Morgan Threatens Charges Against Idaho Power Co.
SALEM — Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan threatened Thursday to prosecute President Thomas E. Roach of Idaho Power Co. if he ignores Morgan's denial of the company's application for permission to issue 20 million dollars worth of long-term securities.
Morgan made the threat in a letter to Roach. The commissioner said newspapers had quoted Roach as saying he intends to ignore Morgan's order.
The company wants to issue the securities to help finance construction of the three dams on the Snake River that were licensed by the Federal Power Commission. The state, however, never has acted on the company's application for a state license to build the dams.
In the letter Morgan said that the law provides maximum penalties of five years in prison and \$20,000 fine for failure to abide by Morgan's order. Then Morgan wrote:
"If you choose to disregard the applicable provisions of Oregon laws, I shall have no alternative but to report your action to the attorney general of this state for such prosecution of your actions as may be appropriate in the circumstances."
"I wish also to remind you that the Oregon laws provide orderly processes whereby any proper party who deems himself aggrieved by an order of the commissioner may seek a reconsideration of amendment of such order or other appropriate relief without the risk of incurring criminal penalties."
Morgan has stated that if the company asks for a public hearing on the securities matter, he probably would hold the hearing.

Legal Bingo Approved By New York Vote
ALBANY, N.Y. — Legal bingo was approved overwhelmingly by voters across New York state Tuesday.
A statewide vote last November approved a constitutional amendment permitting communities to authorize the game so long as it was sponsored by a religious, charitable or other nonprofit group.

Weed Control Methods Save Many Millions
SPOKANE — Weed control methods developed in the last 15 years have resulted in annual net savings of 130 million dollars for industry and agriculture in the 11 western states, a plant physiologist said Tuesday.

3 Convicted In Fraud Paroled At McNeil Prison
TACOMA, Wash. — Three Oregon men, convicted of mail fraud in selling stock for a plywood firm, have been paroled, McNeil Island Federal Penitentiary disclosed Wednesday.
They are Archie Bones, 70, Salem; Roland Montgomery, 40, Hood River; and Alan Wright, 42, Portland.
They were convicted in federal district court of using the mails illegally to promote the Mount Hood Hardboard and Plywood Corp.
Bones, who received an 18-month sentence, began serving time Aug. 1 and was released March 12.
Wright and Montgomery, who received 15-month terms, were admitted last August and were paroled in February.

Rep. Porter To Attend Disarmament Conference
WASHINGTON — Rep. Porter (D-Ore.) plans to attend a world disarmament conference this weekend at Harriman, N. Y.
He said he thinks the discussion group "stands a chance of exchanging facts and ideas which may be helpful in solving world problems today."
Porter, who has introduced legislation urging a halt to nuclear weapons testing by the United States, said he will attend "primarily for my own education."

PLAISTOW, N.H. — As part of its observance of National Library Week, the town library is waiving fines on overdue books.
The library disclosed it has received by mail a book on poultry raising it issued April 11, 1958. At the prevailing rate of a cent a day, fines would have exceeded \$300.
ANOTHER PENGUIN DIES
PORTLAND — A big Emperor penguin died here late Wednesday, the first fatality in Portland's penguin colony since Feb. 2.
The flock here now consists of nine Emperors and six of the smaller Adelines.

Giraffe Eats Way Into Government Red Tape Deadlock
WASHINGTON — A lady giraffe with an unslakable appetite has eaten her way into a new deadlock with the Department of Agriculture.
The department wants to collect \$2,100—mostly for food—from her owners before releasing her from the Clifton, N. J., government quarantine station.
Authorities said it costs as much as \$125 a month to feed her at the quarantine station. The remainder went for housing in a heated barn.
The giraffe was brought to the United States in September, 1956, by a private zoo at Boca Raton, Fla.
The quarantine branch took the view she could be released only to an approved zoological park under acceptable government control. The Agriculture Department said it was afraid the giraffe, although free from disease, might be a potential carrier of foot and mouth disease.
The U. S. Court of Appeals ruled last month that the secretary of Agriculture acted arbitrarily in refusing to let the giraffe move on to the zoo.

Odds Are That Billy Nunn Won't Keep Death Date
SALEM — Billy Junior Nunn is scheduled to die in the prison gas chamber a week from Friday for the murder in Jackson County of 14-year-old Alvin Eacret.
But the odds are that he won't, even though prison Warden Clarence T. Gladden is proceeding with plans for the execution.
The execution probably will be delayed while the courts decide whether Gov. Robert D. Holmes can commute the sentence because of the governor's opposition to capital punishment.
The parents of the Eacret boy brought suit in Jackson County court, which issued a restraining order to prevent the governor from commuting the sentence. This order is temporary.
The case has been transferred to Marion County Circuit Court, where Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton has asked that the suit be dismissed on grounds that the court lacks jurisdiction.
The Eacrets probably will answer Thornton next week, after which there will be oral arguments.
"Since those arguments probably would be held after the execution date, some action would have to be taken to postpone the execution until after the court decides the issue."
Orval Thompson, legal advisor to the governor, said that under the restraining order, the governor couldn't even postpone the execution until after the court decides the issue.
But either the Jackson or Marion County circuit courts could postpone the date of execution.

Affidavit Charges Kohler Officials Shot Worker
WASHINGTON — An affidavit charging four deputized Kohler Co. officials shot a man in a 1954 riot set off a heated row Thursday in a Senate Rackets Committee hearing.
Lyman C. Conger, the company's counsel and one of those accused in the affidavit, angrily denounced the allegation as "a complete and utter fabrication."
"If it's made under oath and submitted to this committee it is perjury," Conger said. He said if anyone makes the statement without the immunity that surrounds congressional hearings "I will sue him for libel."
The committee is investigating violence in the four-year-old strike against Kohler, Wisconsin bathroom fixtures company, by the United Auto Workers Union.
The 1954 strike, in which two persons were killed and several dozen injured, involved another union.
