle received moderate damage.

Accident number three was logged on Lookingglass Road about one-half mile from W. Harvard Avenue.

Police reports state that James Melvin Maney, 27, Rt. 1 Box 1430, Roseburg, apparently was trying to pass a car driven by Laddie Novak, 150 NE Patterson St., when the accident occurred.

Maney's 1955 coach, police said, apparently clipped the rear fender of Novak's 1956 sedan as he started

to pass. Maney's car continued for 38 feet into a ditch and hit a pile of bricks.

An investigating officer said Maney had left the scene of the accident but later returned in another car. He refused to give any statement about the accident, the officer reported.

The officer stated that there appeared to be no injuries, either to Maney or his passenger, Charlotte Lindstrom, 17, Rt. 3 Box 1460, Roseburg.

Maney's car received heavy damage and was towed from the scene. Novak's car received slight fender damage.

The day's activity ended with a one-car accident at Newton Creek Road and Highway 99BR in which two 16-year-old Roseburg girls were injured.

Taken to Community Hospital by ambulance were Mary Katherine Ralston, 463 SE Jackson St., and Shannon Joyce Doyle, 973 SE Glenn St. Miss Ralston received minor cuts and bruises on her head and face, police reported, and Miss Doyle suffered a deep scalp laceration and contusions of the knees.

Driver Cited

Miss Ralston, listed as the driver, was orally cited for reckless driving, the investigating officer reported.

He stated she had driven a 1956 sedan from Newton Creek Road onto the highway without stopping or slowing enough to make the turn. The vehicle went across 99BR to the shoulder, went south about 50 feet, swerved back across the highway, knocked down a post, then bounced across a ditch and crashed head-on into a tree.

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New Construction In County Shows January Increase

Douglas County construction showed a big increase in total volume in January over the previous month's total, but a decrease over the January 1957 figure, according to figures released by the Equitable Savings and Loan Assn.

The total volume in January was \$16,550, up 314 per cent over the December total and down 94 per cent from the January 1957 figure.

Dwelling permits were down 74 per cent from a year ago in January, but increased over the December total which showed nothing. The total in January, 1958 was \$15,120.

Roseburg was up 22 per cent over a year ago in total construction volume in January. There were no dwelling permits in Roseburg in January 1957, but the January 1958 total was \$91,000 and the December 1957 count was \$24,000.

Dollar volume of all construction permits issued by 64 major Pacific Northwest cities went up 27 per cent in January over the previous month and dwelling permit volume rose three per cent.

Oregon cities showed a 16 per cent gain in total volume over December.

Compared with January 1957, the Northwest states' increase in number of permits, but a decrease in dollar volume of 1 per cent.

Dwelling permits, however, showed gains in both volume and number.

Dwelling volume slipped in Oregon by 14 per cent in January compared to the previous month and a drop of 21 per cent from January 1957. The figure for January 1958 was \$1,293,335.
