ed valuation of the land or lot value has been increased from \$100 to \$200, should see their tax bill drop from about \$200 to approximately \$175.

**Tax Burden Shifted**  
The change, besides placing a uniform percentage of full value on the tax roll for all types of property, is a shift of a part of the tax burden from residential and farm property to timber and business property.

This program doesn't raise or increase the money available for any taxing district to spend. The total district tax always is established by voters at budget hearings or at the polls.

It does change the distribution of the tax burden between classes of property and between individuals as nearly as possible to comply with statutes and regulations of the state Tax Commission covering ad-valorem tax administration.

**Sumatra Revolt Spreading; Army Garrison Joins**

SINGAPORE (AP) — The fall of North Sumatra's key port, Medan, to a rebellious army garrison touched off speculation today that North Celebes and other island sectors soon would join the spreading war against President Sukarno's regime.

The central government confirmed recent reports that some 2,000 troops under U.S.-trained Maj. Bodo Gold and other island sectors would join the spreading war against President Sukarno's regime.

Obviously alarmed over the turn of events, the central government dispatched reinforcements to the Medan area.

In North Celebes, in east Indonesia, the rebel commander, Lt. Col. Ventje Sumal, was expected to launch an offensive soon. There also were indications the strongly anti-Communist garrison in West Java might join the spreading revolt.

Neutral South Sumatra also showed signs of swinging over to the rebels. A broadcast from the capital of Palembang denounced the government's attack on Central Sumatra, and the South Sumatran commander, Lt. Col. Barlian, held long conferences with his staff on the situation. And in a speech urged negotiations "to halt further destruction."

**Winston Woman Faces Trio Of Police Counts**

A 37-year-old Winston woman was released on \$35 bail Sunday after she was booked at county jail on a disorderly conduct charge following a disturbance at a Winston apartment building.

The woman, who gave her name as Ramona Faye Smith, was arrested by Winston police early Sunday morning after tenants at the apartment building complained of excessive noise. Winston police said she also has been charged with destroying public property as a result of the breaking of two windows in the crowd car which was used to haul her to Roseburg.

The woman reportedly kicked out the windows with her bare feet. Still a third charge, violation of a Winston ordinance prohibiting excessive noise, was filed against her in Winston, reported police.

**Drunken Driving Fine Imposed; Appeal Slated**

Deliberating about 20 minutes Friday evening, a district court jury found Jerry Davenport, Portland, guilty of drunken driving.

As soon as Judge Warren A. Woodruff imposed a sentence, a \$300 fine — Davenport's attorney gave notice the verdict would be appealed. The case was prosecuted by D. A. Avery Thompson.

**N. Korean Reds Return Seized American Flier**

PANMUNJON, Korea (AP) — The Communists today handed back a U. S. jet pilot shot down over the Red side of the Korean truce line.

Capt. Leon Pfeiffer of Kenosha, Wis., appeared nervous and tense but in good health.

Pfeiffer parachuted March 6 after his F86 Sabre Jet was hit by Red fire.

A Sabre Jet flying with Pfeiffer's escaped. The U. N. Command acknowledged that both planes had violated North Korean air unilaterally, but it accused the Reds of making "an unnecessary armed attack."

## Revival Of RFC Will Be Proposed To Eisenhower

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Bridges (R-NH) said today he will lay before President Eisenhower tomorrow a proposal for revival of the Reconstruction Finance Corp. on a standby basis.

Bridges, who heads the Senate Republican Policy Committee, expressed confidence the economy will turn upwards soon. But he added in an interview that the upturn might be threatened if some big business enterprise were to crash financially. He mentioned railroads specifically.

"We have established almost every kind of setup needed to step in and help the economy except one to take care of a threatened crash of a big business, which could have a terrific psychological impact," Bridges said.

"We have provided for small business, we are stepping up public works to help provide jobs and we are providing for the economies of other nations through mutual security."

"I think we should revive the RFC on a standby basis and have it ready for action if it is needed. It saved many situations in the past and it could do so again if it became necessary."

**CHANGING FACE OF THE ARAB WORLD** — King Mohammed V of Morocco has proposed another federation of Moslem nations, this time Morocco, Algeria and Tunisia. He asked that a conference of leaders from the three states be held at "an opportune moment" to outline the form such a union should take. A union along the lines of the recent Egyptian-Syrian and Iraqi-Jordanian mergers has been urged by nationalist circles as a possible counterweight to the influence of Egypt's Gamal Abdel Nasser, now president of the United Arab Republic. Although the Moroccan king has never denounced French rule in Algeria, he has warned that unless a peaceful solution to the French-Algerian dispute is soon found, Morocco could no longer maintain its reserved position. His proposal for the new federation indicates he does not consider France capable of achieving that solution, and that a merger among North Africans may be necessary.

## \$7,800 In Trunk For 'Safety' Found By Prowling Youth

DAVENPORT, Wash. (AP) — Recovery of \$7,800 in currency and four gold coins from a 16-year-old boy who said he found the money in an unoccupied farmhouse near here was announced Sunday by Lincoln County Sheriff Charles E. McCaffrey.

The boy, whose name was withheld, admitted entering the house and taking the money from a tin box in a trunk, McCaffrey said. He spent some of the money before contacting authorities to ask whether or not he was entitled to keep it.

McCaffrey said the house belongs to Mrs. Ed Ahlf, a widow who moved here following her husband's death seven years ago. "The house is still furnished and kept up so I can go there sometimes and sit with my things," Mrs. Ahlf was quoted as saying.

The woman said she knew the money was in the trunk, "but I figured it was safe."

The youth told the sheriff he found a door open at the house on March 6. McCaffrey said all the money except an Indian head penny had been recovered.

A juvenile hearing has been set for Tuesday.
