Elkton Schools Discussed During Public Meeting

The curriculum of the Elkton Public Schools was the topic of discussion at the open meeting last week at the Elkton High School gymnasium.

The meeting was scheduled at the joint suggestion of the Oregon School Boards Assn., Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, and the Oregon Education Assn., who are encouraging such meetings for each school district in Oregon.

Eugene H. Fisher, chairman of the Elkton school board and vice president of the Oregon School Boards Assn., reviewed some of the recent developments that have brought about national interest and concern for the educational programs of the schools.

Leo Crisman, superintendent principal of the Elkton School District, discussed the total school program mentioning that both the Elkton grade and high schools were rated fully standard by the State Department of Education and that very favorable reports have been received from supervisors of the state office on the basis of their latest visitations.

J. E. Anderson, elementary principal, outlined the curriculum of the grade school with particular emphasis on the reading, science, and testing programs.

The curriculum of the high school was presented in some detail by Crisman. Registration forms listing all the subjects available to each student for the four years of high school and a copy of the graduation requirements were distributed to everyone in attendance. It was pointed out that four years of science could be taken by any student and that five mathematics classes are offered each for a full year.

Graduation requirements of the high school include 21 units of credits which is two over the state minimum. Crisman stated that a majority of the students finish with 24 units.

Preceding the curriculum discussion the high school was open for visitation with the teachers in their departments.
