

# Douglas Trojans Triumph At Hayward Relays

## Drain Pole Vaulter Gains New Record Over 11 Feet

Douglas County entrants in the class C events at the Hayward Relays in Eugene Friday didn't fare quite as well as those in class B, but came home with more individual winners in the events.

The six schools entered in the events walked off with two first places, two second places and a tie for another, two third places, two fourth places and a tie for another and one fifth place and ties in two others.

Heading the point parade for the county were the Drain Warriors with a total of 12 points and ninth place in the final standings. The Days Creek Wolves finished with seven points and 12th place; Camas Valley with 13-14 points and 14th place; Canyonville with 3 1/2 points and 16th place; Oakland with three points and 18th place; and Yoncalla with 2 1/3 points and 19th place.

**Powers Wins**

The meet was won by the Powers Cruisers with a total of 32 3/4 points, followed by Siuslaw with 28 and Waldport and Sherwood with 24 1/2.

First place winners for the county came from Albert Sowell of Drain with a pole vault of 11-3/4 and a new meet record. The old record was 11-0 set last year by Ernest Coleman of North Marion.

The other first place winners were George Williams of Days Creek who picked up five of his seven points in the shot put, Williams put the shot 46-10, to beat his nearest competitor by over one foot.

Other point makers for the Warriors were Bob Seaton in the javelin throw, with a toss of 151-6 and Jerry Nash in the discus with a throw of 120-3/4.

Days Creek picked up its other two points on a fourth place finish by Richardson in the discus, with a throw of 117-4.

Camas Valley spread out its points in several events, with the top point maker being Bob Thrush with a second place finish in the pole vault at 11-0 and a fifth place finish in the discus with a toss of 115-8 1/2. The 11-0 cleared by Thrush in the pole vault tied last year's record, but Lowell with his jump of 11-3/4 set a new mark.

## Pitching Duo From Drain Combines For No-Hit Win

Bob Whipple and Frank Jacobs of the Drain Warriors combined to throw a no-hit, 4-2 baseball win over the Oakland Oakers, in a non-league game played Friday on the Drain diamond.

Oakland put together two walks and a two-run error by the Warriors to spoil the no-run game of the two Warriors pitchers, but in the four-inning throw by Whipple and three by Jacobs, the Oakers could not even rap a loud foul.

Losing pitcher Bob Young was also sharp, giving up but three hits, but a total of 12 walks doled out to the Drain batters kept him in trouble most of the game.

The Warriors opened the scoring in the bottom of the first inning, when they found Young for two of the three hits. Stan Cunningham started the game with a double to center field and scored when Dick Blomberg slashed out a solid single to right field.

**Goes Ahead**

Drain went ahead 4-0 in the bottom of the third, when Young gave up walks to Jacobs, Bob Gordineer, Cunningham and Blomberg and his third hit of the game, a single by Dennis Harms.

The two Oakland runs came in the top of the fourth inning, when with two down and Jerry Brown and Bob Germond on base on two of the three walks given up by Drain, Cunningham threw wild to

first base and both runners scampered home.

Outside of the 12 walks given up by Young, Drain was held at almost a standstill as seven batters went down swinging. Whipple and Jacobs struck out nine Oakland batters.

Cunningham with his leadoff double had the only extra base hit of the game to lead both clubs at the plate with 1-2, including two walks.

Glendale opened defense of its Rogue Valley baseball title by thumping Eagle Point, 26-3, in a game played Friday on the Eagle Point diamond.

The win for Glendale, its fourth of the season without a setback, was clinched by the Pirates in the second inning, when they pushed across seven runs, after denting the plate twice in the first inning.

Doubles by Bill Barrong, Wes Young, Wendell Stanley, and Roy Coate, along with two Eagle Point errors and singles by George Humphries and Clifford Worley accounted for the seven runs in the big second inning for the Pirates.

The Pirates racked a total of six Eagle Point pitchers for 13 hits, but were helped to the easy win by 12 walks and seven Eagle Point errors.

**Six Innings Played**

Only six innings were played in the contest, after Glendale scored six runs in each of the fifth and sixth innings to take an almost unassailable 26-1 lead.

Eagle Point did score a pair of runs in the last of the sixth, when with Glendale jayvees playing, it made the most of three walks and a single to tally the two runs. They also added a single run in the last of the fourth.

Winning pitcher Floyd West and his relief Bill Mullerkey held the losers to just three hits, while walking eight and striking out eight.

## Thomson Makes Brilliant Showing To Pace Victory

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Paced by the three outstanding runs of Cliff Thomson the Douglas Trojans walked off with the class B title at the Hayward Relays Friday in Eugene by outdistancing 26 other track teams from the state.

The Trojans rolled up a total of 35 1/4 points to edge out North Marion, who finished with 32 and Reynolds with 25. All three teams were in the running up until the final race of the day.

Needing to place in the final shuttle hurdles race, Douglas went out and gained a tie for fifth place to clinch the meet and to go along with two first places and a pair of second places gained earlier in the meet.

**Thomson Shines**

Thomson was almost the whole show for the Trojans, coming from behind in three races to nab a win. Twice it was good enough for first place and once, even though he won his heat, for second.

Anchored by the fast 2:01.1 half-mile of Thomson's, the Trojans came through with a first in the two-mile relay race in the record time of 8:46.2. This erased the old record of 9:03.8 set last year by the Myrtle Point Bobcats. Ted Thomson, Kent Sproul and Dave Burt were the first three runners for the Trojans in this race.

In the distance medley race, the Trojans fell behind by more than one-half lap going into the final mile, but Thomson again came through, this time with a 4:28.2 mile run, to edge the Stayton team in the final 100 yards of the race. Brother Ted, Jack McLennan and Gary Strom were the other Douglas runners in this race. They finished in the time of 11:21.3 for the two and one-half mile grind.

Second places for the Trojans came in the javelin throw, where Terry Counts threw the spear 180-1 to smash the record set last year by Wayne Christian of Eagle Point of 175-2. Count's throw was still only good for the runner-up spot, as Dan Slanaker of Illinois Valley had a throw of 183-1 for first. Four of the five places in the javelin broke last year's record.

**Miss First**

It was Thomson again who almost nabbed a first for Douglas, but the Trojans winning heat time of 1:40.3 was only good for second place in the sprint medley. Thomson took the baton 50 yards from the front and traveled the final 40 yards of the race in the time of :47.8, but a time of 1:39.4 by Reynolds nabbed first place in the final heat run.

Other points picked up by the Trojans came in the shuttle hurdles but it could have been even more. Counts tripped over his fourth hurdle while running in the No. 2 spot in an almost fatal miscue. In the 440-yard relay, they tied for fifth place.

Other county teams didn't fare quite so well, but Reedsport finished with a total of 10 points and ninth place, while Sutherlin failed to nab a point.

The Reedsport points came on a third-place finish in the 440-yard relay and a fourth place in the shuttle hurdles.

**Braves, Yanks Selected For Series By Writers**

NEW YORK — The nation's sportswriters and broadcasters Saturday decided that the 1958 World Series will be between the Milwaukee Braves and the New York Yankees.

Of the 157 votes received in the annual Associated Press poll, 133 writers and broadcasters thought Milwaukee would win the National League pennant and 128 thought the Yanks would repeat in the American League.

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
