Paroles End For 10 Top Japanese War Criminals

TOKYO (AP)—Wartime adversaries of Japan today cut the life sentences of 10 Japanese major war criminals to the 10 years they have already served. All are out on parole, and the clemency action ended their parole periods. The 11-nation international military tribunal convicted the 10 in 1948. They were paroled in 1956. Still held in prison are 34 minor war criminals who were convicted by the United States. The Japanese have been pressing for their release.

Bishop Dagwell To Preside At Episcopal Diocese Meet

The Right Rev. Benjamin D. Dagwell, D.D., Episcopal Bishop of Oregon, will preside at his last convention of the Diocese of Oregon when it convenes for its 70th annual meeting April 13 to 15 at Trinity Church, Portland.

Seventy active priests and deacons from some 30 parishes and 38 missions of the Episcopal Church in Western Oregon will be in the procession of the opening convention session at Trinity Church Sunday night, April 13.

Bishop Dagwell will make his last report to the diocese at this service. Also reporting at this service will be the Right Rev. James W. F. Carman, Bishop Coadjutor of Oregon, who will succeed Bishop Dagwell as diocesan in the fall of this year.

Trinity Church will also be host to the 70th annual meeting of the women's auxiliary of the diocese of Oregon. Highlight of the women's auxiliary meeting will be presentation of the annual United Thank offering at a communion service Tuesday morning at which Bishop Carman will be the celebrant.

The offering will be received in a golden alms basin, a century-old treasure of the church and gift of members of Oxford University. The basin is used at the opening service of each triennial general convention of the Episcopal Church.

The Right Rev. Karl Morgan Block, Episcopal Bishop of California, whose see city is San Francisco, will act as master of ceremonies at the annual diocesan banquet in the Columbia Athletic club Monday night.

As a special order of business the convention Monday morning will hear a report from a committee on the state of the church which has conducted a year-long survey on advance work needs. Buzz sessions will discuss the report and a consolidated report of their decisions will be made.

The convention will elect delegates to the triennial general convention of the church, to be held this summer at Miami, Fla., delegates of the provincial synod, members of the standing committee, the diocesan council, trustees of the diocese, trustees of Good Samaritan Hospital, Portland, and trustees of St. Helens Hall, Portland.

The diocesan woman's auxiliary, which will have "Christian Living as its meeting theme, will elect a new president, recording secretary and educational secretary, according to Mrs. P. L. Herbig of St.

Plywood Firm, Union In Accord Of Profit Sharing
KALAMA, Wash. (AP)—A plywood firm and its union employees announced agreement Monday on a profit sharing plan coupled with a partial wage moratorium. Members of the Kalama local of the International Woodworkers of America voted more than three to one to approve the contract with the Columbia Veneer Co.

The agreement, believed the first of its kind in the West for a plant under union shop contract, provides:

The 230 employees will get 25 percent of Columbia's Veneer's profits before taxes, based on profit and loss statements at the end of each fiscal year. The workers will get equal shares.

The regular wage scale — now a minimum of \$1.82 in the industry — will remain in effect during the contract, which runs until 1960, with a 60-day notice reopening provision.

To assist the company during the current slump, employees agreed to a moratorium on a portion of their wages.

Columbia Veneer now is operating four days a week, turning out four million feet of plywood a month.

Frank Grey, union business agent, and Art Bergman, plant manager, announced the agreement. A business and civil leaders hailed it as the assuring continued economic stability for the community of 1,200 where Columbia Veneer is the major industry.

It will take at least two days, a hospital spokesman said, for tests and an appraisal of his condition.

Jimmie arrived in Boston last Saturday with his mother, Mrs. Wayne Rokowski, a photo vicom four years ago, and the hospital said he had stood the trip well.

The boy had his first ride in a subway in company of Charles Doucet, vice president of the Boston Kiwanis Club. After riding under Boston Harbor to East Boston, he said, "I wouldn't have believed it."

While Jimmie is in the hospital his mother is living at a hotel, her expenses paid from funds raised by service, church and civic groups at home. The funds are being administered by Boston Kiwanis.
