TO BUY MATADORS

BOON, Germany — The West German Parliament's defense committee approved Thursday the purchase of 24 U.S. Matador guided missiles capable of firing a nuclear warhead 600 miles.

The purchase does not require approval of the full Bundestag, which voted Tuesday night to accept atomic weapons if North Atlantic Treaty Organization leaders decide they are necessary.
