Republicans Told Demos Depend On Capital Leaders

SALEM — A Republican rally was held Friday night that there is an "utter dependence of Oregon Democrats on their leaders in Washington."

State GOP Chairman James Short said that "when these facts are known, the voters will reject Democratic fumbling and return the leadership of our state affairs to the Republican Party."

Short said the Republicans also will gain support because of "an evident desire of Gov. Robert Holmes and his advisors to tax the people of Oregon into bankruptcy."

Three hundred party members attended the rally here.

They also heard National Committeeman Robert Mautz of Portland warn that the GOP has tended to "look too much to the past" and has "got a little too fat."

Mautz said Republicans must look more to the future.

The committeeman also was critical of the ballot slogan of Gov. Holmes, which says he helped reduce taxes in the state. Republicans earlier had claimed that part of the tax reduction was put into effect over Holmes' opposition.

"I do not want our candidates to win by such dishonesty and hypocrisy as is represented by the governor's ballot slogan," Mautz said.

Heavy Turnover Seen In Oregon's Next Legislature

SALEM — A heavy turnover in state legislators was assured Saturday after the filing period closed for candidates in the May 16 primary election.

Of the members of the 1957 regular legislative session, 23 House members and seven senators won't be back in 1959.

Republicans are the hardest hit in the upper house, with six of their members already out.

They are Sens. Lee Ohmart, Salem, taxation expert; Warren Gile, GOP leader of the Senate who is running for governor; Truman A. Chase, Eugene, veteran of 10 sessions; Philip Lowry, Medford; Howard Belton, Canby, who served in 11 sessions, and Rudie Wilhelm, Portland, who has been in six sessions and was speaker in 1953.

Teachers Approve Own Method For Policing Ranks

PORTLAND — A plan under which the teaching profession would police its own ranks was approved tentatively Friday by the Representative Council of the Oregon Education Assn.

Harold Dishaw of Sweet Home was appointed to head a committee to write proposed legislation for the plan. If this legislation is approved by the council, it will be submitted to the Legislature for action.

Under the plan, a group of educators would examine the competence of teachers and would have power to suspend or revoke teaching certificates of those teachers who fail to measure up to standards.

The meeting continued Saturday. Tom Powers of Eugene told Friday's session the OEA probably would ask the 1959 Legislature to increase the basic school support fund to \$150 per census child. It now is \$105.

In other action the council received a report from its Economic Welfare Committee calling for a minimum salary for teachers of \$5,000 a year and a maximum of \$11,500.

It received a resolution from the Federal Legislation Committee calling for federal educational legislation to encourage greater state and local efforts to finance schools.

Work-Creation Actions Pushed

WASHINGTON — The Eisenhower administration and the Democratic-controlled Congress are pushing job-creation actions amid reports that unemployment shot up last month to more than 5,100,000.

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, Democratic leader, announced he will seek swift Senate action on housing, highway, education and other bills — "major measures in providing jobs," he called them.

Johnson made public a letter saying the defense Department is looking into the matter of speeding up military construction projects in labor surplus areas—those with relatively high unemployment.

"I think we can pick up some 200,000 to 500,000 jobs by government projects," Johnson said, adding this should have a "good psychological effect upon the country."

Congressman Demands Explanation Of Leak

CHICAGO — Rep. Wright Patman (D-Tex.) said he will insist that the chairman of the Federal Reserve Board appear before the House Banking and Currency Committee to explain why there was a leak in the discount rate announced Thursday.

The board chairman is William McChesney Martin Jr.

Patman, a member of the committee headed by Rep. Brent Spence (D-Ky.), told the Associated Press strong rumors about a rate reduction flooded Wall Street in New York before the board's actual announcement. He said this allowed dealers in government securities to "reality clean up a profit."

The board approved a reduction in the discount rate from 2 1/2 to 2 percent effective Friday at New York, Philadelphia and Chicago federal reserve banks.

Producer Found Dead

NEW YORK — Mark Marvin St. a stage and film producer, was found dead Friday night in his West Side apartment.

Police said a note was found beside the body but the cause of death was listed as unknown, pending an autopsy.

Bodies Of Two Found In Boxcar At Everett

EVERETT — Police sought a clue Saturday to the time, place and reason for the shooting of two men whose bullet riddled bodies were found in a boxcar.

The men, tentatively identified as Noah Arthur Roberson of Ashland, Ore., and Jack Cecil Webb, address unknown, were found Friday.

Roberson had been shot four times in the head; Webb had a bullet hole through his neck. Both men had been dead not more than two days.

The freight car had been moved to Seattle from Vancouver, Wash., early Thursday.

