Woman Yields To U.S. In Land Fight Of 24 Yrs.

HOUSTON, Tex. — Nearly
two weeks of bite-and-reek ended
Saturday when Mrs. Irene Pearl
Smith Cliett, head of the 703-acre
seceded nation of Eneri, accepted
injunction papers from a deputy
United States marshal.

The 30-year-old Walter County
woman who has been fighting 24
years to keep 250 acres a federal
court ruled belong to the heirs of
a friend appeared voluntarily Sat-
urday and accepted the papers.

Deputy Ellis Binford had tried
unsuccessfully four times to serve
the papers since March 17, when

Mrs. Cliett began a game of "find
me if you can."

Mrs. Cliett's sister, Mrs. Lucy
Mayberry, first kept Binford off
the farm by using a GI spade.
A campsite was established on the
property line and Mrs. Mayberry,
other relatives and friends main-
tained the camp while Mrs. Cliett
evaded Binford by staying at the
homes of friends.

It was Mrs. Mayberry who ear-
lier announced that the farm had
seceded from the United States
and that the nation of Eneri—
Irene spelled backwards—would
fight the United Nations.

After accepting the papers from
Binford, Mrs. Cliett will have 20
days to show why she should not
be ordered off a 330-acre tract.

Mrs. Cliett claims Scott was a
friend of the family but the courts
ruled that Scott, who died in 1933,
was a partner and his heirs were
entitled to half the 703-acre farm.

Some Heartening Victories
Achieved In Cancer Study

BOSTON — This gracious,
graying doctor dies a bit with
every child who does of cancer.
"Not a day goes by but what I
have to speak to parents who have
lost a child. Sometimes it may be
five parents in a single day."

But now and then there are
heartening victories.

"He was 12 years old when he
first came to us in 1948. He had
cancer of the intestines. He was
the first patient we ever gave
aminopterin (an antitumor drug
designed to hit cancers) for this
kind of tumor."

Today he's in the National
Guard, a big healthy guy stand-
ing 6 feet 4 inches. "We kept him
on the drug for eight years. Then
we had a soul-searching meeting
trying to decide if it was safe to
quit giving him the drug. Every-
thing you do in this field is a new
frontier."
