DETROIT — A woman told police she was beaten and robbed Friday night in the middle of Grand River Avenue, one of Detroit's main traffic arteries, while motorists casually drove around her.

"I screamed and waved at passing motorists but they ignored me," said the woman, Mrs. Helen Lamb, 46.

She said she was waiting for a bus on the outskirts of the downtown area about 9:20 p.m. when a man grabbed her from behind. She ran into the middle of the avenue, she said, and the man followed her, hit her with a blunt instrument, and fled with her purse containing \$118 in cash and an unemployment check for \$25.

The money was for Easter gifts, she said. She was treated for a scalp cut.

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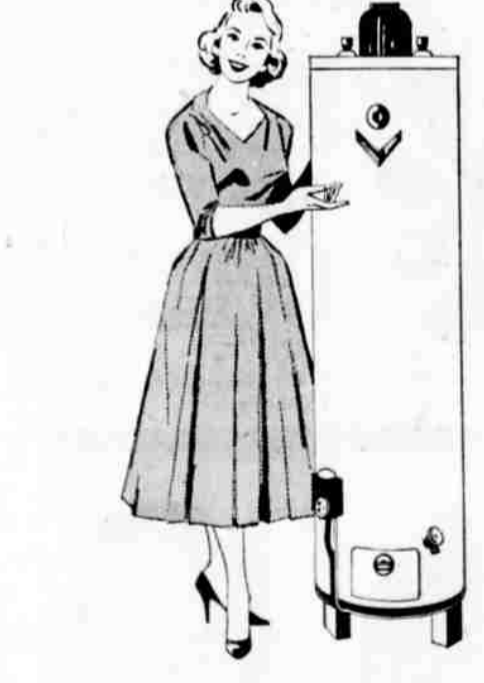
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
