SALEM, Ore. — State motor vehicles director James J. Johnson announced Friday that his department will require automobile dealers to fill out new forms beginning next Tuesday.

The purpose of the forms is to permit the department to detect unlicensed and unbonded dealers more easily and to make it easier to keep records of ownership of all vehicles.
