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Survivor Of Third Attack Wave Nuclear War Victor

By ROBERT TUCKMAN HONOLULU — The victor in an all-out nuclear war would be the side that could go on fighting after the third wave of attacks, says American top air commander in the Pacific.

Gen. Laurence S. Kuter, commander in chief of U.S. Pacific Air Forces, told that to newsmen Tuesday night in a briefing.

Discussing Soviet capabilities in the Far East, he said the Russian Air Force has an "impressive" jet age force with 200 primary fields in the area and 300 others with limited facilities.

He said the United States does not have sound or firm intelligence on Soviet missiles but "we do expect missiles will add to the threat to the free world in the Pacific at an early date."

Replying to a reporter's question as to whether both sides might be wiped out in initial thermonuclear attacks, Kuter said he discounted the idea.

Lot Of Devastation
The first wave, he conceded, would carry a "lot of devastation" but the second and third waves would be smaller.

"I don't feel we'll have had it."

nor that they will have had it on the first wave," he said.

"We are confident that our first wave will dispatch a substantial portion of our strength," he said.

"We are not going to be pinned on the ground."

He said it is "not likely that there will be further limited or local war. I see no reason to believe it would get out of hand."

American aid to friendly Pacific nations eventually will build up to the combined air strength in the Pacific, he said. The indigenous air forces in the Far East and Southeast Asia are scheduled to total about 80 squadrons, or double the number of American squadrons in the area, he said. He set no time for realization of this goal.

Kuter said Asian air forces "individually would not be impressive but collectively would be significant indeed. He described the Nationalist Chinese force on Formosa as currently the biggest, with Japan's fledgling air force potentially the biggest.

Pilots Blamed For Plane Crash

WASHINGTON — The Civil Aeronautics Board said today the captain of a Northeast Airlines plane which crashed on Rikers Island, N.Y., the night of Feb. 1, 1957, "did not demonstrate the skill and care required of an airline pilot."

The plane, with 101 persons aboard, crashed and burned shortly after taking off from LaGuardia Field, N.Y., on a flight to Miami.

Twenty of the 95 passengers received fatal injuries. 25 passengers were hurt slightly. The pilot, copilot and flight engineer were uninjured.

Both the pilot, Alva A. R. Marsh, and the copilot, Basil S. Dixwell, had been flying for Northeast for more than 14 years. The flight engineer was Angelo V. Andon.

World's Geniuses Low In Character, Medic Declares

LOS ANGELES — Almost all the world's geniuses have been alcoholics, narcotic addicts, tuberculars or mentally unstable, says a former president of the British Royal Society of Medicine.

Dr. V. B. Green-Armstrong said in an interview while here to address the International Congress of Surgeons that his four-year study of genius showed:

"Practically all geniuses were under 5 feet 3 inches in height."

"Nearly all were either impotent or had little sex instinct."

"Almost none produced offspring of genius stature."

"There have been no women geniuses."

"There is no doubt that defective parentage has something to do with the creation of genius."

He said short-statured geniuses included Lord Nelson, Shakespeare, Picasso and Einstein, and among tubercular geniuses were Voltaire, Chopin, Moliere, Euclid, Raphael, Schiller and Shelley.

Best Work Late in Life

"It is interesting," Dr. Green-Armstrong said, "that most tubercular geniuses produced their best work about six months before they died."

As for his conclusion that there have been no classic examples of women geniuses, he said: "God or providence provides women with one factor of creative genius: to have babies."

Dr. Green-Armstrong said geniuses possibly resort to alcohol or narcotics for the added stimulus it gives them to attain a "diamond" personality, which is unattainable in nongeniuses.

Observing that medical science is making great strides in conquering disease, Dr. Green-Armstrong said: "The quantity of genius is bound to deteriorate or lessen."

Bomb Dropping Scars Britons

LONDON — The accidental dropping of an unarmed atomic bomb on a house in Florence, S.C., stirred up black headlines today in Britain, where American planes carry nuclear bombs on patrol flights.

Opposition Laborite members likely will bring up the accident in the House of Commons in their campaign for a cessation of H-bomb-carrying flights by American planes based in Britain.

The bomb was dropped from a B47 jet bomber, the same plane the U.S. Air Force uses here.

Prime Minister Macmillan told Laborite critics recently that if a U.S. Air Force plane carrying an H-bomb crashed in Britain, there would be no danger of an atomic explosion. Press accounts of the accident in South Carolina stressed there was no nuclear explosion.

While agreeing with the government that American planes are needed here as part of the West's nuclear deterrent against Communist aggression, Labor party leaders have demanded that the planes make their patrol flights with dummy bombs—at least until after an East-West summit conference.

Effect Of Interstate Highway On Cities Topic

SALEM — The effect of the interstate highway program on cities will be discussed in Portland March 24-25 at the Northwest Regional Highway Conference, state Highway Engineer W. C. Williams said.

The meeting, sponsored by the American Municipal Assn., will include officials of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana.

Those taking part will be representatives of the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, the state Highway Commission, cities and counties.

Much Construction Now Planned For Nevada

RENO, Nev. — The Army engineers report almost five million dollars worth of military construction is planned in Northern Nevada during the next several months.

More than two million dollars will be spent at Stead Air Force Base here for a new commissary, bachelor officers' quarters and water supply improvements.

