## Roseburg Students Selecting Courses

Roseburg High School students now are selecting courses for next year from a curriculum which has changed very little from the current list.

The major change is the addition of a third language, French. The course is being offered, but will not be definitely scheduled unless enough students sign up for it.

Principal Harry Jacoby reports that three science and mathematics courses will be required for graduation. A sequence of algebra I, geometry and algebra II has been arranged so the last two courses will be backed by similar basic training.

Meanwhile grades will form the basis for a screening program to limit the sizes of physics and chemistry. Past grades will determine the successful applicants.

The pre-registration program is designed to take some of the pressure from activities necessary to start the succeeding year.
