Resources Said In Danger From Political Games

ST. LOUIS — Ira N. Gabrielson, president of the Wildlife Management Institute in Washington, warned the 22nd North American Wildlife Conference — Wednesday that playing politics with conservation agencies can ruin our natural resources.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service "only now is recovering from its devastating bout with the spoils system," Gabrielson declared in his prepared address.

He said political intrigue interfered with good wildlife management and conservation work in several states, citing Indiana, Oklahoma, Florida, Louisiana and Kentucky as examples.

Gabrielson said the federal Fish and Wildlife Service had been handled by career scientists since the early 1930s and was dealt a severe blow in 1933 when the top jobs became political appointments. He said career men in those jobs were forced out of the service and a "chaotic four years of inaction, vacillation and generally unwise decisions" resulted.

Under the leadership of Secretary Fred Seaton, Gabrielson said, the "wreckage is being salvaged" and the service is getting back on the track and moving forward.
