Truman Blames Administration For Nation's Ills

DENVER — Former President Harry S. Truman blamed the Eisenhower administration in a speech Tuesday night, for farm difficulties and the business recession and charged it has led the country "into a position of great international peril." He made a flat bid for Democratic votes in his talk to the National Farmers Union convention. "If you want to improve the welfare of the farmer; if you want to restore prosperity; if you want to strengthen our defenses; if you want to repair the injury that has been done to the international security of the country," he said, "there is one clear-cut thing you can do. You can vote for a Democratic Congress in 1958 and for a Democratic president in 1960."

Results Negative On Underwater Object Off Coast

SAN FRANCISCO — The Navy pounced with destroyers and planes when it contacted an unidentified underwater object in maneuvers off the Northern California coast. But search results "were negative." The Western Sea Frontier announced Tuesday that the contact was made last Friday. The Navy said: "As a result of regularly scheduled fleet exercises, an unidentified underwater object, contact, occasioned the deployment of additional aircraft and surface forces to investigate. The results of the investigation were negative." The search was called off Monday night. The Navy said one of its planes contacted the object 25 miles off Bodega Bay, some 30 miles northwest of San Francisco. The object refused to identify itself and other planes and Navy craft, including 11 destroyers from San Diego, rushed to the area. Planes and surface craft circled a 15-mile square without further contact with the object. On the same day the object was contacted, Coast Guard cutters boarded and searched small boats entering the Golden Gate, using Geiger counters. A Coast Guard spokesman said they were "looking for anything that might be harmful to the safety of the port — either things or persons."

He is survived by his wife, one son, John, of Seattle, and two daughters, Mrs. Velle Broadway and Mrs. L. W. Josse, of Roseburg. Mrs. Broadway and Mrs. Josse left here today by plane for Monterey to attend the military funeral, which will be held Thursday.

Hearing On Claims Of Indian Tribes Continues Slowly

WASHINGTON — Hearings on a demand of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs and Umatilla Indians for more money from the government for about 20 million acres of Eastern Oregon and Washington land continued slowly Wednesday before the Indian Claims Commission.

The tribes claim they were either underpaid or not paid in 1855 when they signed treaties. They do not, however, seek a specific amount.

The present hearings are to determine the extent of the area actually used by the tribes at the time the treaties were signed. Later hearings will determine what, if any, added compensation they should get.

Under the treaty, the Warm Springs Indians received \$150,000 in money and goods for about 10 million acres east of the Cascade Mountains and south of the Columbia River.

About \$200,000 was paid to the Umatillas for roughly 6,400,000 acres. They contend they received nothing for an additional four million acres they also occupied. That claims covers roughly an area extending from Arlington, Ore., east of La Grande, Ore., and south from Pasco, Wash., to Huntington, Ore.

Iraq And Jordan Today Proclaim New Federation

BAGHDAD — The pro-Western Arab Federation of Iraq and Jordan proclaimed its constitution simultaneously in Baghdad and Amman Wednesday. Oil-rich Iraq agreed to pay 80 per cent of the federation budget for the first year. Countering a similar offer from the rival United Arab Republic of Syria and Egypt, the constitution opened the federation to "any Arab state which wants to join by agreement with the federal government."

So far the Arab federation has had no applicants. Yemen has federated with the U.A.R. The constitution, which was drawn up by a joint Iraqi-Jordanian committee, provided for a common foreign and defense policy, a combined "Arab army," and unified diplomatic representation.

King Faisal of Iraq was named head of the federation and supreme commander of the federal armed forces. His cousin, King Husain of Jordan, will stand in for Faisal when he is away and will also command forces stationed in Jordan.

County And State Agree To Dismantle Old Bridge

Douglas County and the State of Oregon have agreed to dismantle and remove the old Ford Bridge, which crosses the South Umpqua River three miles north of Canbyville. A County Court order termed the bridge as being "no longer needed" and set a deadline of Dec. 31, 1959, for removal of the old structure. The state-owned bridge will be given to the county, which then will proceed to raze it. The span has been virtually out of use since last spring, when the new Ford Bridge went into operation on the nearby Highway 99 freeway. The old bridge is located on the old highway.

Dr. Von Braun Holds Audience

DALLAS — Dr. Werner von Braun, the rocket genius, talked for nearly two hours last night and scarcely anybody even fledged. He pulled hundreds of scientists and engineers into his own orbit while telling them:

"About 'the most exciting minutes of my life, kind of desperate minutes' sweating out success of Explorer 1 Jan. 31."

Executions Wave Sweeping Arabia, Reports Indicate

CAIRO — Usually reliable sources say they are in close touch with Saudi Arabia report a wave of executions and arrests there to put down widespread opposition to King Saud's rule.

These reports come at the height of an Egyptian government propaganda campaign against King Saud which attempts to put the Saudi position in the worst possible light. But it is difficult to check the reports, since newsmen rarely get visas to visit Saudi Arabia and the government there has installed tight control over communications.

Egyptian propaganda reports tell of a "Free Saudi" movement in the kingdom patterned after the Egyptian revolutionary movement. The reports say that since the beginning of March there have been a number of arrests and executions of these "Free Saudis," even before President Gamal Abdel Nasser began his denunciations of King Saud.

The reports picture Saud's brother and prime minister, the Emir Faisal, as sulking in his tent in the desert near Riyadh, the capital, and refusing to meet the king or his advisers. Prince Faisal is reputed to be a follower of Nasser.

The Emir Faisal's son, Prince Abdullah El Faisal is said to have left the country because of differences with the king.

Saud's finance minister, Mohammed Sourour El Sabbah has gone to Europe. Cairo's press says, to plead with the Midland Bank of Britain not to publicize documents which may implicate the king in an alleged anti-Nasser plot.

Amos 'n' Andy In 40th Year

Walter Winchell Charged With Promoting Drug Firm Which Mismanaged Funds

NEW YORK — Commentator Walter Winchell and the president of the New York City Borough of Queens helped promote the major product marketed by a drug company which allegedly mismanaged its funds, a court-appointed trustee said Tuesday.

The trustee, J. Raymond McGovern, said \$250,000 invested by 1,400 persons in the Seaboard Drug Co. Inc., was wiped out. The company promoted Mericin, which was said to aid arthritis sufferers.

Winchell and the Queens official, James J. Crisena, said their connection with Seaboard was nothing but routine, legitimate business.

McGovern urged Federal Judge William B. Herliand in a report to declare the company bankrupt. Seaboard spent more than \$800,000 in an advertising campaign to promote the sales of Mericin.

Navy Unveils 'Flying Saucer'

SOUTH WEYMOUTH, Mass. — The Navy publicly unveiled Wednesday a "flying saucer" — its newest air defense patrol device.

Termed the "strangest shape in the sky," the disc-shaped saucer rides piggy-back on a huge radar research plane and is a sky sentinel that can detect and warn of enemy attack over vast distances.

The Radar Flying Saucer — the name the Navy gave it — is expected to bolster greatly the perimeter of America's air defense.

The saucer is a 37-foot wide ramjet, which rotates during flight and is carried by a huge aircraft known as WV2E, resembling a Super-Constellation airliner. The plane was built by Lockheed Aircraft Corp.

The disc can report on objects in the sky from sea level to 100,000 feet altitudes.
