

Russians Would Come To U. S. For Summit Session

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower said Wednesday Russian leaders have agreed to come to Washington for a summit conference. He said he thinks that might be a good arrangement if such a conference was going to last for a long time.

If it was to be just a short meeting, Eisenhower said, a news conference would be ready to go to any convenient place. But for a long session, he said, he should stay in the United States.

While the question and answer on this point were in terms of a meeting in Washington, it was learned the Soviet leaders expressed readiness to meet in any city in the United States.

Many officials think any summit meeting held in this country probably would not be in Washington because of limited facilities. There is continuing speculation, however, about a possible meeting at United Nations headquarters in New York.

Eisenhower said, however, it would be absolutely futile and damaging to attempt to hold any summit meeting at all without very careful preparation and advance evidence of achievement.

The United States, he continued, never will close the door on East-West talks. He said if there is any possible avenue — no matter how crooked and no matter how narrow — that will take the world even one step toward the achievement of peace, he is perfectly willing to try it.

But he endorsed Secretary of State Dulles' warning Tuesday against becoming involved in some sort of Soviet maneuver that would amount to a "hoax," as Dulles called it.

This country plans to reply promptly to the Soviet Union's proposal for the conference. The nature of the reply is being discussed this week with Allied governments in Europe.

The present official intention is to submit a counterproposal calling for a foreign ministers meeting which could discuss the substance of East-West issues as well as the mechanical arrangements for a conference, to which the Soviets seek to limit it.

Secretary of State Dulles, who assailed the Soviet proposal at a news conference, is reported to have three major objections to it:

1. It would limit the foreign ministers to considering purely organizational matters, such as time and place and list of topics which could be discussed in a meeting.

2. The Western powers would be required to agree ahead of time to the holding of a summit conference in June. Dulles emphasized the United States is not yet prepared to agree to a summit meeting at all.

3. The Soviets have ruled out consideration of German reunification and the political status of Europe — both matters that the United States has said must be taken up at any summit conference.

Pair Arrested In Wood Alcohol Deaths Of 23

HOBOKEN, N. J. — New York Police Lt. Frank Weldon said Wednesday that two men being held here are responsible for all 23 of New York's wood alcohol deaths.

Police here identified the pair as Pedro Rodriguez, 26, and Francisco Padin, 32, both of Hoboken. They were arrested last night and are awaiting extradition to New York on fugitive warrants.

Police said Rodriguez stole 60 gallons of the alcohol from the M.T.A. chemical plant in Carlstadt, where he works. Padin then diluted the alcohol into a drink commonly known as "King Kong" and peddled it in New York, they said.

The 23 "King Kong" deaths occurred in little more than a week. Dozens of other persons have been hospitalized as suspected victims.

Weldon said police were questioning the pair's contact man in the Bronx, Ernest Vegas, 40, who, he said, arranged the sale of the alcohol to two other Bronx men, Norberto Diaz, 33, and Jose Billido, 42.

Diaz and Billido were charged with homicide Saturday in the deaths of two other Bronx residents.

Diaz is proprietor of a candy store, and police said he admitted selling 1 1/2 pints of "King Kong" to George Valledario, 34, and Venancio Velasquez, 32.

