This gives the Eagles an all veteran outfield, but lacks a veteran at first base or shortstop. Junior Jim Hudson and freshman Ron Revelle are both out for infield positions and might be the ones to fill the gaps.

Other top prospects include senior John Lewey and sophomore Cliff Emery, both outfielders. Noffsinger is also headed for a turn on the mound, but with no previous experience behind him it might take a while to get used to the new position.

A total of 16 turned out for the club, coached by Bill Spiegatti. Ten games are on the schedule at this time, with several more to be added in the next few weeks.

High School Trackmen Set New Marks In Willamette Relays At Salem Saturday

SALEM. — The high school track season was off to a zippy start Monday after 10 new records were set Saturday at one of Oregon's biggest athletic events, the Willamette Relays.

Some 1,300 athletes from 66 high schools turned out for the relays and, with a big assist from the weather, turned in a number of outstanding early-season performances.

As brilliant sunshine ended a week of rain, the prep performers rang up records in eight senior events and two in the novice division.

This was aside from the brilliant 4:16.9 mile by Dyrrol Burleson of Cottage Grove High, not a record.

Camas Vaulters Sixth In Relays

The Camas Valley Hornets, taking a seven-man track squad to the Willamette Relays in Salem Saturday, came home without a first place, but did place Bob Thrush in a tie for fifth place in the pole vault.

Thrush was one of the six entries in the pole vault that cleared 11-0 for the day, which was good enough for the fifth place. Winner of the event was Ernie Coleman of North Marion, who set a new relay record of 11-7.

Dick Armstrong of Ridgefield, Wash., Everett Collingham of Dallas and Roy Meyers of Sherwood finished in a tie for second place in the pole vault at 11-3, while Thrush and Don McCrea of Prineville were in a fifth place tie at 11-0.

The Hornet 880-yard relay team of Jim Hammett, Wayman Schmidt, John Wheeler and Thrush finished fourth in one heat of the 880-yard event. Winning time in this event was 1:42.2, with Camas Valley finishing in the time of 1:47.2.

Royce Kiser and Wheeler were entered in the high jump, with each boy being eliminated at the five-foot mark. Wheeler was also eliminated at 9-6 in the pole vault.

Schmidt, 11-4 m. e. t., Wheeler, Thrush and David Wolske have all entered in different heats of the 100-yard dash, but all failed to finish among the first four.

The final member of the squad, Jerry Akce, was entered in the shot put, but also finished far down the list.

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Mansfield Hits Back At Claims Of GOP Chairman

WASHINGTON. — Sen. Mansfield, firing back at Republican critics, said today the Democratic-controlled Congress has shown bipartisan responsibility on antirecession measures.

Mansfield, acting Senate Democratic leader, said Republican National Chairman Meade ALCORN ought to recognize this and "take his own medicine show off the road long enough to join the Republicans and Democrats in Congress who are undertaking to alleviate the recession before it becomes a depression."

ALCORN said in a statement Friday that an Easter recess will give the people at home a chance to tell the Democrats they want them to "halt their medicine show in Congress and get to work on the carefully-prepared recession cures submitted by the administration."

ALCORN said the Eisenhower administration had taken 20 executive actions and had submitted 20 major proposals to Congress designed to stimulate the economy.

"These have been ignored by the Democratic congressional leadership, which seems more interested in concocting a phony political pitch for the fall elections than in the general welfare," ALCORN said.

"The recess offers Democrats a chance to learn at first hand that the American people want the recession handled sensibly as an economic problem — not a political matter."

New Record Set For Prep Mile

SALEM, Ore. — A high school student, who won the mile run in 4 minutes 16.9 seconds, was the big surprise of the Willamette Relays here Saturday.

Dyrrol Burleson of Cottage Grove High School, a slender 6-2, outdistanced several college students, to enter the mile in the college division since the relays began here in 1951.

Burleson's time was much faster than the Oregon prep record of 4:24.0 set by George Fullerton of Astoria in 1946 and was only eight-tenths of a second off the 4:16.1 set by James Bowers of Township, Ill., in 1956.

Meet records were set in the 120-yard high hurdles and the 440-yard relay. Dave Kleiker of Whitman went over the high hurdles in 14.4 seconds, a second faster than the former record set by Dean Renson of Willamette in 1953.

Seattle Pacific's 440-yard relay team set a record of 43.3, for the event. The previous record was 45.2 set by Oregon in 1953 and tied by Washington in 1956.

No team records were kept, but Seattle Pacific's entrants overshadowed the other colleges entered. SP's relay and medley teams took four first places and Ray Duncan of Seattle Pacific won the 100-yard dash in 59.8.

