

GILBERT'S "What Young People Think" Air-Minded Youth Ready To Fight, Too

Not long ago we disparaged slightly the adventurous spirit of American youth on the basis of our finding that only a few youngsters want any part of pioneering a trip to the moon.

But there is another side to the coin. Questioning several hundred youths, we find that more than one in four of the boys would like to be an Air Force pilot.

Granted that piloting an air fighter, however hazardous it might be, is much less of an unknown quantity than taking a space trip, the fact remains that a 25 per cent vote for such a service seems high.

It bears out what an air force officer told me recently that the service has plenty of pilot volunteers, although it needs more technicians to keep the service ships flying.

Few Have Flown

Among both boys and girls, about one in fifteen hopes someday to pilot a plane of his or her own. And yet, only one in six of the girls, and one in four of the boys have been in the air at all.

Of those who have flown, the overwhelming majority tell us that they like it better than traveling by train, auto or bus. Only 1 per cent of the boys and 3 per cent of the girls would rather travel by land.

This despite the fact that even those who prefer the air over ground travel have qualms over what they consider the hazards involved.

"I love flying but there is always the danger of a crash," said Jo Ann Whately of New York City. Mike Crozier, 17, of Kansas City expressed fear of running out of fuel during flight.

"It's too expensive," said Eileen Eagen of Yonkers, N. Y. "By traveling at such rapid rates of speed we seem to be missing things," observed philosophical Don Lawrence of Illinois, N. Y. "This is not just with reference to airplanes but refers to a great many aspects of modern life."

Girls a Factor?

Some of this anti-airplane reasoning carried over into thoughts about joining the Air Force. Reasons for not wanting to be a service pilot ranged from "I don't see any room for advancement or self-improvement," to "It just doesn't interest me."

On the other hand, some had practical and idealistic reasons for preferring the Air Force.

"It's better than carrying an M-1 rifle," said a 16-year-old from Indianapolis, beset by visions of slugging through the mud with the infantry.

"I have an obsession to fly a

B-52 bomber someday." 17-year-old Douglas Merchant of Illinois, N. Y., told us.

Perhaps the girls influence some of the boys against the Air Force. About three out of five told us they would not like to see their boy friends flying in service. Mostly, they were concerned about his safety.

"I'd worry," said Judy Markowitz of Passaic, N. J. "It's not a family man job," said Linda Epstein, 17, of Syracuse, N. Y. "He has to be away too often."

Stewardess' Job Popular

"I would prefer other professions but if that's what he really wanted I would go along," said a Fort Worth, Tex., 15-year-old. "He would be doing good for

The girls also feel quite strongly about women as Air Force pilots. About a quarter of those polled felt women should be permitted to join the Air Force as pilots. But only 2 per cent would be Air Force pilots if they could.

"I like flying but not that much," added an Indianapolis lass, 15. "The job of airline stewardesses still has glamor for the girls."

C&H Refining To Be Resumed

CROCKETT, Calif. — Operations of the California & Hawaiian Sugar Refining Corp. will resume with raw sugar from Cuba and the Philippines, the firm announced Monday.

Some 1,500 employees were idled when the plant shut down Feb. 29 because its normal sugar supply from Hawaii ended with a strike of the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's Union against island plantations.

C&H President Donald Maclean said 10,000 tons of raw sugar will arrive in Crockett this week from the Philippines and 14,000 tons of Cuban sugar will arrive in April.

Several hundred warehouse workers at Crockett are represented by Harry Bridges ILWU, but a majority of union members laid off because of the shutdown do not belong to that union.

The company's announcement brings up some problems for discussion.

Extra Money Claimed Needed For Sub Defense

WASHINGTON — The Navy should have an extra 100 million dollars earmarked specifically for future defenses against submarines, Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) said Monday.

"We do not now have the answers" as to how to cope with the menace of 500 Soviet submarines, Jackson told reporters after an all-day closed session of the Senate Atomic Energy subcommittee on military applications. Jackson is subcommittee chairman.

What is particularly needed is research and development leading to "new breakthroughs in detecting enemy underwater craft," he said.

He said he thinks the Navy has good means, including the atomic depth charge, for combating submarines once they are detected. But, he said, "the problem is stealth. It is the inability to detect the submarines and to keep track of them once they are detected."

The lawmaker said it is known the Soviets now have the "capability of launching missiles with nuclear warheads of at least 500 mile range against our cities."

French Claim 300 Rebels Killed In 24 Hours

ALGIERS — The French Wednesday claimed more than 300 Nationalist rebels were killed in the past 24 hours in an intensification of the campaign to stamp out the 40-month-old Algerian rebellion. French losses were not given.

Rebel dead reported by the French included 170 in a big action between Tablat and Champ-lain, 60 miles south of Algiers, 83 members of a large band which had just crossed the Tunisian frontier; about 30 in two local actions in the Orleansville region; 34 in the Braz Mountains southwest of Cherchell and 19 in the Guelma region of Eastern Algeria.

Episcopal Window Dedication Sunday
