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Lumber Workers Press Support Of Kennedy Bill

SPOKANE, N.D. — State unemployment compensation laws have proven to be "grossly inadequate," the Western Lumber and Sawmill Workers charged in a resolution Thursday. Convention delegates called on Congress and President Eisenhower to support the Kennedy bill which would impose federal benefits in states as a condition to granting tax offsets. The bill would "provide immediate relief by way of federal supplementation of inadequate state benefits," the resolution said. The convention also recommended appointment of Frank Chapman of Seattle, general treasurer of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, as general executive board member for the council's new 7th district embracing Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, British Columbia and Alaska. Before closing their four-day meeting, delegates urged annual construction of at least two million homes.

Italian Deputies Fight In Chamber

ROME, Italy — Fascist and Communist deputies turned Italy's Chamber of Deputies into a battlefield Friday with a riotous free-for-all fight that left seven persons injured. Communist-allied Socialists and some center deputies also joined in the battle, which erupted as the Chamber considered a bill to give legal recognition to the Italian partisans who fought against fascism in World War II. Such recognition would allow the partisans to claim pensions and other veterans' benefits paid the army. Bloody noses, black eyes and swollen fingers demonstrated the violence of the fight, one of the worst in years in the turbulent Italian Parliament. Four deputies and three Chamber employees who tried to break up the fight were treated at the Parliament infirmary. It was the third violent outbreak in the Chamber in less than a month and the second detonated by the question of wartime partisans. Fascist deputies are fighting recognition of the partisans, many of whom were Communists.

Katzenbach Quizzed In House Probe

WASHINGTON, D.C. — A member of a House investigating committee said Friday he thinks it has not yet "scratched the surface" of suspected influence on the Federal Communications Commission by consultants to Miami's TV Channel 10. Rep. Bennett (R-Mich.) delivered this opinion during questioning of A. Frank Katzenbach, a loser in the contest for the TV license valued at more than a million dollars. Bennett said he thought Katzenbach exercised "very improper" influence on the commission. Spiritually, Katzenbach denied he had done anything improper. "We conducted ourselves in an honorable, ethical manner," he said. There has been testimony of numerous contacts with Congress members and others on behalf of Katzenbach. Bennett said Katzenbach had been helpful in bringing out what had been done by National Airlines.

Loretta Young's Husband Sues For More Profits

LOS ANGELES — Television star Loretta Young's husband accuses her and their business partner of "dishonesty," "mismanagement" and "unfairness." Loretta Young, whose 17-year marriage to the actress has been considered one of Hollywood's happiest, has filed a civil suit to dissolve their company, Lewisior Films, Inc. The company has had a part in producing her filmed show seen Sunday nights on NBC-TV. He alleged that Miss Young and her partner Robert F. Shevaller "in combination as directors and stockholders and president and secretary-treasurer" have "exercised complete control over the corporation to the complete exclusion" of Lewis. Unless the corporation is dissolved promptly, Lewis contended in the complaint, he will be deprived of his rights as a shareholder "due to the continued and additional dishonesty, mismanagement and unfairness" of Miss Young and Shevaller.

Jet Explodes, Debris Falls Over Wide Area

TULSA, Okla. — An Air Force investigation team today was to try to determine the cause of a B47 jet in-flight explosion that killed the pilot and injured two other officers. The wreckage of the bomber fell over an eight-square-mile area in a residential section, narrowly missing occupied homes. None of the residents were injured and property damage was slight. The Air Force identified the dead pilot as Lt. William T. Booy, 27, Kansas City. He apparently was trapped in the nose section of the craft. Injured were Capt. Albert J. Soen, 35, Wichita, Kan., and instructor-pilot, and Capt. John H. Gillick, 32, student pilot on temporary duty at McConnell Air Force Base, Wichita. Both men ejected before the craft disintegrated in flight.

Morgan Objects To SP Ending Ferry Service

SAN FRANCISCO — Howard Morgan, Oregon public utilities commissioner, objected Thursday to Southern Pacific's plan to abandon the last ferryboat service on San Francisco Bay. The railroad now uses two ferryboats to move passengers between its Oakland rail terminus and San Francisco. Officials said Southern Pacific would save \$250,000 annually by changing to bus service over the Oakland-San Francisco Bay Bridge. "There is little doubt in my mind," said Morgan, at an Interstate Commerce Commission hearing, "that the Southern Pacific is building a record in Oregon to ultimately abandon all passenger service there, and I believe that this proceeding (the proposal to abandon the ferry boats) is a part of this general move."