Whitworth was the only other college to capture two events, winning the 480-yard shuttle hurdle relay and the shot put. Warren Lashua won the shot with a toss of 46 feet 2 inches.

Arson Initiation Ritual For Denver Youth Gang
DENVER. — Juvenile gangs in Colorado have a new and fearful initiation ritual, Arson.

Capt. E. William Crawford, state fire marshal, said that teen-agers wanting to join gangs must first set a fire.

"Investigation of most recent arson cases have uncovered the practice," he said. "These we caught admitted that in order to gain gang membership they were told to set a fire."

Some of the fires have been costly. One of these was the burning of a Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad freight car in February. It caused \$50,000 damage and disrupted rail traffic for hours.

Hecklers Beset Soviet Diplomat In Forum Speech
BOSTON. — In a speech interrupted by hecklers, a Soviet diplomat asserted last night, "We are confident in the final victory of the ideas of communism."

Arkady A. Sobolev, permanent representative of the Soviet Union to the United Nations, continued his speech despite loud hecklers in the audience and a picket line outside the building.

Seven policemen on duty inside the hall kept busy trying to quiet the hecklers and ejecting the more persistent ones. Other policemen outside kept the picketers moving so they wouldn't block the entrance.

Five persons were taken to a police station as a result of the disturbance at Jordan Hall. Three later were released. Police said they would charge the other two with disturbing a public assembly.

Sobolev spoke at Ford Hall Forum, now in its 50th year of public discussions. Its directors claim it is the oldest forum of public expression in America.

Those picketing the hall said they represented Hungary, Ukraine, Lithuania and Latvia, all countries dominated by the Soviet Union.

Sobolev said in his speech: "We are confident in the final victory of the ideas of communism, but we have never imposed and we do not intend to impose the Socialist way of life, our ideology on other countries by force."

Three Of 26 Whooping Cranes Head For Canada
AUSTIN, Tex. — Three of 26 rare whooping cranes left their Texas nesting grounds last week on their 2,500-mile annual journey to their summer home in Canada.

Claude Lard, manager of the Aransas National Refuge near Austin, Tex., said the cranes' departure was eight days earlier than last year.

The 26 white whoopers — with jet black wing tips, red head crowns and long protruding legs — winter at the Gulf Coast refuge. Four others are in captivity. It is against the law to kill a whooper.

Two adults and a year-old whooper started the trip for the Wood Hole National Park area in Canada, Lard said.

Glamor And Fame, Tragedy, Domestic Unhappiness Told About Lana Turner's Life

HOLLYWOOD. — Glamor and fame have been the prizes of Lana Turner's professional career.

But tragedy and domestic unhappiness have marked her personal life.

When Johnny Stompanato was slain in her home Friday night it was not the first time death had struck close to her. In 1930, when she was 10 years old, Lana's father John Turner was killed by robbers in San Francisco.

Lana married five times. Each marriage ended in divorce.

Her daughter Cheryl, 14, has been booked on suspicion of murder in the Stompanato slaying and is in the custody of juvenile authorities.

In 1956 Cheryl ran away from an exclusive girls' school and showed up hours later wandering alone in a Los Angeles slum area. The girl told police she was tired of school.

Sweater Girl
The beautiful blonde Lana — who was known as The Sweater Girl in the late 1930s and early 1940s — was born Julia Jean Mildred Frances Turner on Feb. 8, 1920, in Wallace, Idaho.

Her father was a roving man, and the family moved all over the West until he was cut down by bullets on Dec. 15, 1930. Her mother, a beauty operator, finally brought Lana to Hollywood.

Miss Turner's discovery by the movie is a classic one — one that still lures young girls to Hollywood.

She was sitting in a drug store when Billy Wilkerson, publisher of a Hollywood trade paper, saw her, liked her good looks and her well-fitted sweater.

Wilkerson turned the 15-year-old girl over to agent Zeppo Marx, one of the Marx Brothers. The rest is history.

Determined to become a real actress and not just a sex symbol, Lana plunged into her work. Her performances in "The Postman Always Rings Twice" and "Green Dolphin Street" drew good notices, but it wasn't until last year's "Peyton Place" that she won an Academy Award nomination for best actress. Joanne Woodward won the Oscar however.

Her next marriage was to the tin fortune teller and sportsman, Henry J. (Bub) Topping. They were divorced in 1952 after four years of marriage.

In 1953 she married screen Tarzan Lex Barker in Turin, Italy. And for a while it appeared that the marriage would succeed.

It didn't. They were divorced last July.

Stompanato was her most recent romantic interest. But this association likewise brought her unhappiness and — Friday night — tragedy.

LOOKING AHEAD—These little moonwalkers built their own rocket with a minimum of research and a lot of old newspapers and shellac.