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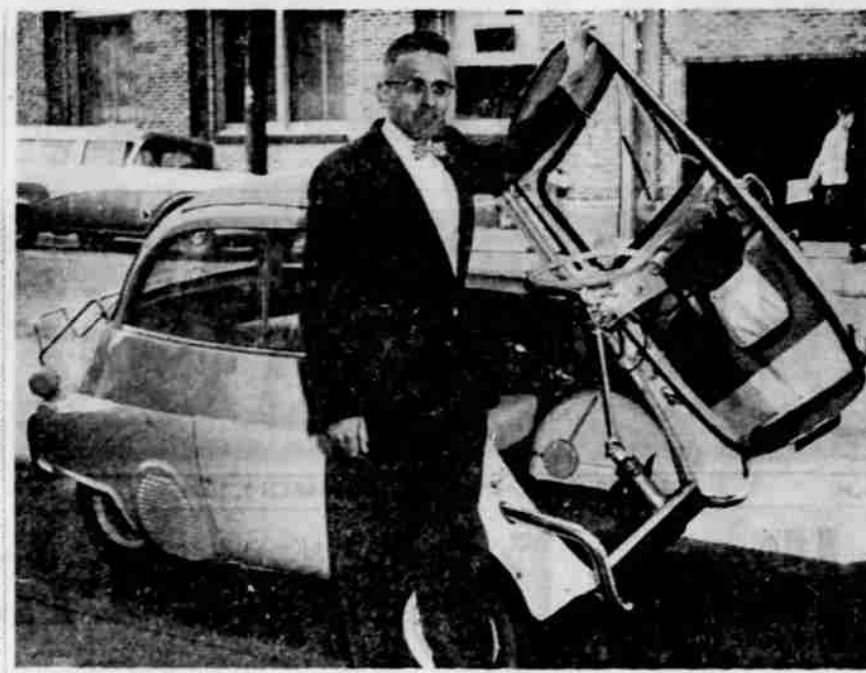

The prosecution contends that an argument which led to the shooting concerned custody of the two Brame children, Camilla, 15, and Patrick, 13. Mrs. Brame had been awarded temporary custody of the children pending the outcome of a divorce complaint she filed on April 24, 1957.

Boy's Condition Good After Stay In Freezer

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho — Five-year-old Stephen Hargett was in good condition in a hospital here Wednesday after being trapped in a food freezer for about 3 1/2 hours.

Stephen's mother, Mrs. Wayne Hargett, said she first missed the boy about 11 a.m. Tuesday. He was found by his father after an extensive search about 2:30 p.m. in the freezer in the family garage.

Officials said the boy was frozen stiff and unconscious. Dr. Darrell C. Stoddard, a neighbor, quickly wrapped the boy in a blanket and hot water bottles.

Mrs. Hargett could not offer a clue as to how Stephen got into the freezer because the door appeared too heavy for him to lift. The youngster was clad in jeans and a sweat shirt. He had kicked vigorously against the inside of the freezer trying to get free.

Johnson Proposes Job-Creating Fund For Emergency Use

WASHINGTON — Senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas threw his weight today behind a proposal to establish a Public Works Administration with a half billion dollar job-creating fund.

Johnson told reporters he is supporting the proposal by Sen. Gore (D-Tenn.) as one of the key measures in a Democratic anti-recession program. Under the Gore bill, the federal government would contribute 90 per cent of the cost of projects aimed at reducing unemployment.

"I believe we should have such an agency in existence to do the planning now for projects that might become necessary later," Johnson said. "This program could be held in reserve until it might be needed."

The Gore bill would authorize a wide variety of projects, including public buildings, schools, recreation facilities, airports and hydroelectric facilities.

Johnson made it clear he and other Democratic leaders do not now subscribe to the hopes expressed by President Eisenhower that the decline in employment can be brought to a halt this month.

Nuclear Powered Sub Makes Speedy Crossing

PORTLAND, England — The nuclear-powered American submarine Skate docked at this British naval base today and its skipper claimed a record for the fastest transatlantic crossing from the United States ever made by a submarine.

The sleek, lead-colored sub crossed the Atlantic in 8 days 11 hours — traveling under water all the way.

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Mrs. Roosevelt States Commies Chewing Off Little Bits Of World

NORMAN, Okla. — The Communists are trying to chew off little bits of the world until democracy cannot function, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt declared last night.

"I don't think enough of our people have been told of the challenge and what it is," she said. "We have lacked imagination in government in the past few years. We need some facts, some knowledge and some imagination."

Mrs. Roosevelt and former President Harry Truman spoke to an overflow crowd of 1,500 at the University of Oklahoma. The affair was sponsored by the Young Democratic Club on the campus to commemorate the 35th anniversary of Franklin D. Roosevelt's first inauguration.

Truman gave his favorite lecture on the powers and duties of the presidency.

