Textron Co. To Close
Down Coquille Operation

COQUILLE — The Coquille plant of Textron, Inc., is being closed down, stockholders were told in the firm's annual report. The plant's income has not been high enough, said Royal Little, Textron chairman. He said three plants connected with the Coquille operation already had been leased to another operating company and others were to be leased. Textron reported consolidated net profits of \$8,626,000 in 1957 compared with \$6,503,000 in 1956. Sales were reported at \$254,515,000 against \$245,791,000 the preceding year. Textron, which operated veneer plants at Bandon and Norway, Ore., acquired the Coquille Plywood Co. plant at Coquille in October, 1955, for a sum reported to be in excess of four million dollars.

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Probers Hear
Rival Stories
About Strike

WASHINGTON — Senate rackets probers heard rival stories Wednesday that the Kohler Co. triggered a near riot which marked the long strike against it and that the demonstration was directed by United Auto Workers officials. Robert Treuer of Sheboygan, Wis., a public relations man for the UAW, told the Senate Rackets Committee he thinks the company itself was responsible for the 1955 disorder. Kohler officials have said they were threatened by a cursing mob. Two Sheboygan contractor brothers, Peter and Cornelius Buteyn, told the committee that Donald Rand, a UAW international representative, had a lot to do with what they termed direction of disorders. A big crowd blocked the unloading of a shipload of clay consigned to the Kohler Co. on July 5, 1955. Treuer testified the union did not incite any violence. The hearings currently are concerned with an incident which occurred in Sheboygan about 15 months after the strike started. Gerard Desmond, a company staff lawyer, said Tuesday "I was in fear of my life" at one point.

Death Sentence
Ex-War Bride
Slayer Of Child

RIVERSIDE, Calif. — A jury has decreed death in the San Quentin Prison gas chamber for a former German war bride. Mrs. Felicia Nicholson, 32, convicted of beating her 5-year-old daughter to death last July, took the verdict calmly yesterday. The same jury that convicted her last Friday of first-degree murder met again, under a new California law, to fix the punishment. The body of the child, Heidi, was found stuffed in a closet of a Riverside motel where the mother had been staying. Mrs. Nicholson denied the murder, saying she found her daughter dead. A prosecutor described her as a "callous, cold-hearted woman who had brutally beaten her child to death because the child got in the way of her good times." Mrs. Nicholson came to this country after marrying an Air Force sergeant. They have since separated.

Cattle Rancher Sought
In Central Oregon

MADRAS, Ore. — Hamley Danzuka, 29, a Warm Springs Indian cattle rancher who disappeared Feb. 14, is being sought by Jefferson County law officers. Sheriff Spencer Summerfield said Danzuka last was reported leaving Madras with two friends on a trip to the Tygh Valley area of Wasco County. Summerfield said the two friends had been questioned but did not give any clues to Danzuka's whereabouts. No concern was felt until recently over Danzuka's disappearance since in the past he frequently has been gone for some time. However Summerfield said, he has never been unreported as long as a month.

Young Writer To Wed Publisher
PARIS — Francoise Sagan, 22-year-old writer of best-selling sexy novels, today married her 42-year-old publisher, Guy Schoeller. The author of stories about broken marriages and illicit love against a gay Riviera background was married by the mayor of a shabby section of Paris. The couple will live in a more elegant part of town. The young novelist said just two days ago there would be no marriage until next week. To avoid being mobbed by crowds of French bobbysoxers and newsmen she had tried from the start to throw confusion into her plans. When asked to name the day, she had usually quoted the French title of her third book, "In a Month, in a Year."

Her three books, her script for a ballet with a daring bathroom scene, and her fast driving which almost killed her last year have made Miss Sagan a symbol of fast-living French youth. Most of the romantic affairs in her fiction are between young girls and older men, and while critics have been increasingly cool to her recent productions, they continue to sell furiously on both sides of the Atlantic.

Earlier Surgery For Ulcers Urged

LOS ANGELES — Surgery, says a Mississippi doctor, can save ulcer patients from becoming "gastronomic cripples." Dr. Lawrence W. Long told a news conference here that many medical schools still recommend surgery for gastric ulcer only if the patient is over 45 and if the ulcer has bled twice. In contrast, Long would recommend surgery at the outset. "I think it is time for the surgeon to take the ball from the internist," he said. "Too often the ulcer patient has been treated protractedly by medication, diet and other nonsurgical means. When, over a period of years, this has failed the patient is finally sent to a surgeon." Use of surgery early in ulcer cases, he said, has become practical because of the great strides the profession has made in general operative techniques. These include the development of antibiotics, the perfection of anesthetics and their administration, and the availability of blood banks.
