Revolutionary No-Roll Pie Perfected; Technique Told

No-Roll Pastry Makes Pie Making Easier Than Pie.

Someone once said that the way to keep a husband happy is to serve pie at least once a week, which may be the reason why so many cooking schools begin their lessons with pie.

Shown here are step-by-step techniques in making a modern pastry, an ever so easy no-roll method. The pastry is made with corn oil, which gives the shell a golden light color and a tender crumb. Although the pastry is perfect for any pie you might want to make, the luscious lemon meringue pie shown is appropriate for this particular season.

Lemon pie is an especially good choice to follow a lenten fish dinner, or to perk up any winter meal. Since lemon meringue pie is America's first choice among one crust pies, you can hardly go wrong in making one.

In making a lemon pie, it is important to use a reliable recipe, such as the one here and to follow it carefully. Note that the lemon juice is added after the mixture is cooked. Adding the lemon juice during cooking makes a thin, runny filling. For a strong lemon flavor, instead of adding additional lemon juice, add extra grated lemon peel. Cool filling without stirring to room temperature, then turn it into the baked shell.

Lemon Meringue Pie
1 recipe No Roll Pastry
4 tablespoons corn starch
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups water
3 egg yolks
2 tablespoons butter
1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon peel
5 tablespoons lemon juice
Prepare baked 9-inch shell. Mix corn starch, salt and 1/2 cup of the sugar in the top of a double boiler. Gradually add water. Place over

boiling water; cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Cover and cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Do not remove from heat. Mix egg yolks with remaining 1/2 cup sugar; stir in small amount of hot mixture. Immediately pour back into remaining hot mixture over boiling water; blend thoroughly. Cook 2 minutes longer stirring constantly. Remove from heat; add butter or margarine, lemon peel and juice. Cool to room temperature without stirring. Turn into shell.

No Roll Pastry
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 1/2 teaspoons sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup corn oil
2 tablespoons cold milk
Sift dry ingredients into pie pan. Combine corn oil and milk in measuring cup. Whip with a fork and pour all at once over the flour mixture. Mix with a fork until flour is completely dampened. Press evenly and firmly with fingers to line bottom of pan; then press dough up to line sides and partly cover rim. Be sure dough is pressed to uniform thickness. To flute, pinch dough lightly with fingers. Always use a low fluted edge. Makes one 8 or 9-inch pie crust.

Baked Shell: Prick entire surface with a fork. Bake in 325 Degrees F. 12 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool.
For Pies Baked in Shell: Prepare filling then prepare pie crust. Fill shell and bake pie in a hot oven (400 Degrees F.) 15 minutes; reduce to moderate (350 Degrees F.) and bake until crust is lightly browned and filling tests done.
Meringue
3 egg whites
6 tablespoons sugar
Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry; gradually beat in sugar. Spread meringue lightly on filling. Bake in slow oven (325 Degrees F.) 15 to 20 minutes.

PUSHING: Press dough evenly and firmly to line bottom of pan. Gradually press dough up to line sides and partly cover rim. Press to uniform thickness. Prick entire surface and bake in a hot oven 12 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned.

Wool Production Increase Is Seen

WASHINGTON — The Agriculture Department predicted Tuesday that production of wool in this country will increase slightly this year, to reverse last year's decline.

Reports show, the agency said, that farmers are increasing flocks under the influence of a government program designed to encourage greater domestic production and to reduce the country's dependence on imports.

Under the present program, the government makes incentive payments to bring grower returns to a pre-announced level. This allows market factors free play to determine actual prices. Officials say this program encourages greater domestic use of American wool and keeps supplies from piling up in government surplus stocks.

But the program will end after this year's production unless Congress extends it, as the administration has recommended.

Hyster Co. Completes Merger With Martin

PORTLAND — The Hyster Co. now is merged with the Martin Machine Co. of Kewanee, Ill., and is a Nevada corporation. Philip S. Hill, executive vice president of Hyster, said here that the merger—which was fought by a minority stockholder group—had been accomplished. He said it would make no apparent difference in the Portland operation of the company, unless there is some expansion to include the Martin traders.

Hyster manufactures like equipment.

No Banners Fly To Mark Coronation Anniversary

VATICAN CITY — For the first time since Pope Pius XII was elected supreme ruler of the Roman Catholic Church 19 years ago, no banners were flown to mark the anniversary of his coronation.

This was in keeping with his decision, taken "in bitterness and outrage" last week, to cancel formal celebration of his coronation in protest against the verdict of an Italian court.

The 82-year-old pope spoke from his throne, set up near the central altar, without mentioning the court decision.

The court decision that prompted cancellation of the celebration held that Bishop Pietro Fiondelli of Prato was guilty of defaming a Prato grocer and his wife. The bishop called them "public sinners" because they refused to be married in the church. They were married in a civil ceremony, which is legal in Italy.

Ft. Clatsop Memorial Bill OK'd By Committee

WASHINGTON — A bill by Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) to establish a national memorial at Fort Clatsop, Ore., was reported out unanimously Tuesday by the Senate Public Lands Subcommittee.

Neuberger said the bill probably will be considered by the full Interior Committee within two weeks.

The National Park Service has estimated it will cost \$200,000 to purchase a 100-acre tract at the Fort Clatsop site, and erect suitable buildings, including a museum. It would be the first memorial supervised by the federal government along the Lewis and Clark Trail, Neuberger said.

Representative Eyes Fish Loss

WASHINGTON — Rep. Pelly (R-Wash) asked Congress Monday to pass a resolution urging an international agreement to abstain from fishing on the high seas in a manner to deplete stocks of fish which spawn in another nation.

"The abstention principle which is recommended is the only safeguard against complete destruction of certain Alaska and Pacific Northwest salmon resources," he told the House.

"Obviously, treaties are the only solution to fishery problems between neighboring nations and other nations which concern joint fishery interests."

The Seattle congressman introduced a resolution which would declare it to be the sense of Congress that such an agreement should be sought by the U.S. delegation to the United Nations conference on the law of the sea, now meeting in Geneva.

LOCAL FARM-FRESH
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Discounting Loans Practice Probe Asked Of Congress

SPOKANE — A suggestion that Congress investigate the practice of discounting loans to home builders has been proposed Tuesday by Thomas J. Richardson, president of the Washington State Building Trades Council.

Speaking at the Western Council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers' convention Tuesday, Richardson said the prevailing discount rate of Spokane lending agencies is 3 per cent but in some places it works out at 10 per cent.

He explained that a borrower of \$10,000 is charged 3 per cent of that amount just for the privilege of borrowing. The borrower gets \$9,700 and then pays interest at 6 per cent on a 30-year mortgage on the entire amount. This, Richardson said, brings the interest charges to more than it costs to build the house.

Richardson also advanced several suggestions for easing the impact of unemployment in the Pacific Northwest and over the country.

He said unemployment compensation should be broadened to cover an additional 12 million workers and unemployment benefits should be increased to at least two thirds of regular take-home pay.

He called for scheduling of unemployment payments for 39 weeks and for legislative appropriations for large home building programs.

He also said there should be more school construction and the minimum wage act coverage should be extended and raised to a minimum of \$1.25 an hour.
