City Council Changes Sewer Contract Award

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change would have had to have been made even if the federal agency had not turned thumbs down on the steel core pipe.

The council rescinded its earlier resolution approving the bid and adopted a new one at the higher figure. This is to be submitted to the State Sanitary Authority and U.S. Public Health Service for approval.

On the happier side, the Health Service notified the city it had approved the first government payment toward the cost of the sewer project. A payment of \$145,900 out of the government's share of about a quarter-million was okayed.

Petroleum Products Bids
Seven bidders seek to supply the city's needs for gasoline, diesel fuel and lubricants. The council opened the involved bids and voted to submit them to the city manager for study and recommendation. The contract will be let at the next council meeting.

No voices, pro or con, were heard during public hearings on proposed sewer improvements in the city. The council also considered and adopted several additions. Ordinances setting forth the proposed work are to be readied for the next council meeting.

Final approval was voted for three ordinances calling for paving assessments for portions of SE Kane, W. Maple and W. Union streets.

The first reading of an ordinance setting up sewer improvement assessments for a portion of SE Court Avenue was given after it was learned a check of records had removed the validity of the only objections to the forming of the district.

Traffic Hazards Study Set
A study of traffic hazards at the triangle at Diamond Lake Boulevard and NE Jackson Street is to be made by the city manager and police department for report at the next meeting. The study was ordered after discussion of the problem.

The council ordered filed without any action a letter from the Public Utilities Commissioner notifying officials of a proposed cut in service sought by the Greyhound Co. The firm seeks to abandon freight service on passenger buses operating between Winston and Myrtle Point and Corvallis and Toledo. Public hearings will be held in Myrtle Point April 3 and at Newport on April 4.

Dr. Nels Lindell, representing the National Guard, protested to the council the ticketing of guardsmen's cars parked near the armory on SE Washington Street on meeting nights. He said the police department had only recently started handing out tickets and declared he could see no reason for denying the area to parking at night when there are no emergencies calling for the entrance to the medical building and no use for loading zones.

Lindell's request was referred to a special committee which is studying the problem of private driveway parking.

Dulles Says U.S. Would Lose On Russian Terms

HOLLYWOOD — Mike Todd was hailed in memorial services Tuesday as a man who "brought the world together in a motion picture."

The words were written for delivery at noon services at Hollywood's Temple Israel by George Jessel, eulogist for show business greats. The comedian spoke in a gentle, quiet voice.

Jessel quoted from the speech he had planned to give Sunday night at a Friars' dinner which was to honor Todd as "the showman of the year."

Producer Todd was flying to New York for the dinner when his plane crashed in New Mexico early Saturday, killing him and three others.

Excerpts from the speech: "This dark, wily thing that calls himself Mike Todd is a combination of many qualities. He has the tender heart of the pushcart peddler and the audacity of a Roman emperor. Mike Todd—from carnival barker to Connoisseur."

"It has been said of the guest of honor that he reminded us of P. T. Barnum—only if perhaps we picture the mighty Barnum walking on Park Row with Jenny Lind on his arm... and Michael walking on Park Avenue with his Elizabeth and the love light gleaming in their eyes."

"I've known few men in my almost half century in public life who could retain their optimism and shun adversity as easily as he did."

The new Kremlin note was delivered Monday. The immediate reaction of U.S. officials was that its terms would turn the proposed meeting into a spectacle instead of a decision-making meeting to ease international tensions.

Budget Reduced
With an eye toward economizing they trimmed sums of money from several sections of the budget. A total of \$1,073 allotted for typing desks was reduced to \$455. Funds for pupil seating desks were reduced from \$2,500 to \$1,500.

Before arriving at the reduced figures, Walton asked that the typing desks be deleted entirely and that the pupil seating desks be reduced to \$750. His action concerning the \$750 was amended to the \$1,500 figure and the motion asking for deletion of the typing desks did not carry.

Supt. Decker asked by Crook which was the most important, replacement of the typing or seating desks, replied "If I were looking for what would help the student best, I would say the typing desks were more important."

Other Categories
A major part of the evening was spent on the maintenance and repairs section of the budget. The cost of painting the exterior of various schools came under discussion. Consideration was given to the possibility of cutting the totals in this category.

Supt. of buildings and grounds Guy Davis told the committee the district "Did very little painting last year." Committee member Bert Young recalled that last year the committee deleted from the budget the cost of painting the exteriors of several buildings.

Davis went on to say that painting needs build up to where figures get bigger each year if painting is neglected.

The committee voted to move \$1,200 for instrumental music and \$2,500 for athletic equipment, which was listed under maintenance and repairs, to capital outlay.

Monday night's meeting was the third for the Budget Committee. It adjourned at 10:55 and set another meeting for tonight at 7:30 in the board room on the first floor of Central Junior High School.

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Michael Todd Laid To Rest

CHICAGO — A short Hebrew prayer, some verses from the Prophecy, a simply marked grave was the reinterment setting today for the final scene in the whirlwind life of showman Michael Todd.

