

# State Game Commission Prepares To Release Legal Fish In 5 Regions

Anglers should have a good season this summer if the number of yearling fish to be planted by the Oregon Game Commission during the next few months is any indication of what's to come.

More than 2,310,000 hatchery raised fish of catchable size will be released this summer to supplement the natural fish stocks available to the angler. The vast majority are rainbow trout with a good number of cutthroat and lake trout in addition.

An additional 532,700 yearlings will be stocked, but anglers will have to wait a few years to reap the harvest from them. They represent the yearling steelhead and salmon held at hatcheries but which will be released during the months when the majority can reach the sea without being caught.

The heavily fished lakes and streams in the Northwest region will receive the greatest proportion of the yearlings, followed by the Southwest region, the popular Central Oregon area, the Northeast and the desert country of South-east Oregon.

Northwestern Oregon lakes and streams, which take in the Willamette drainage and north coast, will be stocked with 1,494,000 catchable sized trout. About 300,700 of these

will go into lakes and reservoirs. In this area the heaviest plants will be made in the McKenzie drainage with 113,000. The Santiam and its forks with 102,500, the Willamette forks with 102,000, and the Clackamas system with 108,000.

The Sandy River is scheduled for plants of 76,000, but 58,000 of these will be migratory steelhead. Little Johnson Creek in the heart of Portland will get 4,000 rainbow and 20,000 of the migratory steelhead. Lakes to be stocked heavily with yearling trout include Detroit Reservoir with 100,000, Dexter with 45,000 Lookout Point with 31,000, Clear Lake with 26,000 and Fern Ridge and Cottage Grove reservoirs with about 15,000 each. A total of 104 streams and 25 lakes and reservoirs are on the planting schedule for yearling trout.

Southwestern Oregon waters, which include the Umpqua and Rogue drainages, will be stocked with slightly more than 429,000 yearlings, with the heaviest plants to go into the Rogue Basin. Of 221,000 yearlings to be planted in the Rogue, 89,000 will be rainbow trout, 65,000 steelhead, 50,000 chinook salmon and 17,000 silver salmon.

The Coos River is scheduled for 40,000 yearlings, 20,000 of which

are steelhead and 16,000 silvers. Heaviest lake plantings of yearlings will be in Floras Lake with 12,500 and Tenmile lakes with 20,000. Sixteen stream systems and nine lakes will be stocked with yearling fish during the summer.

Central Oregon Lakes and streams are scheduled for 318,500 catchable sized trout with the popular Deschutes to receive about 104,000 yearling rainbows. Metolius anglers will have 58,500 stocked rainbows and Hood River anglers will have about 40,000 rainbows to work on.

Odell Lake is scheduled for plants of about 50,000 lake trout, 25,000 lake trout will go into Big Cultus and 14,000 lake trout into Crescent. Blue lake is scheduled for 10,000 rainbows. Suttle lake about 15,000 and Olallie lake about 10,000. A total of 27 streams and 18 lakes are on the schedule for plants of yearling fish in the Central area.

In northeast Oregon, 25 streams and 20 lakes and reservoirs will receive the bulk of approximately 337,000 legal fish scheduled for release in the area.

With the exception of Willamette Lake, which is scheduled to be 50,000 lake trout, no heavy plantings will be made in one place, the yearlings being distributed fairly

evenly among all water. The Umatilla River will be stocked with about 19,000 rainbows, 14,000 for the Wallowa River, 12,000 for Cathlamet Creek and 10,000 in the Imnaha. Eagle Creek is scheduled for plants of 14,000 yearlings and the Powder River about 12,000.

The desert country of Southeastern Oregon is scheduled for the release of 128,000 yearling fish, all of which are rainbow trout.

Heaviest stocking will be in the middle and north forks of the Malheur with plantings of about 14,000 fish. About 8,500 are scheduled for release into the Owyhee River and 8,000 into the Donner and Blitzen River. Twenty-five streams and five lakes are on the stocking schedule for yearling fish in the southeast.

These yearlings represent only the fish of legal size that will be planted this summer. Catchable trout going into coastal lakes and streams will be eight or more inches in length, and those planted in other parts of the state will average at least eight inches in length.

The total number of fish of all sizes to be planted by the game commission during the year will probably number close to 20 million, including fry, fingerlings and yearlings.

## AEC Plans To Seek Industry Comment On Uranium Ceiling

WASHINGTON — The Senate-Atomic Energy Committee is planning to seek industry comment on an Atomic Energy Commission report discussing effects of a ceiling on uranium purchases.

The AEC announced Wednesday it is raising the ceiling it imposed last fall on purchases of uranium produced in the United States.

