

Indian Netmen Edged By Eugene

The South Eugene tennis squad took their first win over a Roseburg team in 10 years Saturday on the Indian courts by a close 4-3 count.

Taking the first three games of the matches, South Eugene coasted in for the win, although Roseburg finished by taking three out of the final four matches of the day.

Larry Brooks, fifth-rated Northwest tennis player, edged Keith Eddy of the Indians 6-1, 4-6, 6-2 in the opening match of the day. Both players were sharp, but the experience of Brooks told the tale.

Stan Kamby of South Eugene took the number two Indian netman, Mike Brundage, 6-1, 8-6 in the second match. This was the first loss of the season for Brundage after three straight wins.

In the third match of the meet, Dick Ramberg of Roseburg dropped a close 6-4, 1-6, 6-4 decision to Bruce Taylor of South Eugene, after leading 4-2 in the final set of the match.

Bob Fies of the Indians, seeing his first action of the year, took the measure of Scott Starlin of South Eugene in straight 6-2, 6-2 sets to account for the first win for the Tribesmen.

Mike Murphy of the Indians then added another match by trimming Dave Summers of South Eugene 6-1, 6-3 to pull the Indians to within one game at 3-2.

Needing the final two games of the meet to draw the win, Brooks and Kamby of South Eugene trimmed Eddy and Ramberg 6-2, 6-2 to clinch the matches. Brundage and Fies then finished up with a 6-1, 4-6, 6-2 victory over Dave Quimby and Taylor.

This was the second loss of the season for the Indians against one win, while South Eugene's record stands at 3-1 for the year.

Roseburg will be idle until next weekend, when they will travel to meet North Bend Friday afternoon and Marshfield Saturday morning.

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — "I get my relaxation from golf by practicing," said Arnold Palmer.

"I am in this game to win championships — the Masters, the Open, the PGA. Money is not the biggest factor. I want to be the best."

This was the new Masters golf champion talking — a thick-shouldered young man of 28 from the coal and steel area of western Pennsylvania.

Palmer, son of a LaRoche, Pa., professional, won the 22nd Masters over the Augusta National course yesterday in a close, dramatic stretch run. He had a 72-hole score of 284.

Defending champion Doug Ford, Mahopac, N.Y., and Fred Hawkins, El Paso, Tex., missed birdies on the final green and finished in a tie for second place at 285.

Ken Venturi, San Francisco, leader through the first two rounds, three-putted three consecutive holes on the back nine to wind up at 286, tied with Canada's Stan Leonard.

Decision 2nd Over Wildcats, Third Of Year

Glendale took its third straight baseball victory last night, and its second over Glide, by a 6-5 score in a non-league tilt played on the Glendale diamond.

The Pirates pushed across five big runs in the fifth inning to overcome a 2-1 Glide lead, but then had to hold off the Wildcats in the seventh to take the win, their second one-run decision over the Wildcats.

In the big fifth for the Pirates, Floyd West started things rolling by leading off with a sharp single to left. Jim Peaking, George Humphreys and Roy Coate a 1-1 walked to force in the first run of the inning.

With the bases still loaded Buddy Smart slapped a single to score two more. Troy Reynolds followed with another walk, a double by choices by Wes Young and a Glide miscue allowed the other two Glendale runs to score.

Myrtle Creek Evens Series, Dropping Riddle Irish 10-3

The Myrtle Creek Vikings evened their two-game baseball series with the Riddle Irish Saturday by taking an easy 10-3 decision in a non-league tilt played on the Myrtle Creek field.

Holding the Irish to only two hits and three runs, the Vikings ran their season's record to 2-1, while the loss by Riddle puts it even at 1-1.

With both clubs playing cautious ball during the first part of the game, Myrtle Creek broke the game wide open in the last of the sixth with a six-run rally to put the game on ice. The Vikings were in front 4-3 at the time.

The Vikings put together walks to Rod Trask, Ed Cearley, Gregg Lindquist and Don Bishop, singles by Wes Davidson, Tom Tiffin and Fred Earwood, a sacrifice by Bob Cavaner and a hit batsman to tally the six runs. All of the singles were infield hits.

Each club scored a single run in the first inning, with Riddle getting its on a walk to Jack Ball, an error and a passed ball. Myrtle Creek scored its run on a walk to Don Bishop, a sacrifice and a fielder's choice by Jim Murray.

Myrtle Creek then added another single tally in the second inning and then went ahead 4-1 in the third by pushing across two more runs on three walks and a single by Lindquist.

Riddle narrowed the score in the top of the fourth inning with a two-run rally. Back-to-back triples by Lee Frahm and Gary Klope, the only hit of the game for the Irish, and a steal of home plate by Klope gave the Irish their runs.

Wes Davidson replaced Earwood on the mound for the Vikings at this point and went the rest of the route without allowing either a hit or a run to be scored off him.

Three Riddle pitchers only gave up a total of six hits, but allowed 11 walks to Viking batters to put them in hot water most of the time. The three also struck out nine batters.

Winning pitcher Earwood and Davidson struck out seven and walked only four. On top of all that Davidson led the Vikings at the plate with 2-3, both singles.

Most of the attention this week on the sports scene in Douglas County will be centered on the track squads of the different schools. The 21st annual Hayward Relays, Friday and Saturday in Eugene, will attract most schools.

On top of this big attraction, Sutherland will be host to several schools in the first Sutherland relays Tuesday and Glendale will be host to Myrtle Creek, Riddle, Rogue River and Days Creek in a big five-way track meet Saturday.

All of the A-2 and B schools in the county will run Friday in the Hayward Relays, while Roseburg will compete Saturday. The class B and C events are those Friday, while the class A events are Saturday.

The baseball action in the county is spread out through the week with Drain opening the schedule today against Junction City in a make-up game that was rained out last week. The Warriors will also be at home to St. Francis on Wednesday in the second round of Emerald League play. The Junction City game is the first league game of the season for Drain.

Thursday's action will find two baseball games on the schedules. The Canyonville Tigers will open action for the first time 41 year by traveling to meet the Yoncalla team. Yoncalla will be out for the first time. Yoncalla has had one other game rained out. The other Thursday diamond action will have Riddle traveling to meet Camas Valley, which is also starting for the first time. Riddle is 1-1 for the year, splitting a pair of games against Myrtle Creek.

Most of the baseball action will be centered during the weekend as six games are on the docket for Friday and Saturday. On Friday, Glendale will take a 3-0 record into Rogue River League play by traveling to meet Eagle Point. In non-league games Oakland will be at Drain. Opener In Havana Set Despite Rebels

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — The International League is going ahead with plans to open the baseball season in Havana despite threats of war in Cuba.

League representatives yesterday voted unanimously for this "unless" conditions materially change.

Frank J. Shaughnessy, league president, remarked, "It's as quiet there as it is here."

President John C. Stigmeier of the Buffalo team, which has the opener in Havana April 16, said he was happy over the decision.

League representatives from five U.S. cities, two in Canada, and Havana met here for two hours behind locked doors to discuss the situation brought on by rebel leader Fidel Castro's campaign against the government of Fulgencio Batista.

Frank J., owner of the Havana club, said there's no fighting in Havana and western Cuba and that the rebels are in mountainous 750 miles from Havana.

Anyway, he said, baseball players would not be molested in his island.

"Baseball in Cuba is like a religion," he said. "It's out of politics."

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
