The day was staged at the Hotel Umpqua in an effort to bring about a closer understanding between farmers and city dwellers.

Ray Hampton, recreation and lands assistant in the Roseburg office of the Umpqua National Forest, called Douglas "a fortunate county." He said it is favorably located between the Pacific Ocean and the summit of the Cascades with favorable soil and water supplies.

He termed all products as "crops" which come from the soil and benefit from water, such as field and horticultural crops, cattle, poultry and timber.

Hampton showed slides to illustrate the bountiful nature of the county.

Woman Rescued After Her Car Goes Into Race

EUGENE — A car hurtled into the millrace on the University of Oregon campus Thursday, but a university heating plant employee saved its woman driver.

Mrs. Marjorie Rea, 38, Eugene, suffered shock but apparently was not injured seriously. She was taken to Sacred Heart Hospital.

Merl Nielson, 37, rescued her. Eugene police said the car leaped a curb and went some 300 feet down a grassy slope to the millrace, between the heating plant and the highway.

Nielson said he knew something was wrong when he saw two men get out of their cars. "I ran outside and saw the car slip into the water," he said. "I threw the tools out of my pockets as I ran to the millrace and swam to the car."

The automobile, he continued, was about halfway across the 40-foot millrace, and "floating, but sinking fast." The woman, he said, "had a death grip on the wheel" and when he couldn't open a door, he swam and pushed the vehicle to the east bank. There, others helped him to get the woman out.

Nielson said that where the car went in the water is 10 to 12 feet deep.

Mickey Cohen Supporting Black Eye After Riff

LOS ANGELES — Dapper Mickey Cohen is back in the courts again, this time sporting a very black eye.

The rotund gambler-turned-florist was arraigned Thursday on a complaint that he assaulted a 28-pound federal narcotics officer.

Howard Chappell, head of the Federal Narcotics Bureau here, said Cohen came into his office Wednesday and charged that federal officers were trying to frame him on a narcotics charge. Chappell denied this.

After some punches were thrown, Chappell told police, "I then took him under control."

New Agreements Allowed Farmers On Wheat Signup

Farmers who wanted to put wheat allotment acres in the 1958 acreage reserve but were unable to sign agreements during the signup period because of fund limitations will have their chance soon.

J. S. Bonebrake, chairman of the Douglas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announced today he had received information that agreements will be allowed soon.

He said the House and Senate have approved a supplemental appropriation of 250 million dollars to provide for additional acreage reserve participation. This will bring the total to 750 millions for the 1958 program.

Action Not Complete
Bonebrake stressed that because agreement on some detailed program provisions must be reached in House-Senate conference, congressional action on the supplemental appropriation is not yet complete. As soon as final action is taken, the county committee will receive notice of additional funds available to accept agreement of farmers in Douglas County.

When notice is received, farmers who requested agreements during the signup period which ended Feb. 20, will be offered the opportunity to sign agreements to place all or any part of the acreage they have offered in the wheat acreage reserve.

Bonebrake emphasized that public notice will be given as soon as additional funds are made available. He said farmers should not attempt to sign agreements until the announcement is made but said information about the program is available at the ASC office.
