Drain, St. Francis Split Emerald Loop Doubleheader

The Drain Warriors finally found a winning combination Wednesday afternoon as they split a pair of baseball games with the St. Francis Saints, winning the first one 3-1 and losing the second 6-5 on a four-run Saint rally in the seventh inning.

Warrior pitcher Bob Whipple had things his own way in the first game as he set the visiting Saints down on only three hits, while striking out 14 and walking only five.

The winning runs for the Warriors came in the last of the third inning, when they came from behind to tally three runs on two of their three hits in the game off losing pitcher Bob Willmetts.

Pat Hartson started the rally for the Warriors with a clean single to center field, followed by three St. Francis errors and a sharp single by Ray Heaton.

St. Francis had taken a 1-0 lead in the top of the second inning on two Drain errors and a single by Pat Witter. Heaton was the big Drain batter of the game with 1-3, including two runs batted in. All three of the St. Francis hits were singles.

The Warriors were coasting along with a 3-2 lead going into the seventh inning of the second game when the roof fell in on pitcher Frank Jacobs. Before the side could be retired the Saints had pushed across four runs.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. — Boston slugger Ted Williams, who received 120 walks while topping the American League in batting with a .388 mark last season, didn't see many good pitches Wednesday in his spring exhibition game debut.

The 39-year-old outfielder, still bothered by an ankle injury, drew two walks in pinch-hit appearances as the Red Sox belted their Memphis farm in the Southern Assn., 10-1.

Williams walked on a 3-2 pitch with the bases loaded in a four-run fifth. Then, with baseball rules relaxed, he went to bat again in the eighth and looked at four straight balls.

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From The Training Camps

BOSTON — Haywood Sullivan, rookie catcher for the Boston Red Sox, was reported doing very well Thursday after surgery for a ruptured spinal disc at New England Baptist Hospital.

Dr. James L. Poppen, who performed the operation Wednesday, said Sullivan should be able to begin light exercises in six to eight weeks.

MEXICO CITY — Gene Freese says he's still trying to beat out Frank Thomas for the third base job with the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Freese said General Manager Joe L. Brown tossed the challenge at him last winter.

"Joe told me to come to spring training and beat out Thomas," Freese said. "I imagine what chance I had doing that. Here's a guy who hits 25 or 30 home runs and they're going to play me over him. Well, I'm still trying to beat him out."

Freese got four hits in six trips to the plate Wednesday night as the Pirates walloped their Mexico City farm club 23-1 in an exhibition game. The Pirates got 25 hits all together.

PORTSMOUTH, Ohio — Possible competition between Boston and Detroit in bidding for a catcher, yet plus the big weak point in the Washington Senators' lineup — second base.

Even before big Haywood Sullivan was hospitalized, the Red Sox had made overtures to Washington for catcher Lou Berberet and Clint Courtney. The Senators, blessed with an oversupply of good catchers, four of them are reportedly hopeful Boston may sweeten the ante — possibly by offering infielders Ted Lepcio or Billy Conzolo.

With Detroit openly anxious of signing a good lefthanded hitting catcher, Washington might stand to get a better trade than expected.

BALTIMORE — Baltimore's Orioles, tanned and fit-looking after 1 1/2 months in the Arizona sunshine, flew home to a welcoming crowd Wednesday night.

A crowd of several hundred persons turned out as the team arrived by plane from their spring training base in Scottsdale, Ariz. Before leaving Scottsdale, Oriole officials announced that southpaw pitcher Jack Harshman had signed his 1958 contract. Harshman, who has a back injury, had an 8-8 record with the Chicago White Sox last season.

MESA, Ariz. — Duke Snider may yet fool those who figured he wouldn't be ready to play on opening day.

There's no conclusive evidence yet, but the big Los Angeles outfielder Wednesday played a full nine innings for the first time this spring — and was adventurous enough to try to steal a base.

He picked up a single in three times at bat as the Dodgers dropped a 3-4 decision to Milwaukee at Dallas.

The Duke has been bothered by swelling in his left knee, which was operated on during the winter. The swelling subsided after he sat out two games in a row this week.

"I hope to play opening day," he said. "My knee still huffs up on me but I'm feeling better each day."

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