Extensive building is scheduled at Air Force radar stations in Fallon, Winnemucca and Tonopah.

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John Doe was charged with conducting a gambling house at his home. Richard Roe was subpoenaed as a witness for the state. During the trial, Richard Roe was asked whether he had ever visited John Doe's home. Richard refused to answer the question on the ground that the answer would tend to incriminate him. The court directed him to answer, but he declined to do so. Roe was arrested for contempt. Was Roe within his rights in refusing to answer this question? It would appear that Roe was correct in declining to answer.

In recent years the 5th Amendment to the United States Constitution has been under attack. This is the amendment which includes, among other provisions, the privilege against self-incrimination. Widespread notoriety and publicity of recent investigations by legislative committees have made this privilege the subject of considerable controversy.

The privilege against self-incrimination permits a person to refuse to testify as a witness in any criminal or civil court proceeding if he can establish that the testimony called for might cause him to be punished for violation of a criminal law. He may refuse to testify about his past activities which might have been unlawful. In this country the privilege against self-incrimination exists in the federal constitution and in all but two state constitutions and by statute or court decisions in those two states.

Terms Set Out

A witness cannot refuse to answer a question which would merely tend to disgrace him or harm his reputation. Questions can be avoided by use of the 5th Amendment privilege only if the witness can establish that the answer would constitute a disclosure of part of a chain of events establishing a

criminal act. If he cannot do so, but still refuses to answer, he may be held in contempt of court.

The accused in a criminal case has the option to stay off the stand altogether, or to testify, by volunteering to take the stand as a witness. It is generally held that if he volunteers to testify, he will answer all relevant questions about the charge against him for which he is on trial.

The courts have held that the privilege is available to protect the witness himself and not a third person. Therefore, one cannot refuse to testify on the ground that his answer might incriminate another.

Many have concluded that the historical basis for the privilege no longer exists and that the protection against self-incrimination serves only to protect the guilty. On the other hand, many contend that the privilege protects the individual against the abuses of a police state.

KENNEDY TO VISIT

WASHINGTON — C. Girard Davidson, Oregon Democratic national committeeman, has announced Sen. Kennedy (D-Mass.) will visit Oregon next month.

Davidson, said Kennedy, frequently mentioned as the possible Democratic nominee for president in 1960, will address a Lane County Democratic fund-raising dinner in Eugene April 27. He will speak to Portland State College students April 28.

Sen. Thye Loses Fight In Senate

WASHINGTON — Sen. Thye (R-Minn.) lost a bitter fight in the Senate Tuesday to block Secretary of Agriculture Benson's plans to lower dairy price supports April 1.

The Senate refused to suspend its rules to permit action on his proposed rider — to a \$2,809,463-718 supplemental money bill — to freeze dairy supports at current levels of \$3.25 per hundredweight.

The vote was 30 for Thye's motion, 59 against. A two-thirds majority was required since the motion involved legislation on an appropriations bill.

The Senate Agriculture Committee has approved a separate bill to freeze dairy price supports at 1957 levels as well as a second measure freezing price supports of dairy and other supported commodities at last year's levels.

Proponents of the dairy freeze are fearful the President may veto a separate bill. And they say that the freeze for all crops may be given greater invitation to veto.

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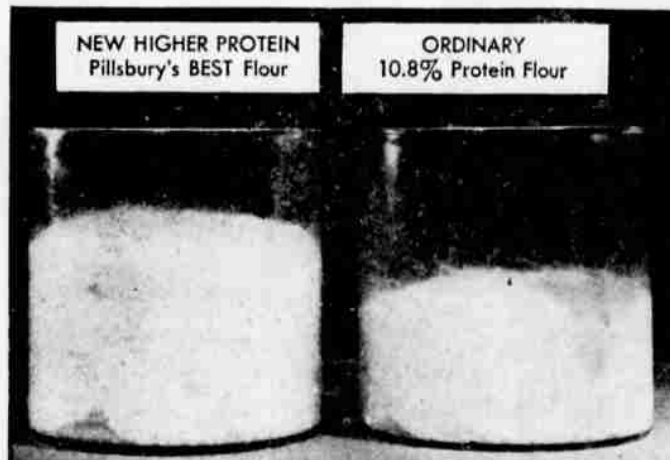

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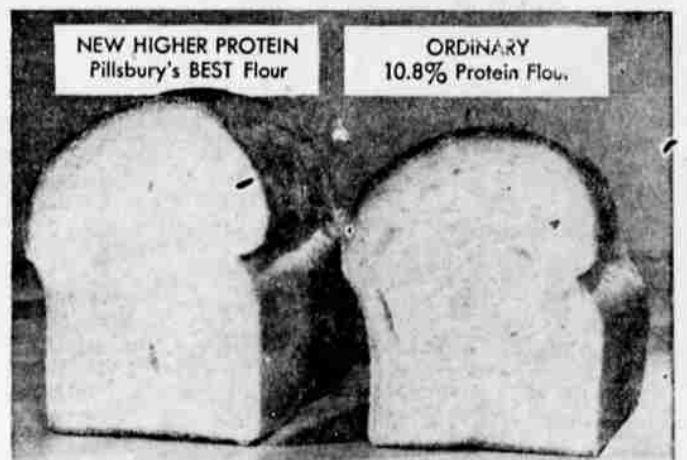
