Virus Blamed For Fatness In Some People

BETHESDA, Md. (AP) — A virus could be the reason some people get fat, a cancer researcher suggested Tuesday.

This peculiar virus could infect and upset their "appetite" — the appetite-thermostat in the brain. That could make them eat more than they really need, so they get fat.

The fatness-virus idea is mainly speculation. But it has some basis in studies of mice which get fat like humans and suffer human-like diseases, said Dr. Frank H.J. Fidge of the University of Maryland.

Microscopic studies disclose strange dot-like objects in the hypothalamus area of animal brains, he said. Appetite control is thought to be centered in this region. The dots might be viruses which infected the appetite center. The fat mice could be hereditarily susceptible to this particular virus.

Soft Pedal Crime Films, FBI Head Asks Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, wants Hollywood to soft pedal films glorifying crime.

Hoover's appeal, addressed to Eric Johnston, president of the Motion Picture Assn. of America, was sent out over the weekend to Hollywood producers by the Motion Picture censor, Geoffrey Shurlock.

The FBI chief mentioned by name only one movie, "Baby Face Nelson," starring Mickey Rooney. Hoover reminded Hollywood that a law signed by President Eisenhower in 1954 forbids use of the FBI's name in motion pictures or advertisements in a manner calculated to convey the impression that such advertising is endorsed or approved by the FBI.

The letter read in part: "I know you will continue to assert every possible effort to see that the aims of your association are fully achieved, and that the people of America, particularly our youth, are not subjected to films of the 'Nelson' type, merely because opportunistic elements in the motion picture industry appear to be dedicated to the pursuit of profits above all else."

Yemen Claims Arms Confiscated By French

CAIRO (AP) — Yemen today claimed ownership of the arms confiscated by the French from the Yugoslav ship Slovenija and demanded the French turn over the shipment.

Air Force Shoulders Blame For Projectiles

SHEBOYGAN FALLS, Wis. (AP) — The Air Force has shouldered the blame for 20 mm. cannon projectiles that hammered into three homes and fell on village streets Monday night. There were no injuries.

After flying here for an inspection from Westover Air Force Base, Mass., Brig. Gen. Don W. Saunders said: "All the evidence so far indicates that the shells were fired by a B47 jet bomber out of Lockbourne Air Force Base, Ohio. Apparently, for some unknown reason, some rounds left the guns after the plane flew in from the Lake Michigan firing range."

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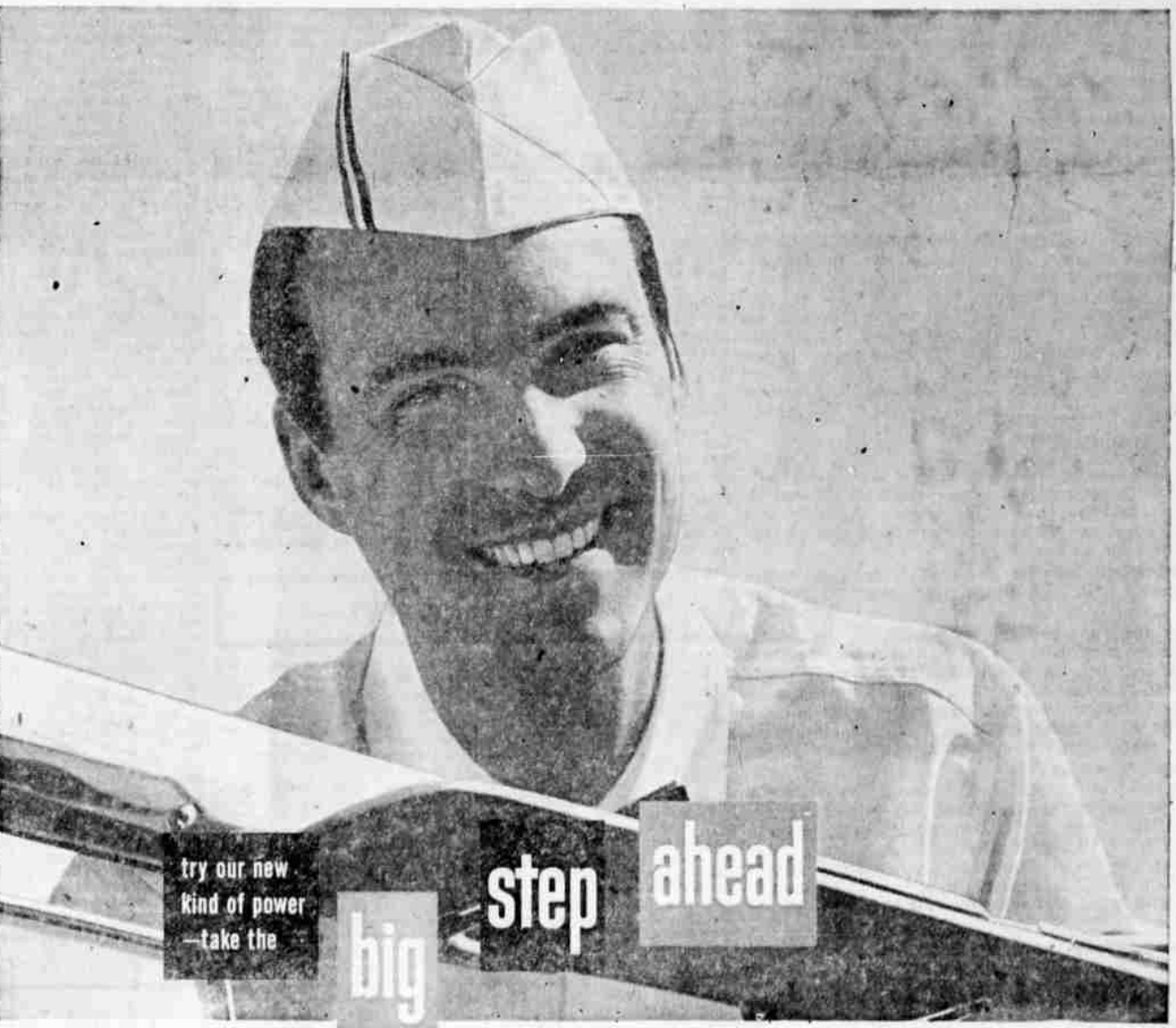
