River Tunnel Section Sunk In Fraser River

VANCOUVER, B. C. — The fifth and second last Deas Island tunnel section was sunk into place on the river bed of the Fraser River at midnight Saturday.

Work crews began winching the 18,500-foot tube across the river at 4 p.m. By 9 p.m. it was in position for sinking and three hours later the job was completed.

The last giant concrete section is scheduled for sinking early next week, ahead of the spring freshets.

The 16 million dollar tunnel will form part of a superhighway between Vancouver and the United States border.

Hay Loading, Farm Truck Plates, Vehicle Taxation Consume Highway Hearing

KLAMATH FALLS — The problems of hay loading, farm truck plates and methods of vehicle taxation consumed the major portion of the discussion time of a legislative interim highway committee hearing held at the Pelican Cafe here on Monday.

The hearing was conducted by Rep. Al Flegel of Roseburg. Also attending were Senators R. F. Chapman of Coos Bay, Harry D. Boivin of Klamath Falls, Rep. Richard E. Groener of Milwaukie and Carl Back, Port Orford.

During the closing discussion, Charles A. Henderson, Klamath County Agent, pointed out to the group which included members of the State Highway Department and the Oregon State Police, that the Oregon law limiting loads of baled hay to 12½ feet contrasted with California's 15½ feet creates a problem of transportation for some 150,000 tons of alfalfa hay which the Oregon area could now market in California.

Law Impractical

It is impractical, he said, for shippers to come to Oregon, load the baled hay to the legal limit and then drive over the line, loosen their loads and add another foot of hay. He also pointed out that, because of the hay situation in California, Oregon farmers have an excellent opportunity to market their hay there.

Ralph Sipprell, State Highway Department, took the blame for the state law on the subject, stating that loads such as logs, lumber and baled hay had been deemed hazardous when loaded higher than 12 feet six inches.

It was suggested that the interim committee would recommend to the next legislative session that Oregon's limiting law be changed to conform with that of California and the chairman said it was to be a recommendation.

The question of whether or not to continue truck-trailer migration fees on light weight or switch to gross weight was discussed. Flegel said the trucking industry does not object to the change but that farm groups do.

Exceptions Taken

Sharp exception was taken to the recently approved plan to spend \$12 million on improvement of Highway 101 by Francis Landrum, chairman of Klamath County Chamber of Commerce's roads and highways committee. He pointed out that under the matching funds program, such a move would result in less money being available for other primary and secondary roads projects in the state.

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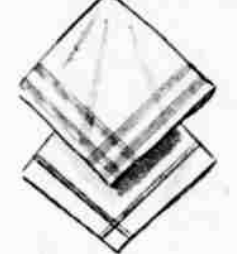
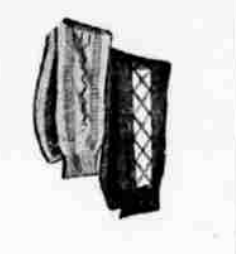
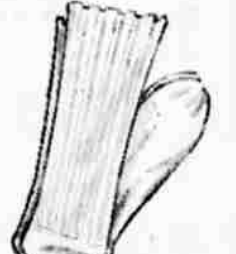
