Lana Tells Of Last Words Spoken To Sain Paramour

LOS ANGELES — Lana Turner sobbed to a coroner's jury Friday that her last words to Johnny Stompanato were: "Don't ever touch me again. I'm absolutely finished! This is the end and I want you to get out!"

Then, the blonde star said, her daughter Cheryl slipped a kitchen knife into Stompanato's stomach "and I swear it was so fast I truthfully thought she had hit him in the stomach."

She added that in the argument preceding the stabbing of Stompanato, while Cheryl was standing at the door, he "came to me like he was going to strangle me."

After hearing more than an hour of her tremulous testimony, the jury of 10 men and two women decided 14-year-old Cheryl's slaying of her mother's lover was justifiable homicide.

Jury's Opinion Only

The jury's verdict represents its opinion only and is not binding on the district attorney or the courts. Cheryl still faces a hearing in juvenile court April 24 at which a decision on her future will be made.

Cheryl was not present at the inquest at which her famous mother played the starring role.

"Mr. Stompanato grabbed me, shook me, cursed me and, as he had told me before, said no matter what I did, how I tried to get away, could never do it. If I say jump, you'll jump; if I say hop, you'll hop."

"He said he would cut my face, cripple me and kill me, my daughter, my mother. He said he would get me where it would hurt most."

Cheryl broke down from his grasp and I turned around. There was my daughter standing at the open door.

"I said to her, 'Please, baby, don't listen to this. Please go back downstairs.'"

"She left and I closed the door." At this Lana nearly broke down on the stand. A sheriff's deputy

Portland — Frank LeRoy Brewton Friday faced a life prison term for the murder of a grocery store owner here.

The sentence was imposed upon the 24-year-old Portland man late Thursday by Circuit Judge Martin Hawkins.

Brewton, formerly of Turner, was convicted of first degree murder in the November gunshot death of William McKenzie, 71.

Police said McKenzie was killed as he stopped to robbers in his small grocery store here.

A co-defendant in the case, Eugene Taylor, 43, Portland, died late last month shortly before he was to go on trial.

Portland — Three electronic engineers have been charged with operating an unauthorized radio station that broadcasts on the same frequency as the Russian earth satellite Sputnik 1.

Asst. U.S. Atty. T. Conrad Judd said Friday they did it as a prank on amateur radio operators attempting to track the satellite.

To be arraigned in U.S. District Court Monday on the charge of operating the unlicensed radio transmitter are Rulon D. Jensen, 30, Deal L. Hanson, 29, both of Los Angeles, and Fred W. Field Jr., 29, of suburban Torrance.

They have not commented on the accusation.

Los Angeles — Donald Moore Smith, 40, Merrill, Ore., was killed Friday when his pickup truck collided with a truck and trailer 16 miles south of here on Highway 97.

Police said the other driver, Leonard B. Moyer, Eugene, was not hurt.

Survivors include the widow at Merrill and Smith's parents at Malin.

Hollis Edwin Conant, 28, 1833 NE Klamath Ave., was sentenced to three months in jail Friday after pleading guilty in district court to a charge of assault and battery.

Conant was picked up by Roseburg police after the complaint was filed by Conant's wife, Shirley. Sentence was pronounced by Judge Warren A. Woodruff.

Resumes Testimony

She wiped away a tear and resumed: "I turned to Stompanato and I said, 'That's just great, that my child had to hear all this.'"

"He kept a jacket and a shirt hanging in the closet. I don't know when he brought them over (to her house), maybe for a change."

She said she then walked away and it was then, she testified, that Stompanato made a move as if to strangle her with the jacket.

The curious started gathering at 6 a.m. outside the door of a courtroom on the 8th floor of Los Angeles Hall of Records, where the inquest was held. It started shortly after 9 a.m.

Seats were set aside for the first 40 citizens in line. There were 129 seats for the press, and all were filled. The Columbia Broadcasting system filmed the inquest for later television use, on a pool basis.

Probe To Determine If Pepp Drug Was Cause Of Death

NEW YORK — The City Health Department said Saturday it was investigating the death of Irene Frank, 64, to determine whether Marsilid, an energizing drug, contributed to her death. She died in Bellevue Hospital Feb. 3.

The department said it is embarking two types of packages of Marsilid, which is used in treatment of persons suffering from depression. Forty health department inspectors have been assigned to drug establishments and hospitals to enforce the embargo.

Hoffman-Laroche Inc., of Nutley, N.J., manufacturers of Marsilid, meanwhile has announced that it is removing from the market any packages of the drug which bear labels recommending a dose of 150 milligrams a day.

The Food and Drug Administration in Washington said the company is notifying physicians throughout the country that the recommended dosage has been cut to 30 milligrams a day.

A coroner's jury in San Francisco said Saturday it attributed the death there of Mrs. Frances Simpson, 55, to "a dosage of 150 milligrams of Marsilid per day."

The complainant, Mae Van Natta, charges negligence on the part of the defendants, the E. K. Wood Lumber Co.; Elmer E. Bangs and Harold E. Dick, proprietors of Bangs & Dick Logging Co., and John W. Cannon.

