## Girl Says Cordry Sniper Who Shot At Her

LOS ALTOS, Calif. — Alice Hardie, 14, says Thomas W. Cordry III "probably" was not the sniper she says shot at her earlier this month.

The school girl decided that Tuesday after watching the Stanford University sophomore drive his white convertible by the spot where she says the sniping took place.

Cordry was taken to the shooting scene from the San Jose County Jail where he is awaiting trial in the killing of 17-year-old Denna Bonn in nearby Palo Alto Feb. 25.

Alice reported an "older teenager" had shot at her from a light colored convertible Feb. 19. Cordry, 19, denied he had ever been in the area.

## Sheepmen Advised To Sell '53 Lambs For Best Returns

Douglas County farmers still holding 1953 lambs were advised today to market soon for best returns and to avoid earlier than usual competition from the 1958 California lamb crop.

J. Roland Parker, Douglas County extension agent, suggested that farmers get last year's lambs to market before they are over-aged and overweight — 115 pounds or more.

Large lamb carcasses now approaching the yearling stage weighing 60 to 65 pounds are being docked \$3 to \$5 a hundredweight in Portland from the price of choice carcasses of 50 pounds or less, Parker said.

A large volume of new-crop California lambs will hit the markets in late March, he added, bringing even greater discount for heavy old-crop lambs. Southern California lambs expected to grade choice or better have been contracted at \$25 to \$25.50 a hundredweight for delivery between mid-March and mid-April.

Parker said the price should bring rapid marketing of 1958 lambs. Closer to the Oregon scene, Sacramento Valley lambs, including "good grade, have been contracted at \$24.

Meanwhile, the current Oregon market is favorable for sale of old-crop lambs to avoid competition with 1958 lambs. Oregon fed-lamb prices are about \$4 above prices a year ago, reflecting the generally improved livestock market, Parker said.

Oregon markets could absorb considerably more lambs now without lowering prices, the county agent said. He added lamb marketing has been running below this time last year. Sheep and lambs still on feed in Oregon Jan. 1 numbered 10 per cent higher than a year earlier.

Farmers planning to market old-crop lambs are advised to check with commission men or auction dealers before shipping to avoid days slated for heavy market runs.