Sen. Gore (D-Tenn.), chairman of a raw materials subcommittee, said the industry comments on the report, also made public Wednesday, would determine whether further public hearings will be held or legislation offered on the matter.

Saying it feared harmful overproduction, the AEC last October set a limit on its purchases of uranium concentrate, intended to level off production at about 17,500 tons a year.

### Expansion Announced

In a letter to the Senate-Atomic Energy committee, AEC chairman Lewis L. Strauss announced an expansion he said would increase annual uranium production by about 2,500 tons and result in increasing milling capacity by about 3,000 tons of ore a day.

The AEC report said the purchase ceiling affected only a limited number of 700 mills now in operation, since it said most had no marketing difficulties. But it

acknowledged that "for the areas and the individuals affected, the problems are serious."

Especially hard hit, the report said, were operators who had developed or acquired ore reserves and now find they do not have a market. The additional market to be provided by AEC accordingly was designated for ore reserves developed prior to last November.

The AEC report listed five areas as having "an adequate market for ore produced from the known mines." These included Lakeview, Ore.

It listed six areas as having adequate milling capacity in general but possibly an insufficient portion available to ore from independent miners. Among these was Spokane, Wash.

## German Terms U. S. Recession Psychological

FRANKFURT, Germany — Economics Minister Ludwig Erhard flew back from a 10-day visit to the United States Thursday and said the American recession is mostly psychological.

"The American people," he told reporters, "have been hit by a psychological short-circuit."

He said he noticed a widespread feeling of insecurity in the United States, but added that this was not the only reason for the recession.

Referring to the flow of goods from American industries, Erhard said: "The saturation point has been reached and the consumer is reacting with a buyer's strike."

Erhard said this applied especially to the automobile industry. He said auto manufacturers and distributors have been "practically forcing their new models down the throats of buyers during the past several years."

Erhard, principal architect of West Germany's postwar economic recovery, said that everywhere he went in the United States, people regarded him as an economic medicine man who could cure almost everything.

He said his recommendation was more government spending, but said antirecession measures should not be allowed to weaken the dollar.

"The U.S. dollar," Erhard declared, "is the standard for all things. We circle like satellites around the sun. What happens to us if the sun no longer stands still?"

### Repayment Contract Set On Crooked River Project

WASHINGTON — Secretary of the Interior Seaton Wednesday said a repayment contract with the Okechobee Irrigation District for return of some of the costs of the Crooked River Project near Prineville, Ore., has been tentatively approved.

The contract calls for repayment of \$1,811,400 for construction work which the federal government has done.

Features of the Crooked River Project include a 200-foot-high, 700-foot-long dam, canals, pumps and other facilities. Cost of the project is expected to exceed six million dollars.

The smaller bid is for a 21.2 mile section running from the Santiam substation to about two miles southwest of Lebanon.

The Bonneville Power Administration Wednesday called for bids for construction of an additional 43.3 miles of the same power line.

The new line, scheduled for operation at 230,000 volts, will be opened next October.

### Senate Group Approves Commission Appointment

WASHINGTON — A Senate judiciary subcommittee Wednesday approved President Eisenhower's nomination of Gordon M. Tiffany to be staff director of the civil rights commission.

Tiffany is a former attorney general of New Hampshire.

Tiffany's nomination, submitted to the Senate for confirmation last Feb. 20, now goes to the full judiciary committee for action. The next meeting of the committee is scheduled for April 21.

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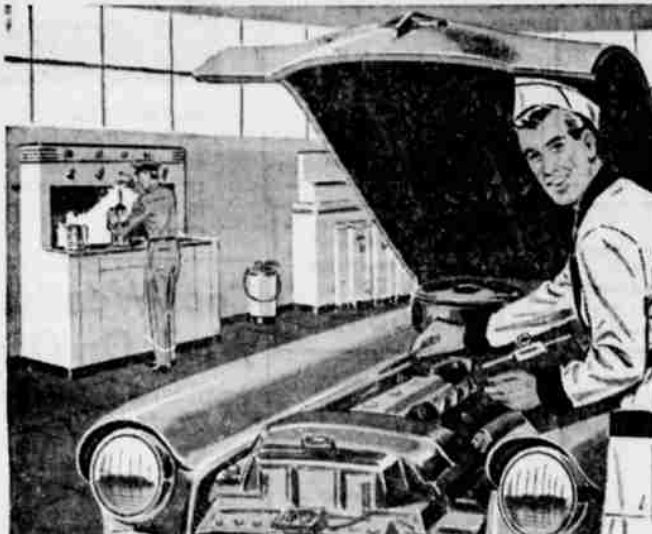
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
