Oregon Slatsmen Sweep Top Places

GOVERNMENT CAMP, Ore. — Oregon skiers ended the three-year Idaho domination of the Northwest Ski Assn. combined junior championships here Sunday by making a clean sweep of the meet's top places.

The first two places in the junior expert men's and women's combined were captured by Oregon youths. The women's list was headed by the skiing Saubert sisters of Lakeview, Joan and Jean. Terry Skjersaa, Bend and Joe Darr, Government Camp, led the boys.

Joan won the women's combined crown by 38 of a point. She edged out her sister by four tenths of a second in Sunday's downhill event. Skjersaa placed third in the downhill and second in the slalom to beat Darr by a point.

Meet Largest

The meet was the largest ever held on Mount Hood with 170 youngsters participating.

Mike Buckley of Seattle won the downhill race for junior expert men. Ed Ward, McCall, Idaho, who won the junior expert men's slalom Saturday, was disqualified for the slalom.

Twelve-year-old Karen Vance of Spokane, who placed first in the women's expert slalom Saturday, was third in both the downhill event and combined standings.

The Saubert sisters, Skjersaa and Darr won places on the PNSA team for the junior nationals at Winter Park, Colo., March 20-23.

Sunday's downhill event was marred by accident with five racers suffering possible fractured legs and ankles. They included George Cleveland, Bend; and Tinker Randall, Portland.

Nation's Forests Open To Hunters, Anglers

WASHINGTON — The forestry industry reports that 68 per cent of its privately owned timberland is open to the nation's hunters.

A survey made by the American Forest Products Industries, Inc., showed that nearly 70 per cent is open to fishing and to camping and picnicking. The association said that a large portion of its tree-farming members are taking steps to provide recreation areas on their lands.

"That's why, under the free farm concept, we can have the wood we need as well as the outdoor recreational values cherished by every American," the association said.

Roseburg Cagers Back At Practice

After a short layoff since winning a state tournament berth, Roseburg's basketball team was back hard at practice this week preparing for its trip to Eugene for the A-1 tourney which begins a week from Tuesday night in MacArthur Court.

Drawing for opponents was to be decided Monday in Portland, where representatives of each school will meet to receive opponents.

Actually, the team returned to the gym for the first time since qualifying for the state tournament a weekend ago at Coos Bay, last Thursday. On Friday the team had a picture-taking day, and players donned game uniforms for the official tournament team picture.

In readying a Roseburg basketball team for its first state tournament appearance in 18 years, Indian Coach Bill Harper has been putting the squad through both offensive and defensive drills in hopes of readying both departments.

Daily practices are scheduled for this week, all of them designed to put the keen edge back on the players that gave them second place in league standings behind the Springfield Millers.

The Indians finished league play with the best defensive mark of the six teams, but finished only third in total offense. This latter point will be the object of much of the work.

\$1,250,000 Bout Bid Fails To Lure Marciano

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — When Rocky Marciano retired as world's heavyweight boxing champion he meant it and an offer of \$1,250,000 to fight Floyd Patterson won't entice him back into the ring.

The big purse reportedly was offered Marciano by Jack Kearns, former manager of Jack Dempsey. Kearns said he talked to Marciano when the former champion was master of ceremonies at a sports show here.

"I don't have any desire to return to boxing," Marciano said. "I'm very fond of Jack Kearns. I'm grateful for his offer. But I turned down one of three million not so long ago."

Washington Sportsmen Seek Fish Law Change

PULLMAN, Wash. — A group of Eastern Washington sportsmen called on Gov. Rosellini Sunday to negotiate with Oregon in an effort to have the steelhead trout in the Columbia River declared a game fish and make the sale of steelhead caught in the river illegal.

The sportsmen made their appeal in a resolution adopted at a meeting of the Eight-County Sportsmen's Assn.

Oregon, unlike other states visited by the big ocean-going trout, considers the steelhead a food fish and allows it to be caught commercially, subject to regulations.

In other recommendations for the 1958 hunting season, the group asked an additional two weeks of pheasant shooting more than the five weeks allowed in Washington state last year. They also asked that the season be divided into two parts, Oct. 12-Nov. 2 and Nov. 17-Dec. 7.

Idaho's Gary Simmons Given Team's Award

MOSCOW, Idaho — Capt. Gary Simmons of the upset-minded Idaho basketball team was elected the team's most valuable player Saturday night at an awards meeting for the second straight year.

The Ron White Memorial Trophy was given to him. The Jay Gano Award as the most inspirational player went to junior guard Whaylon Coleman.

The awards were presented during halftime of the Idaho-Oregon State game.

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
