State Department Correspondent Will Speak In Roseburg

Members of the Umpqua Valley Knife and Fork Club will hear Harrison Wood, an accredited correspondent of the State Department, step out of his usual role of newscaster and reporter to talk on the humorous side of the nation's capital Thursday at 7 p.m. in the Gold Room of the Hotel Umpqua.

The author of several books and a former head of the Paris office of the New York Herald, Wood emphasized in his talks humorous anecdotes regarding Washington's elite in diplomatic, political and social life. He has been quoted as saying that the "acts" which go on behind the scenes in Washington would shame a Broadway comedian.

He has been a reporter in the U.S. and Europe for more than a quarter of a century. Besides his writing experience, Wood has been a commentator for the American Broadcasting Co.

As a speaker, he is described as one of the "first 10" among speakers on the American platform.

The meeting will be the club's "Guest Night," during which members are urged to bring guests. Doors will open at 6:30 p.m. Advance paid dinner reservations only will be accepted.

Explosion, Fire Halt Pleasure Cruise; 1 Dead

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—A tugboat was expected today to start bringing the crippled cruise ship *Arosa Sun* into a Panama port for repairs. One crewman was killed and two others reported injured in an engine room explosion and fire.

All 200 passengers aboard the 16,000-ton passenger-freighter were reported safe. The ship sailed March 6 from Port Everglades, Fla., for a Caribbean cruise to last 15 to 19 days.

Hundreds Take Part
It went on for two hours with police estimating that 300 to 400 students took part. Eventually the water-fighting moved toward the women's dormitories. The men ran into accurate water-bagging from above there.

No one was arrested, and eventually President A. L. Strand and Dean of Men Dan Poling were called to break up the fracas.

Poling said it had nearly run its course by the time they arrived. He estimated 150 students were involved.

Fishery Zone Has Canada's Support

GENEVA (AP)—Canada declared its support Monday for the three-mile territorial limit for coastal nations but asked that they be given exclusive national fishery rights over a 12-mile-deep water zone along their coasts.

Canadian delegate George A. Drew told the 87-nation conference on the law of the sea that Canada favors a 12-mile zone with both national control over fishing, and freedom of the seas up to three miles.

Drew said Canada sought an international law imposing the same restriction in her 12-mile water belt upon trawlers from other countries.

Drew said Canada was "sympathetic" to Latin American claims of exclusive fishing rights up to 200 miles off-coast. But he said their approval by the conference was "most unlikely." He urged Chile, Peru and Ecuador to accept the 12-mile zone.

ABBOTT VS. COSTELLO

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Instead of Abbott and Costello, it's Abbott versus Costello—in a lawsuit.

William A. (Bud) Abbott has sued his former partner in comedy Lon Costello for some \$222,000 in a dispute over a filmed television series they made five years ago.

Todd's Film Tops In Critics' Poll

NEW YORK (AP)—Michael Todd's production of "Around the World in 80 Days" was voted the best film of 1957 in the 35th annual poll of critics, reviewers and commentators conducted by The Film Daily, trade paper.

The technicolor adaptation of Jules Verne's novel, directed by Michael Anderson, received 179 votes to win top place in the "ten best pictures" poll. The picture was released by United Artists.

"Sayonara," based on James A. Michener's romance of an American jet ace and a Japanese dancer, received 162 votes for second. "Sayonara" is a Warner Bros. film.

Following the top two, in order of the number of votes, were: "12 Angry Men," "Peyton Place," "A Hatful of Rain," "Les Girls," "A Face in the Crowd," "Heaven Knows, Mr. Allison," "Don't Go Near the Water," and "The Pajama Game."
