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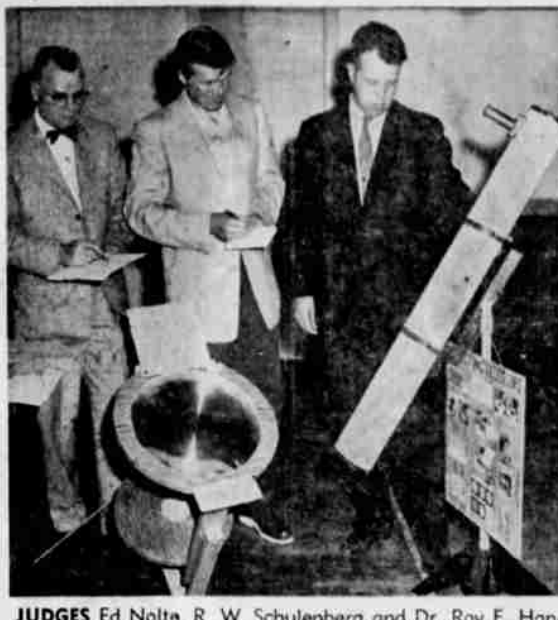
University Of Oregon Building Dedicated

19 Exhibits Judged Eligible For Northwest Exposition

The county's first science fair at Roseburg High School over the weekend proved that the county's youngsters have no dearth of interest in science.

A total 188 entries were registered for exhibition in the school's auditorium. Nineteen of these entries were selected for judging in the sixth annual Oregon Museum of Science and Industry's Northwest Exposition in Corvallis, starting April 20.

The county fair exhibits ranged from such pre-historic displays as the tragedy of the California tar pits to a glimpse into the future in the form of a solar furnace. The exhibits were judged by a three man team for creative ability, scientific thought, thoroughness, technical skill, clarity and dramatic value.

Many Sciences Covered

Areas covered were physical sciences, physiological sciences (astronomy, geology, geography) and biological sciences in the senior and junior divisions (grades seven through 12) and physical and biological sciences in the intermediate and elementary divisions (grades one through six).

SHERMAN, Tex. — House Speaker Sam Rayburn, 76, has given formal notice he'll run for a 24th term in Congress.

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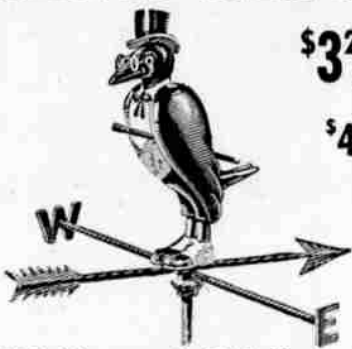
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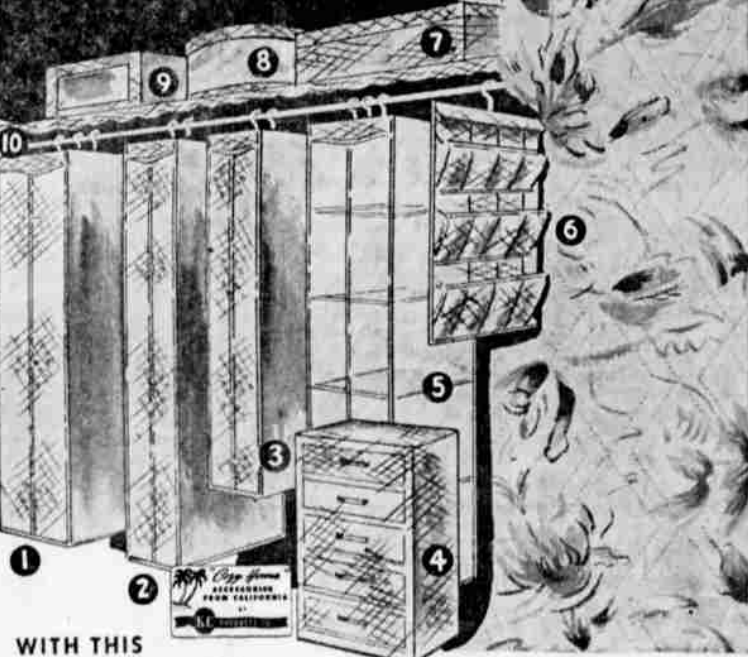
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