Responsibility Of Young People Up To Parents

The welfare of young people is the responsibility of their parents, but that responsibility often is refused, Roseburg Kiwanians were told Tuesday noon in the Hotel Umpqua.

Wayne Schulz, director of the Roseburg YMCA, verbally illustrated his talk by referring to newspaper headlines.

Some, he said, "scream" the news of juveniles in trouble. On the other hand, he pointed out, reading from a News-Review story, an insight into the goodness of young people may be found in such things as the efforts of Roseburg High School students in raising money for polio and muscular dystrophy.

He said some of the reasons behind the collapse of the Roseburg Youth Center could be traced to lack of supervision through parental help in the organization. When the center became known as a trouble spot, community support accordingly waned.

Schulz cited his own organization as a useful one in the community. Although news stories have been published about thefts in the locker rooms during YMCA basketball games, he said the youngsters involved were spectators.

Some 200 players in the YMCA league were too busy participating in the league to get in trouble.

Regarding plans for a YMCA building in Roseburg, Schulz told the club that the degree of success of the venture will be measured by the support it gets in the community.

Prior to the talk, initiation was conducted for five new club members.

Youth Sought In Slaying Of Three Of Family

HAMPDEN, Mass. — A "wanted for murder" alarm was out today for Robert G. Clifford, 17, in the shooting death of his father, mother and young brother.

The bodies of Robert G. Clifford, 47; his wife Marie, 43; and their son Donald, 14, were found yesterday in their modest home.

Police said all three had been shot in the head several times with a .22-caliber rifle.

Jaunty Teen-Agers Leave Their Fate In Hands Of Judge

RAWLINS, Wyo. — Six jaunty teen-agers turned mild and meek Tuesday night and decided to rest their fate with a federal judge.

The youngsters, each in turn, pleaded guilty to charges of interstate transportation of a stolen car. U.S. Commissioner C. A. Brimmer then ordered them held under \$1,000 bond each for sentencing in U.S. District Court in Cheyenne. No date was set.

The charge carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison or \$5,000 fine, or both, on conviction.

The youngsters, including a 15-year-old girl, Janice Jones, were taken to Carbon County Jail here to await transfer to Albany County Jail at Laramie.

The five youngsters took the girl from a Salt Lake City detention home Sunday night. Sheriff C. G. McDougall said the girl later admitted she accompanied them voluntarily.

McDougall said they stole a car at Salt Lake City and drove to Evanston, Wyo., where they abandoned the vehicle and stole another.

A patrolman spotted that auto near Shoshoni, Wyo., Monday and halted its occupants with a warning shot.

McDougall identified the boys as Kenneth Hulce, 17, Duane Thompson, 15, Norman Leroy Wiseman, 17, Phillip Maer, 15, and Mike Bishop, 16, all of Salt Lake City.

Lone Bandit Robs Bank In Seattle; Big Dragnet Set

SEATTLE — A lone gunman who plied his trade with confidence robbed the Denny Way Branch of the Seattle-First National Bank of \$20,994 late Tuesday. He then escaped a huge dragnet cast by police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Walking into the bank through a rear door, the bandit went to the teller's cage occupied by Miss Vinnette Patterson. Her job is to handle payrolls and distribute currency to other tellers.

"I want 'all of your money,'" the holdup man said, giving Miss Patterson a glimpse of a silver-plated pistol in a shoulder holster.

Miss Patterson started shoving bundles of \$100, \$20 and \$10 bills to the bandit, who stuffed them into his pockets. Customers and other employees continued their dealings unaware of the holdup.

After stuffing his pockets, the bandit warned Miss Patterson not to say anything until he got outside, strode to the door and vanished before the alarm could be sounded.

It was the second bank holdup in the Seattle area in seven days. Last Wednesday a lone bandit robbed the Federal Way Branch of the Peoples National Bank of Washington 18 1/2 miles south of here, escaping with \$10,700. Lewis Frederick Miles of Graham, Wash., was arrested four hours later and charged with the holdup.

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
