

American-Soviet Exchange Of Notes On Summit Meet Like Egg-Hurling Contest

WASHINGTON — It looks like an egg-throwing contest—with the high-level American-Soviet discussions on how to hold a summit meeting.

Premier Bulganin has written President Eisenhower four letters since December. Eisenhower has replied with three. Both agree peace is wonderful. Each uses a lot of paper blaming the other side for the mess the world's in.

Others heaved eggs of their own from the sidelines: Secretary of State Dulles, Communist party boss Khrushchev, the State Department, the Soviet Foreign Office.

So, while both sides talk of the summit, both are using the exchanges for propaganda. This may be the diplomats' idea of how to arrange a meeting. To a layman it may seem the best way to have none at all.

Bulganin Accuses

Bulganin, sandwiching in topics he'd like a summit meeting to discuss, has charged the United States with war preparations; taken a crack at Dulles by brushing off the idea that foreign ministers should meet to arrange a summit conference; accused people in this country of calling for a preventive war; blamed this government for not squelching them.

That's just a briefed down version of all he said. He got under Eisenhower's skin. The President, knowing the whole world was reading his correspondence with Bulganin, went to great lengths to defend this country and blast the Soviet Union.

Ike Fires Back

He blamed the "cold war" on communism; accused the Soviets of running out on promises to help unify Germany and let the satellite hold free elections; condemned the Soviet Union for undermining nations with its 82 vetoes in the United Nations.

He needed Bulganin for being too wordy in his letters; blamed the Soviet Union for the arms race and wanting to overthrow other governments; and he told Bulganin one of his letters was just a mild rebash of a "bitter speech" by Khrushchev before a bunch of farmers in Minsk last Jan. 22.

While Bulganin was writing about peace and togetherness, Khrushchev at Minsk belittled this country's efforts to launch a sat-

ellite, ridiculed Eisenhower and Dulles, and blustered the "Western imperialists" who wanted to preserve a war atmosphere in order to make money.

In short order, the State Department issued a statement tearing into Khrushchev for spreading a "distorted view of United States policies and motivations."

"Whom Are You Kidding?"

Meanwhile, the Soviet Foreign Office in a note to this country—called by diplomats an aide memoire—suggested that maybe, after all, the foreign ministers could meet to arrange a summit conference.

But, upon analysis, all the Soviets were suggesting was that the foreign ministers without authority be looking agents without authority to make preparations for a summit meeting that might accomplish something.

That was what the State Department fired back in an aide memoire of its own. What it meant in diplomatic language was: "Whom are you kidding? What is actually said: Do you want a worthwhile summit meeting or a 'spectacle'?"

And Dulles at his news conference last week called the Soviet note a "fraud, or a hoax." This is in addition to some extra egg-throwing on the side.

For instance, the Soviet radio blamed the United States for the French bombing of a Tunisian town. The State Department jumped on this as "outrageous."

It seems safe to say after all this that American-Soviet relations are no better and a summit meeting no nearer.

Grants Pass Rites Held For Glendale

Dark made his home in Glendale for the past 29 years. He was born Jan. 2, 1908, at Union Town, Kan. He is survived by his wife, Georgia of Glendale and a nephew, Dale Osteen of Dallas, Ore. Mrs. Grace Fox, News-Review correspondent, said.

Europe Scoured By Wintry Blasts

LONDON — Europe's cold spell spread south Monday, bringing snow showers and icy winds to the Mediterranean coast from the French Riviera to Sicily.

Many roads in Britain and France were blocked by snow. Some villages were cut off in North England and Scotland. Denmark shivered in what a meteorologist described as the most prolonged wintry spell for years.

A snow carpet lay over almost all France. It was four inches deep in the Loire Valley, where people shoveled snow from the streets for a mid-Lent procession watched by 50,000 persons.

Traffic accidents on the icy roads caused two deaths in Italy. A skier was reported missing in a snowstorm on volcanic Mt. Etna in Sicily.

Rome had its first snow of the winter and gales battered Naples harbor.

Charles T. (Jack) Smith, 69, prominent Sutherland rancher, died at his home east of Sutherland early today.

Survivors include his wife Margaret of Sutherland; two sisters, Sophia Hanna of San Francisco and Sadie Smith of Ashland; two sons, Richard of Sutherland and Dr. Donald Rone of Roseburg.

The body has been removed to Stearns and Little Mortuary, Oakland, and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Boy, 14, Saves Crowded Train From Disaster

BEIGRADE, Yugoslavia — A 14-year-old boy is credited with saving the crowded Balkan Express from piling up on a landslide.

Miroslav Kurnic, son of a rail worker, saw a huge rock from the slide on the track over which the Istanbul-Athens-Vienna express was due to pass yesterday.

He ran back to meet the train and signaled the engineer to stop, averting an almost certain wreck. The express arrived in Belgrade 13 hours late after the debris in the narrow Bar River Canyon had been cleared away.