Robert H. Murphy, ICC examiner, gave interested parties 20 days to file briefs and the railroad 15 days to file replies.

Tillamook JP Admits Using Public Funds

TILLAMOOK — Tillamook County Justice of the Peace Walter J. Herd Thursday pleaded guilty to converting to his own use \$3,880 in public funds. Circuit Judge J. S. Bohannon ordered Herd taken to the state hospital at Salem for medical treatment. The judge said he would withhold sentencing Herd until the treatment is completed. Sheriff Hallie Ireland said Herd told him he did not know what had become of the money. "But he knew he had spent a lot of it for liquor," said Ireland. Herd was elected in 1952, and was serving the final year of his six-year term.

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Killer Of 2 Policemen Gets Double Sentence

SANFORD, N.C. — Frank Edward Wetzel, convicted of killing two state highway patrolmen, escaped the gas chamber but received sentences which make it unlikely he ever will be free again. The 26-year-old Seneca Falls, N.Y., defendant, straight-faced but pale when he rose to hear the verdict, relaxed when a superior court jury recommended Thursday that he be given life imprisonment for slaying Patrolmen J. T. Brown. Judge George M. Fountain immediately passed sentence, and specified that it should begin at the end of a life sentence. Wetzel already was serving for the murder of trooper Wister Lee Reece. Wetzel, who had a long record as a petty criminal in New York state, was convicted last January at nearby Rockingham of murdering Reece. The jury then recommended mercy and Wetzel was sentenced to life.

Sec. Dulles Confers With Chiang Kai-shek

TAIPEI, Formosa — Secretary of State Dulles today conferred with President Chiang Kai-shek after opening a meeting of 11 U.S. ambassadors to Far Eastern nations. Dulles flew to Formosa for a 13-hour stay on the way back to Washington from the Manila SEATO meeting. He is scheduled to take off for home just after midnight. Before the first of two meetings with Chiang, Dulles issued a statement saying Nationalist China "is a major and indispensable part of the free world defense partnership against Communist expansion." "The United States continues steadfast in its support of the Republic of China."

Gov. Holmes Receives Two Trees From Ohio

SALEM — Gov. Robert B. Holmes Thursday received two trees from the governor of Ohio as a tribute to the University of Oregon football team's performance in the Rose Bowl. Gov. Holmes beat a Douglas fir against a buckeye tree that Oregon would beat Ohio State in the bowl. Gov. Holmes paid off, but because Oregon lost only 10-7, the Ohio governor sent Holmes a tulip tree and a buckeye tree.

Man Throws Children Into Frigid Ohio River

WHEELING, W.Va. — A 33-year-old steelworker told authorities at nearby Wellsburg last night that he had thrown his two young children into the frigid Ohio River from a bridge in Wheeling. After several hours questioning, the Brooke County Sheriff's office said it was convinced that the man, John Turner, 32, of Beech Bottom, near Wellsburg, was telling the truth. Wheeling police said they found foot and hand prints in fresh snow on the sidewalk and rail of the Fort Henry Bridge. They said some of the prints appeared to be those of children.

Theft Suspect Located In State Penitentiary

The sheriff's office learned Thursday that a suspect sought on a petty larceny charge will be easy to find. He is in the Oregon State Penitentiary. Charles Seymour, 28, was named in a Sutherlin justice court warrant Feb. 21 as a suspect in the theft of bedding and dresser drawers from an Oakland auto court. Thursday, deputies were informed Seymour had been sentenced from Lane County to two years in prison.

Leopold Nauseated By Speedy Car Ride

CHICAGO — Still shaky after a fast automobile ride from Stateville Prison, ex-convict Nathan Leopold Friday spent his second day of freedom in Chicago, scene of the crime for which he served 33½ years. Leopold, probably the world's most publicized convict, remained in the Gold Coast apartment of Abel M. Brown, real estate man and his onetime classmate at the University of Chicago. Leopold, a diabetic, became sick at least six times during a fast 40-mile ride to Chicago after his release from Stateville Prison near Joliet. The automobile halted frequently and the 33-year-old Leopold staggered to the roadside, ashen and nauseated. Unless his condition improves, Leopold is expected to remain in the Brown apartment until arrangements are completed for his departure for Puerto Rico, where he is to serve his parole working as a \$10-a-month lab technician in a small mission hospital in the mountains near the town of Adjuntas.