Survivors of the noted movie and stage producer — following his expressed wishes — brought his remains to Waldheim Cemetery in suburban Forest Park. He had asked, they said, to be buried near his father Rabbi Chaim Goldbogen.

Actress Elizabeth Taylor, giving up the plane berth provided for her, arrived in Chicago with several friends and Todd associates for the funeral of her producer husband.

Still numb from the air tragedy that took the lives of Todd and three others last Saturday, the actress slept most of the way up-right in her seat during the 5½ hour flight from Los Angeles.

Just couldn't sleep in that berth alone," she said. "When I always took a berth when we flew."

Todd's remains were brought to Chicago by train earlier in the day. His son by the first of his three marriages, Mike Todd Jr., arrived from New York Monday night.

Now that the circus travels with only 40 horses and 20 elephants, the huge circus trains are gone. Some of the single performers travel in leased railroad cars, but all families drive their own cars and pull house trailers.

General Motors Seeks Long-Term Union Contract

DETROIT — General Motors Corp. set its sights for a long-term contract Tuesday in formal opening bargaining talks with the United Auto Workers on a new labor contract covering 330,000 GM workers. The union's main goal is profit-sharing.

UAW President Walter P. Reuther, who departed from custom by showing up at the first talks, was under instructions from his union, however, to demand a short-term contract. In the past, Reuther has entered negotiations at later, crucial stages.

Heading the GM bargaining team, Louis G. Seaton, vice president for personnel, said he believed a long-term contract would contribute to stability and public confidence.

GM has not formally rejected profit sharing in advance of bargaining but Harlow H. Curtis, president of the world's largest manufacturing firm, has said the company will not negotiate on ability to pay.

Boat and Trailer Reported Missing

DUTCH PLANE CRASHES

Elizabeth and Juliana of The Netherlands, Europe's two reigning queens, exchanged kisses after the British monarch stepped ashore for a three-day state visit.

Committee OKs Labor, Welfare Department Funds

WASHINGTON — The House Appropriations Committee recommended \$2,961,862.181 in new funds for the Labor and Welfare Departments Tuesday. It said more money will be needed soon "because of current economic conditions and the outlook for the future."

The amount approved by the committee subject to House action later this week is \$11,875,000 less than President Eisenhower requested in what the committee described as budget estimates "far from reality."

The committee criticized the Budget Bureau for not raising the requests prepared last fall and submitted by Eisenhower in January. It also called "inadequate" the administration's approach to national health problems and said the wage and hour division was not effectively ferreting out wage and hour law violations.

The committee's token cut in new appropriations left the two big departments and several related activities with \$215,504,500 less than they were given during the current year. Much of this cut undoubtedly will be restored.

For the fiscal year starting next July 1, allotments recommended included:

Labor Department — \$382,446,800 a cut of \$25,585,800 from the amount requested.

Department of Health, Education and Welfare — \$2,565,080,581, an increase of \$1,356,000, mostly for the National Institutes of Health.

McClellan Sees Need For Labor Legislation

WASHINGTON (D-Ark.) — Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) of the Senate Rackets Committee said today he believes legislation will be proposed as the outgrowth of its probing into the Kohler Co. strike.

"I feel legislation will be considered in respect to mass picketing, violence and secondary boycotts," the chairman said.

accelerating the expenditure of about 300 million dollars during the first months of the new fiscal year starting July 1. Spending at that time would be moved forward from three to six months, Knowland said.

Benefits' Plan Told
As for unemployment compensation, Knowland spelled it out for the first time that the plan is to increase by 50 per cent the number of weeks during which unemployment benefits are paid in the various states.

For example, in states which now pay benefits for 26 weeks, the new program would add 13 weeks.

There is no plan, Knowland said in reply to questions, to increase the amount of weekly benefits now paid by the states.

The new White House plans were reported as it became known that Secretary of the Treasury Anderson has indicated to leading members of Congress that opposition to a tax cut is increasing within administration councils.

Bank Cashier Released On Bail

PORTLAND — A cashier's check for \$10,000 was posted Monday for Clair Ritter, Halfway bank cashier, and Ritter was released from jail.

The bail came from a man who identified himself only as a friend of the banker who was charged last week with embezzling nearly \$100,000 from the First National Bank at the small Eastern Oregon town of Halfway.

He had been in the Multnomah County Jail, held for federal officials since being brought here from Baker last Wednesday.

When he appeared last week before U.S. Commissioner Claire Mundorff, Ritter said he was without money. All of his assets have been taken by the bank which said they were expected to equal the shortage in bank funds.

The man who posted Ritter's bail said that although he was providing the money, he could have gotten it from Ritter's friends in Halfway had he wanted to do so.

Taylor Says Russians Now Arming Satellites

WASHINGTON — Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor says the tipoff to Soviet wealth in military equipment is that the U.S.S.R. now is giving some of its best war goods to its European satellites.

The Army chief of staff, in a censored testimony released by a House Armed Services subcommittee, said for a long time the Soviets "
