Hanford Workers Have Good Accident Record

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP)—The 1,600 employees of the chemical processing department at the Hanford atomic works have completed 3,250,000 man hours of work without a disabling injury.

The General Electric Co., prime contractor at Hanford for the Atomic Energy Commission, announced the statistics Tuesday and said the department has won the company's highest safety award.

GE said the chemical industry as a whole has an accident frequency rate of 34 injuries per million-man hours worked while the rate at Hanford is only .30.

Restaurant Assn. Official To Stop Day In Roseburg

Officials of the Washington State Restaurant Assn. will stop briefly in Roseburg March 19 as part of a three-day flying tour of some 25 Northwest cities.

POTATO PRICES UP

PORTLAND (AP)—Potato prices to growers rose sharply Tuesday in Central Oregon, the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture said.

Number 1 Russets brought \$3.50-\$3.60 for 100 pounds bulk, after shipping and inspection fees. That represented a jump of \$2.25 over prices received in a comparable period of 1957.

Gov. Holmes Challenges Court's Jurisdiction In Billy Nunn's Case

SALEM (AP)—Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton Wednesday challenged the circuit court's jurisdiction in a suit aimed at preventing Gov. Robert D. Holmes from commuting the death sentence of Billy Junior Nunn.

Nunn is scheduled to die in the gas chamber March 28 for the murder of Alvin Eacret, 14-year-old Klamath Falls boy.

The boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John W. Eacret, argue in the suit that the governor can't commute a death sentence merely on the ground he opposes capital punishment.

Thornton, in his demurrer to the action in Marion County Circuit Court, said also that the Eacrets' complaint doesn't state facts sufficient to constitute a cause to sue.

Thornton asked Circuit Judge George Duncan to permit filing of briefs and then oral arguments. Holmes has not yet announced whether he plans to commute Nunn's sentence.

DAN SMOOT EX-F.B.I. AGENT REPORTS

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Firemen Can't Collect Unless Negligence Shown

EUGENE (AP)—Lane County Circuit Judge A. T. Goodwin ruled Wednesday that firemen can't collect personal damages for injuries received on property where fire is fought unless the owner's gross negligence can be shown.

In making the ruling, Goodwin dismissed a \$20,000 damage suit brought by John Ed McCall, administrator of the estate of Harold Dean, against the Cottage Grove Gas Co. Dean received fatal injuries in a butane gas tank explosion at the Cottage Grove plant in October, 1956.

The Lane County case apparently brought the first court ruling on such a matter in Oregon. Goodwin said he could find no other similar cases in the state in studying a motion for dismissal brought Tuesday by the defense.

Goodwin said, however, many rulings in other states held to the same line as his.

"The weight of authority is that firemen assume the risk and hazard of fighting a fire," the judge said.

He said the exception would be "gross negligence" on the part of the owner. Such gross negligence was not shown in the plaintiff's testimony, the judge held.

Four Hours With Dice Cost Head Of Plant \$22,000

PORTLAND (AP)—Four hours with the dice cost him \$22,000, the president of a bankrupt aluminum shingle company told his creditors at a United States Bankruptcy Court hearing.

Gambling losses had been heavy for years, Louis Korter testified, in explaining Tuesday what happened to some of the assets of Aluminum Lock Shingle Corp. of America.

Asked by Bankruptcy Referee Estes Seedecker to account for \$36,000 drawn from his corporation since October, Korter said \$22,500 was lost playing dice in his office one Saturday.

He said a man named Tony, whom he did not further identify, came to his office and offered to play with a \$200 limit. In four hours, he said, \$22,500 was gone.

Four years ago, he said, he lost \$50,000 gambling in Nevada.

Korter owned 100 per cent of the corporation's stock and said he regarded its money the same as his own, although withdrawals were correctly charged to his personal account.

The corporation went into bankruptcy shortly after a distributor won a \$50,000 judgment on a charge of misrepresentation. Other court actions seeking a total of \$875,000 are pending.

In its bankruptcy petition, the corporation listed assets of \$192,000 and debts of \$221,000.

William Kennedy, named trustee for the creditors, said the corporation's troubles started when it lost a suit over patent rights.

Korter founded the company in 1947.