Temperature Drops Around State Today

The temperature dropped to 12 degrees Saturday morning at Klamath Falls, as snow was reported through parts of Oregon.

The Klamath Falls temperature was the lowest recorded in the state, but the mercury also skidded to 20 degrees at Redmond and 26 at Baker.

Snow was falling steadily through all mountain passes in the state, the state Highway Department said.

Light snow fell Saturday morning in the Grants Pass area. Wet snow also flecked Salem and Eugene.

The temperature remained just above freezing in most of the Willamette Valley early Saturday, but the area was hit by chill rains.

The temperature hit a low of 33 at Roseburg and Salem, and it dropped to 34 at Eugene. Rain fell through much of western Oregon, topped by .82 of an inch at Brookings.

The Weather Bureau said Western Oregon can expect a few scattered rain and snow showers through Saturday night, when the temperature will range from 28-36.

Cloudy skies are expected in Eastern Oregon, where the temperature will hit a low of 12 degrees Saturday night.

Plans To Evacuate U. S. Citizens From Sumatra Talked

JAKARTA, Indonesia — Officials of U. S. oil companies Saturday met with U. S. Ambassador Howard Jones to study plans for possible evacuation of American workers and dependents from oil installations in rebellious Central Sumatra.

The U. S. owned Stanvac and Caltex oil companies have 459 workers and dependents there.

The meeting came about after the Jakarta government rejected negotiations with the rebel government. The government has been threatening to use force to end the uprising.

There are 399 U. S. citizens in the Paganbaru area and at Rumbi, site of the crude oil fields. They are technicians of the Caltex Oil Co. and their families. Another 60 are in the Rengat area, farther south.

Pakanbaru is 125 miles north-east of the rebel capital of Bukittinggi.

At Dumai, on the Malacca Strait, and at Duri, on the Siak River, 280 Americans are working for the Bechtel Co. building a road and laying an 18 million dollar pipeline.

U. S. embassy officials conferred with Foreign Minister Subandrio several days ago and received assurances that if any action occurred in the area care would be taken to ensure the safety of Americans. The embassy has an evacuation plan but has not disclosed it.

Caltex vice president T. W. Donahue and attorney H. Arnold arrived Thursday in connection with a new \$50 million dollar expansion program and to look into the critical situation.

Major international airlines and companies having private planes said Saturday they have received copies of an Indonesian Air Force order commanding all civilian planes and crews for military requirements.

Sutherland Park Program May Be Dropped, Report

The Sutherland Park Board summer recreation program is in danger of being dropped it was revealed at a recent meeting of the board.

The Park Board's summer recreation program was jointly sponsored by the board and the school district, each providing half of the budget.

It was reported at the meeting that the school district voted not to participate in the program this year, Mrs. Herb Osaki, News-Review correspondent, said.

Chairman Mickey Thompson said a letter will be written to the school board asking them to reconsider their move. Park board members will call on community organizations to get their opinions on the recreation program, Thompson said.

If the school board does not reconsider, the park board will be faced with the possibility of either operating the summer program at half budget or dropping it completely, Thompson added.

Yemen King Completes Federation With Egypt

DAMASCUS, Syria — The medieval kingdom of Yemen and President Nasser's new United Arab Republic completed their federation Saturday with the formal signing of a 32-article agreement.

Nasser signed for the Union of Egypt and Syria and Crown Prince Saif Al Islam Al Badr of Yemen signed for his father, the Imam Ahmed.

The aged Arab king will retain absolute control in his Arabian desert domain on the Red Sea but will share veto power over federation decisions affecting Yemen.

The agreement was the first state document approved by Nasser's new cabinet.

Most Wanted Criminal Scratched From List

INDIANAPOLIS — The FBI has scratched the name of Ben Golden McCollum from its list of the 10 most wanted fugitives after ending almost four years of freedom for the convicted murderer from Oklahoma.

McCollum, who has spent almost half his 49 years in prison, walked into an FBI trap at his rooming house on the near East Side of Indianapolis Friday night. Unarmed, McCollum had no chance to resist. A Luger pistol was found in his room.

Eugene Woman Killed In Highway Collision

EUGENE — Mrs. Louvaine B. Scholow, 41, Eugene, suffered fatal injuries Thursday when a car she was driving collided with a logging truck on Highway 226 near here.

A passenger, Avis M. Lyon, 46, Springfield, suffered cuts and other injuries.

The truck driver, Loren Perkins, 34, of rural Cottage Grove, was not hurt.

France Votes Budget To Carry Algerian War

PARIS — Despite deep-seated parliamentary discontent with France's Algerian policy, the National Assembly voted last night to intensify the war against the Algerian rebels.