James Van Natta, 49, died from injuries received when he was struck by a log which rolled off a truck allegedly owned and operated by Cannon at the Wood log pond near Reedsport. The complaint alleges the truck was loaded by Bangs and Dick.

Two Youths Sentenced For Attempted Blasting

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho — Two youths who admitted setting off a dynamite explosion to kill a young mother and collect \$20,000 in insurance were sentenced to up to 14 years apiece Friday.

Charles M. Feely, 18, and Monte D. Moore, 21, pleaded guilty to charges of assault with intent to commit murder and waived rights to a 48-hour waiting period before sentencing.

Reedsport — A charge of burglary in a dwelling was entered by Henry Alvin Holloway, 21, Winston.

Johnnie Newton Carlton, 19, Winston pleaded innocent to a charge of larceny in a dwelling house.

Gordon Mount Rudd, 38, Port Hueme, Calif., pleaded innocent to a charge of non support. Accused of refusal to support his three children, he was brought to Roseburg Friday from Ventura, Calif., by Sheriff Ira C. Byrd.

Pleas Innocent

James Casteel, 34, Sutherlin, entered a plea of innocent to a charge of forgery.

An innocent plea to a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses was entered by Fred B. Reese, 31, Sutherlin.

Four defendants were given until Monday morning to enter their pleas before Judge Charles S. Woodruff.

They are: Richard Kelly, 18, Sutherlin; Otis Goodin Jr., 21, Denver, Colo.; Gary Lee Keyes, 21, Central Point; and Arthur Dale Seavers, 32, Newberg.

Kelly is charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor in connection with the Youngblood-Dorsey case. Goodin is accused of larceny in a dwelling house faces Keyes, and Seavers faces a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses.

Ernest Watson Meted 10 Years For Rape

Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodruff Friday sentenced Ernest C. Watson, 40, Idley Rd. Box 135, to 10 years in the state penitentiary on a charge of rape upon a daughter.

Watson had been returned from the state hospital this week following post conviction examination after he had pleaded guilty to a grand jury indictment charge last month. The hospital reported he was found not to be committable.

He had been brought from Salt Lake City and booked at county jail Feb. 4 after the complaint had been filed. He pleaded guilty and was sent to state hospital to undergo statutory examination on Feb. 5.

Big Tanker-Truck Plunges Off Road, Killing Driver

SPOKANE — A big tanker-truck, loaded with diesel oil, left the highway, crashed through a guard rail and plunged 70 feet into a dry bed late Friday night about mid-way between Burville and Moses Lake in eastern Washington.

The huge tanker section of the rig crashed down on the cab, crushing the driver, Quentin Tuttle, 40, Spokane.

The State Patrol office here said Tuttle's watch was thrown out of its case and had stopped at 10:35 p.m.

He was freed from the cab about 1:15 Saturday morning and rushed to the Moses Lake hospital then taken to Deaconess hospital here.

An attendant here said his condition was "extremely poor."

Patrol officers said Tuttle had to be pried out of the cab as cutting torches were ruled because of the tanker full of diesel oil resting on top of the cab, and the danger of explosion and fire.

Tuttle apparently suffered skull, chest, arm, leg and internal injuries.

The patrol said in a report Tuttle's rig was running a sweeping curve when it left the highway and plunged over the bank into the riverbed. No cause had been determined for the accident. An investigation was being made.

Hoffa Judge Tells Probers He Would Declare Mistrial

NEW YORK — If a Senate probe involves the Teamsters Union during the trial of its president, James R. Hoffa, for wiretap conspiracy, Judge John J. Sirica Friday will declare a mistrial.

U.S. Dist. Judge John M. Cashin told defense attorneys in the case, which goes on trial Monday, that "I can't control this Senate committee" and "they can do as they see fit."

But Sirica said that if he do hold hearings and the Teamsters Union is involved, whether Hoffa's name is mentioned or not — because I consider the two intertwined — I won't hesitate five minutes to declare a mistrial.

In Washington, Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) said the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee would reconsider at a meeting Monday its plans to start hearings Tuesday on Teamsters affairs in Philadelphia.

Lester Harrison, an accused conspirator in illegally wiretapping Teamsters Union telephones, had asked for dismissal of the charge, or a postponement because of "adverse publicity" from the Senate inquiry.

Mock Skirmish Set By National Guard

Residents who live near the National Guard rifle range off Diamond Lake Boulevard may think Roseburg is being attacked Sunday morning, but it will only be the National Guard conducting training exercises.

National Guard officer Lt. Jim Marshall reported to state police that the organization would be conducting the exercises between 8 a.m. and noon Sunday. There will be strafing, bombing and firing of all caliber weapons, he said.

To add realism to the scene, a plane flown by Dick Beverly and Stan Olson from the Roseburg Airport will strafe and bomb the area with four bags. Demolitions, signal flares and reduced charges training bombs will be used to coordinate the attack.

The aggressor force and fighting unit will be composed of 120 men from Delta Company of the 186th Infantry unit. The company will form at 7:30 a.m. and move by trucks to the county shops on Diamond Lake Boulevard.