Storm Snuffs Out Spell Of Spring

A heavy snowstorm snuffed out a spell of springlike weather in the northeastern part of the country Friday and caused major disruption of airplane and highway travel. Almost a foot of snow had fallen before noon in parts of Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and upstate New York — and still was falling. The late season storm, coming just six days before spring, was headed across New England toward the ocean and was expected to taper off by nightfall. The temperature hung around the freezing mark, causing treacherous icing conditions on many highways. Operations at Laguardia airport in New York were brought to a virtual standstill. At least 50 flights were canceled. Thunderstorms and strong winds hammered areas in the Southeast during the night but appeared abating. The mid-March storms swept from the Plains eastward along the Ohio River and moved into Eastern sections of the nation. More than 9 inches of snow was reported in Cumberland, Md. Heavy snow also fell in eastern West Virginia, with up to 7 inches in some places.

Leader Of Klan Meted Penalty

LUMBERTON, N.C. — Ku Klux Klan Grand Wizard James W. Cole was sentenced Friday to 18-24 months imprisonment for inciting an Indian riot. Cole, dapper in a dark blue suit and a pearl stickpin in his black tie, but stubble-bearded from a night in jail, stood rigid as he heard the sentence. Former Klan Titan (sergeant-at-arms) James Garland Martin of Reidsville, N.C., convicted with the 33-year-old Marion, S.C., preacher, drew a 6-12 month sentence. Both gave notice of appeal. Judge Clawson L. Williams had kept the Klansmen fidgeting in the prisoners' dock throughout the morning, awaiting his judgment. A jury, out 43 minutes, convicted the pair on the first ballot Thursday.

Mrs. Nora B. Blosser Dies In Local Hospital

Mrs. Nora Barker Blosser, 80, well-known Roseburg resident, died at a local hospital Thursday following a prolonged illness. She was born at Oak Creek, near Glendale, on Dec. 27, 1877. The daughter of Obadiah and Rebecca King Barker, pioneer residents of this area, she was married in 1900 to Roy Troxel, who died in 1925. She married Joseph Blosser in 1931. Her husband died in 1946. She was a life long member of the First Baptist Church. Surviving are one sister, Mrs. Emma Agee, Portland; one nephew, Lloyd Barker, Roseburg, and five nieces, including Mrs. Freda Rudolf, Roseburg. The other nieces reside in Portland and California. Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary on Monday at 2 p.m. The Rev. Dr. Eugene Geritz of First Baptist Church will officiate. Concluding services and vault interment will follow at Odd Fellows Cemetery.

Sergeant's Body Found In Water

TOKYO — Japanese newspapers today began weaving a cloak and dagger mystery around the body of a U.S. master sergeant found floating in Tokyo Bay. The police identified the dead man as Emmet E. Dugan but the Army withheld confirmation until relatives were notified. A spokesman said the man had been missing from his Army intelligence unit since Feb. 4. Press reports said Dugan spoke fluent Chinese and had been assigned to collect information on Red China. He was frequently seen with Chinese friends, the newspapers said. The Army said it "has no definite knowledge that he was engaged in any investigative activity at the time of death. He could have been a victim of robbery, among other things."

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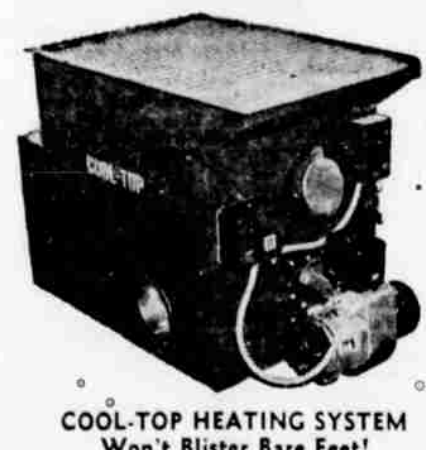
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
