

Building Permit Issued For Huge Lloyd Center

PORTLAND — A building permit for \$21,300,000 was issued here Thursday for construction of the Lloyd Center, a big shopping area on Portland's East Side.

"This will be a great stimulus to the community," City Commissioner William Bowes said at a ceremony at which the permit was issued.

"It is a demonstration of the confidence you have in the growth and development of Portland," Bowes told Richard Von Hagen, president of Lloyd Corp.

Hagen responded by giving the city a \$57,994 check for the permit's fee.

U. S. Military Transport Turns Back To Port

YOKOSUKA, Japan — The U.S. military transport Anderson with 2,287 passengers aboard returned to Yokosuka Thursday after developing rudder trouble 50 hours out at sea.

The ship is expected to sail again for San Francisco some time next week. Repair time is estimated at six days.

The passengers include 1,904 troops and 383 military dependents.

The board also accepted the resignation of Mrs. Jeannette Teitma, who is planning to move to the Eugene area.

All non-certified school personnel were rehired.

Jet Bomber Explodes Killing Crew Of Four

NORTH COLLINS, N.Y. — An Air Force B-47 jet bomber carrying a crew of four exploded and crashed in two sections Thursday in fields near this village south of Buffalo. All aboard were presumed dead, the air force said.

The bomber, on a routine training mission from Lockbourne Air Force Base, Ohio, was about to make contact with a refueling plane when the explosion occurred, the base said.

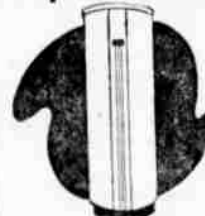
Lockbourne identified three of the four victims of the crash. They included:

Cheryl Crane Wrote Own Letter To Slain Paramour

LOS ANGELES — A letter from Cheryl Crane to the man police say she slew — phrased in the unsophisticated tones of a schoolgirl — came to light Thursday.

Barred also were three letters by its recipient, Johnny Stompanato, to her mother, movie star Lana Turner. Stompanato's love passages matched for burning intensity those of Lana's previously disclosed letters to him. One of his read:

"My dearest Lana: You know, baby, I'm so lonesome for the touch of you, I could die. I try to think of you when you were here and those precious minutes I wasted when my lips were not on yours."

Stompanato, 32, handsome former bodyguard to ex-gambler Mickey Cohen, died from the thrust of an eight-inch butcher knife into his stomach last Friday night in the boudoir of Lana's Beverly Hills home.

Police say 14-year-old Cheryl told them she killed him because he was threatening to disfigure or kill her 38-year-old mother.

But only a happy relationship was indicated in the letter Cheryl penned to Stompanato last Feb. 18 in the study hall of the Happy Valley Girls' School, Ojai, Calif. It was published under a copyright Thursday by the Los Angeles Evening Herald-Express, which said the letter "was found nestled among the love letters from Lana to Stompanato."

Mailed to Stompanato at Acapulco, Mexico, where he was vacationing with her mother, Cheryl's letter, misspellings included, read in part:

"Dear Johnny — First of all please excuse this paper but it's really all I have right now."

"I just got your letter this morning but I was home for the weekend."

"How have you been? And how is mother?"

"When are you all coming back? Soon I hope."

"Mother and I really had a wonderful time in Europe. I can't remember when we've been that close."

"My hair is way past my shoulders now and I have been wearing it in a French-roll in back."

"I'll write again real soon I promise but now it's your turn — Love ya & miss ya loads — Cheryl"

"PS Give my love to mother. Write soon & be good."

The Examiner published the Stompanato letter Thursday and said it had been left in his apartment.

PLANE OF Cuban Army Crashes
HAVANA — A Cuban army plane crashed in flames in the exclusive Miramar residential district of Havana Friday, killing two persons and injuring 15.

The plane demolished a grocery store and adjoining residence. The craft burst into flames as it was taking off from nearby Camp Columbia airfield.

Killed were the pilot, Lieut. Oscar Luis Machado, and a Cuban civilian who apparently was trapped under the flaming debris of the grocery store.

Wreckage flew over a wide area and smashed windows in residences for blocks around. About 50 houses suffered some damage.

The explosion of the plane's gasoline tanks was heard throughout most of Havana, touching off rumors of fresh rebel bombing. The plane, described as a fighter aircraft, was carrying bombs but apparently these failed to explode.