Armor Training Course Completed By Soldier

Pvt. Ralph E. Young Jr., whose parents live in Myrtle Creek, recently completed eight weeks of armor training at Ft. Knox, Ky.

The 23-year-old soldier attended Myrtle Creek High School and was employed by Green Valley Lumber Co. in Roseburg before entering the Army.

He entered the Army in September 1957 and completed basic training at Ft. Ord, Calif.

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Indonesian Army Invades Sumatra To Smash Rebels

SINGAPORE — Indonesian troops have landed in Central Sumatra, apparently in an attempt to crush the revolutionary regime there, rebel sources said Monday.

Dispatches from Bukittinggi, rebel mountain capital, said 300 troops of the Central government landed Friday at Bengkalis off Sumatra's east coast and captured the smugglers' island.

The American-owned Caltex Oil Co. ordered its producing operations shut down Monday and evicted some dependents of its American employees from outlying installations.

At the same time, the possibility of troop landings on Sumatra's west coast was seen when the Indonesian Cadia Marine, the Indonesian navy's largest warship, and two corvettes appeared off Padang, 200 miles southwest of Bengkalis, and fired two shells.

Padang is the main rebel center on the west coast and the Gadjah Mada has been reported carrying troops for a landing.

Rebel informants said 4,000 more government troops were on transports waiting to land at Dumai, an oil terminal.

Sutherland Man Dies At Age 85

John C. Johnson, 85, died at his home in Sutherland Sunday evening.

He was born March 14, 1872, at Seymour, Wayne County, Iowa, and was married to Rilla Haines, Jan. 17, 1894. She died last December.

Eisenhower's Portrait In Texas Club Slashed

HOUSTON, Tex. — An oil portrait of President Eisenhower was found slashed in the exclusive Houston Club yesterday and a note found on the picture said "We don't like Ike in Texas."

Henry G. Barbour, club manager, told police he found the picture slashed. Barbour, who valued the painting at more than \$1,000 said it had been in the club 10 days and was sent to the State Capitol in Austin. The portrait was by Boris G. Jordan of Washington.

The slash in the 36x36 inch painting extended about 12 inches across the upper part of the President's face.

Fire Sweeps Hospital Scheduled For Razing

LINCOLN, Neb. — The old main building at the Lincoln State Hospital, due to be razed later this month, and an adjoining annex were swept by fire Sunday.

The 383 patients in the buildings, some confined to beds, were evacuated less than 20 minutes and there were no injuries.

Fire Chief E. P. Feaster said the blaze may have been caused by faulty wiring in the attic of the building.

The 88-year-old building, long considered a fire trap, was to be razed this month. Preparations were under way for removal of the patients to other quarters when the fire broke out.

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Cuban President Readies Forces To Crush Revolt

HAVANA, Cuba — With heavily armed government forces on guard, Cuba's industry and commerce operated normally Monday despite rumblings rebel leader Fidel Castro might call a general strike.

Some rebel informants said Castro may wait until the end of the month to call the strike — which he says is his "ultimate weapon" to topple the regime of President Fulencio Batista. There were no signs Monday morning that a general strike was imminent.

The rebel informants said there is "considerable work yet to be done in sabotaging business industrial and transport enterprises to assure a firm groundwork for a successful strike."

Batista has ordered 7,000 policemen and 22,000 troops to break whatever strikes necessary to break a strike and crush any outbreaks on this 6th anniversary of his last military coup.

Ike Denies "Schemes"

3. Chairman Blatnik (D-Minn.) of the House Public Works Committee said he will introduce legislation to push public works projects for which money is available. The bill is similar, he said, to one being pushed in the Senate by Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas.

Johnson gave no sign that presidential criticism had deflected him from a determination to set up a Public Works Administration to plan job-giving projects for development if employment fails to pick up later in the year.

Eisenhower expressed concern over what he called the "outrageous" use of pump-priming schemes such as setting up of huge federal bureaucracies of the PWA and WPA type.

That kind of talk, he said in his letter to Republican congressional leaders, "evidences lack of faith in the inherent vitality of our free economy and in the American as an individual."

Johnson replied that Eisenhower had showed only "partial reaction" to congressional calls for action to end the recession, adding that "the details of the Eisenhower plan—priming are not clear."

Eisenhower said Secretary of Labor Mitchell will submit this week a proposal for a federal extension of state unemployment payments.

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Legislators Seek Views Proposed Changes In Fish, Game Laws To Be Talked At Ron-Gun Club's Meet

The committee is scheduled to visit six other Oregon cities. The interim group will meet in Medford Tuesday, Coos Bay and Coquille Wednesday, Newport Thursday and Tillamook and Astoria Friday.

Members of the committee are Kelsay, Sens. Andrew Nathaniel of Newport and Walter Leth of Salem; Reps. Robert L. Elfstrom of Salem and Ole Grubb of Bend. After the seven meetings have been held, the committee will report to the governor and the next legislature to make specific recommendations on their findings.