On a vote of confidence in Premier Felix Gaillard's government, the Assembly approved 286-147 his revised military budget of 1,300 billion dollars.

Only a few deputies besides the Communists were willing to go on record against the war budget but 160 deputies were absent or abstained, so the vote of approval was by a minority of the Assembly.

Reuther, Goldwater Meeting Delayed

WASHINGTON — A face-to-face showdown between Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) and Walter Reuther may be delayed by a growing number of witnesses in a Senate probe of violence in the Kohler Co. strike.

Reuther is president of the United Auto Workers which for nearly four years has been on strike against the Wisconsin manufacturer of bathroom fixtures.

Goldwater is a member of the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee which is trying to determine responsibility for beatings, bombings and other violence during the long strike.

The two are longtime foes and have called each other cowards in recent public statements. Sparks are almost certain to fly when they face each other.

Robert F. Kennedy, the committee's chief counsel, told newsmen it might be the end of next week before Reuther is called to testify.

The hearings are in recess until Monday when Kennedy said the committee hopes to complete its questioning of Emil Mazey, the UAW's secretary-treasurer.

Verne Dark, 50, Glendale Passes

Verne Dark, 50, a long-time resident of Glendale, died in Forest Glen Hospital at Canyonville Friday afternoon.

He is survived by his wife, Georgia, of Glendale. The body has been removed to a Grants Pass funeral home and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Dark had been ill with multiple sclerosis for the past five years and had been bedfast for some time. Mrs. Grace Fox, News-Review correspondent, said.

Perry Foster, 84, Passes Thursday

Funeral services for Perry Elmer Foster, 84, well-known local resident who died at a local hospital Thursday evening, will be held Monday at 11 a.m. in The Chapel of the Roses.

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Portland Youth Admits Attack On Five Women

PORTLAND, Ore. — Larry Robert Molstrom, 17, who admitted in juvenile court Friday that he had beaten five women, faces prosecution as an adult on a charge of assault with intent to kill.

"I don't know why I did it," he sobbed in court, but police quoted him as saying earlier that a compulsive urge to attack women came over him as he walked the streets alone at night.

Molstrom stands 6-2 and weighs 190. Officers said he told them his latest victim was Marjorie Miner, 20, who was beaten with a metal bar the night of March 6. She is in a hospital for treatment of a skull fracture and other injuries.

The first reported attack was last Nov. 20. All the women suffered head injuries but were not otherwise molested.

Molstrom was arrested after three high school girls reported seeing a youth in a vacant apartment shortly after the attack on Miss Miner. They said they thought the youth was a student at their school and picked Molstrom's picture from among those in a high school yearbook.

Minor Injuries Suffered Here In Auto Wreck

Minor injuries were suffered Friday afternoon by the occupants of a small foreign auto which collided with another vehicle.

According to state police, the accident occurred on the west approach of the Dillard bridge where Margaret Josephine Brown, 27, Dillard, had stopped her car to allow an oncoming vehicle to clear the bridge.

The oncoming car, driven by Madge Evelyn Muchmore, 56, slid into the stopped vehicle, according to the police report. A citation for operating in the left lane of traffic was handed to Madge Muchmore of Milo Academy.

Riding with her were four students attending the academy: Catherine Poissot, 15; Jeaneune Humphreys, 18; Yvonne Scott, 18 and Phyllis Scott, 14. All were taken to Winston for treatment. The Dillard woman was unhurt.

Both vehicles received heavy front end damage.

PLAIN TRUTH

Those who heard and obeyed the Gospel in the first century were "added to the Church," according to the scriptures. (Acts 2:47) This brings to our mind some pertinent questions. (1) What value is the Church? (2) Can I get along without the Church? (3) Are all Churches safe? (4) All these questions deserve an answer and the New Testament gives the answer to all who will seek with sincerity.

The phrase, "Join the Church," is foreign to the Bible. One cannot "join" the Church of the New Testament. As clearly taught in Acts 2:47, when men and women obeyed the Apostles teaching, God "added" them to the "Church." The believing, penitent individual is baptized into Christ; (Gal. 3:27) "As many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ" thus they become a part of "His Body," the Church. (Col. 1:18)

We sometimes hear the expression, "obey the Gospel then join the Church of your choice." To do this would be to take one who is a member of Christ's Body, the Church, and make that one a member of a "man-made" institution. Paul warns against this practice in 2 Cor. 6:14-18 where he admonishes those whom he addressed as, "Saints and members of the Church," not to affiliate themselves with "human and idolatrous organizations." Meditate upon this and you will see the danger of attempting to obey the Gospel then, "Join" yourself to any human institution. Be content to be a part of "Christ's Body," the Church, in so doing your life and efforts will glorify God and not man.
