

Seattle U. Upsets Cal, Joins 3 In NCAA Finals

SAN FRANCISCO — Coach John Castellani says his Seattle basketball team will be the next NCAA champion.

"I said last week if we beat Bradley, Wyoming, San Francisco and California in one week, I would believe in miracles," he said Sunday.

"We did it, so now I believe in miracles and that includes Louisville."

Louisville, Friday night's NCAA semifinals, is the next stop for Seattle, 66-62 overtime victor over California in a Saturday night Cow Palace thriller. The independent Chieftains will meet Kansas State of the Big Eight, ranked third nationally. Seattle is ranked 18th.

All America Elgin Baylor, scoring 61 points in Seattle victories over USC and California, unanimously was voted the Western regional's most valuable player. He also stirred a controversy over his defensive work.

California coach Pete Newell said Baylor, four or five times as fast as the ball when it was parallel or in a downward arc toward the basket, Baylor was called once for tending and California got the two points.

Newell called it "ridiculous" not to enforce the goal tending rule "because it specifically states it should be called if there is any doubt."

"There was doubt in my mind on a number of shots," Newell said.

Castellani retorted the rule was "most difficult to call and places a tremendous burden on the officials," he said they — John Morris and Wayne Lichty — did a

"San Francisco whipped Idaho State 57-51 for third place. The region all-tournament team was made up of Baylor, Gene Brown of USC, Don McIntosh and Earl Robinson of California, and Idaho State's Gail Siemen.

Temple, Kentucky, Kansas State Qualify For Playoff

Comes now showdown week in major college basketball for 19 surviving teams.

Regional champions Temple, Kentucky, Kansas State and Seattle are left in the National Collegiate tournament, started with 24 teams. Semifinals and finals will be held at Louisville Friday and Saturday.

There are six survivors in the National Invitation Tournament at New York — Bradley, Xavier, Ohio, Dayton, Fordham, St. Bonaventure and St. John's of New York.

Two more will be topped off tomorrow night. The semifinals are Thursday night and the finals Saturday afternoon.

Here's the lineup at a glance: NCAA — Temple (26-2) vs. Kentucky (21-6); Kansas State (22-3) vs. Seattle (22-5). Winners play for title Saturday night.

NIT — Bradley (20-6) vs. Xavier (16-11); Dayton (23-3) vs. Fordham (15-8). Tuesday night, Bradley-Xavier winner faces St. Bonaventure (20-4). Dayton-Fordham winner faces St. John's (18-6) in Thursday's semifinals. Winners to Saturday final.

Xavier got into the quarter-final bracket impressively, whipping Niagara 95-86, while Fordham romped past St. Francis of Pennsylvania 83-59. Third-seeded St. Bonaventure was a 79-75 winner over St. Joseph's (Pa.) after a first-round bye. St. John's, in Saturday's other game, upset fourth-seeded Utah 71-70.

Game Streak

Temple, riding a 25-game winning streak that is the longest in the nation among major schools is favored to advance to the NCAA final against Kansas State, the big, bruising Big Eight Conference champion.

But the way Kentucky's Wildcats, old hands at NCAA tournament competition, and Seattle, with its great Elgin Baylor, have been playing, there's no guarantee.

The Wildcats smashed a good Notre Dame team 89-56 Saturday night in the Midwest regional final at Lexington, Ky. Seattle first snapped San Francisco's 20-game winning streak on Baylor's 35-foot jump shot at the buzzer, then rode Charlie Brown's clutch play to a 66-62 overtime victory over California in the Far Western regional.

Temple, led by All America Guy Rodgers, crushed Dartmouth in Saturday's title game 69-50 of the Eastern regional at Charlotte.

Kansas State, with three regu-

lars 6-8 or more, overpowered Oklahoma State 88-57 in the Midwestern regional final at Lawrence, Kan.

The two small-school national crowns were determined over the weekend. South Dakota won the NCAA small college title, defeating St. Michaels (Vt.) 75-51 at Evansville, Ind., and Tennessee State won the NAIA championship for the second straight year, downing previously unbeaten Western Illinois 85-73 in the windup of a week of play at Kansas City.

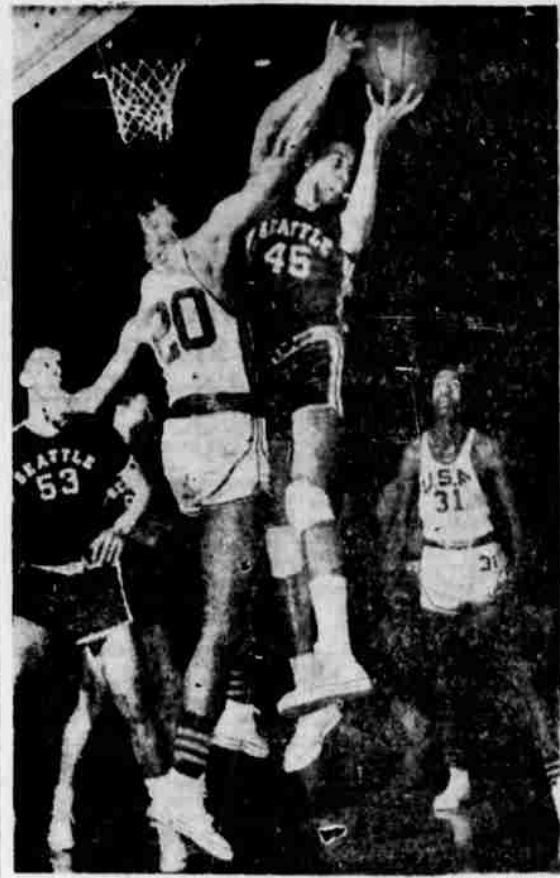

Northwest League Approves Schedule

PORTLAND — A 126-game Northwest League schedule was approved for the coming season by league officials Sunday. The season will open April 24 with the second half starting July 1. Eugene will play at Salem. Lewiston at Yakima and Tri-City at Wenatchee in the openers. Eugene will be at Tri-City and Yakima at Lewiston in other home openers April 29. The Eugene opener will be played May 6 with Tri-City visiting.

Spring training, according to representatives of the six clubs, will start April 6 with Eugene at Lodi, Calif., Salem at Clarkston, Wash., Lewiston at Home, Wenatchee at Laredo, Tex., Tri-City at San Bernardino, Calif., and Yakima at home.

League President James M. Fleishman reported that certain Victoria, B.C., interests have expressed the desire to join the league in 1959. He did not identify them, but they are considering construction of a new ball park in the British Columbia capital.

Northwest Ball Teams Among Attendance Top

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Figures released Saturday by George M. Treutman, president of the National Assn. of Professional Baseball Leagues, show a number of Pacific Northwest teams among the first 10 in attendance last year in their classifications.

In Class AAA Vancouver of the Pacific Coast League was third with 206,145; San Francisco, now Phoenix, was fifth with 204,532; Los Angeles, now Spokane, was ninth with 200,547, and Portland was 10th with 208,196.

Eugene, Ore., in Class B was third with 78,639; Wenatchee fifth with 59,773; Yakima eighth with 56,718; and Keweenaw-Pasco Richland ninth with 54,761.
