Glide Student Body Begins Ground Beautification Work

Beautification of the slope in front of the Glide High School started this month.

It is one of the student body projects planned and organized by the student council. The slope leads down from the North Umpqua

Highway. The slope here is being planted with hypericum, a low, flowering shrub which stays green all winter.

The classes had various tasks. For example, freshmen and sophomore girls planted vines and juniors obtained the sawdust and maintained traffic control on the highway during the operation.

The planting of the arboretum on the northern part of the high school grounds was the responsibility of the senior class. Different species of trees were furnished by Ernest McDonald of the U. S. Forest Service. He also supervised the planting of the trees. Nine different species have been planted and more will be added, reports correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby.

Eventually, the arboretum will include every type of shrub and tree that will grow in this locality. Graveled walks will also be laid out.

Principal Ray Talbert lauded the arboretum activity as one which will prove an excellent educational program for all school students.

British Labor Party Piles Up More Gains

LONDON (AP)—The British Labor party piled up more sweeping gains today in county council elections, underlining what Labor leaders described as the declining popularity of Prime Minister Macmillan's ruling Conservatives.

The Laborites, who claim the results indicate the way Britons will vote at the next general election, regained control of Essex, one of five counties which the Conservatives captured from them three years ago.

The swing to the Laborites confirms the trend shown in special parliamentary elections during the last year, during which the Conservative government has been heavily criticized for the Suez intervention, rising living costs and the controversial rent act.

Pen Pal Program Aids Understanding

Roseburg High students are doing their share to promote better understanding between the United States and other countries through a "pen pal" program.

Mrs. Edna Lorraine, high school teacher in charge of the activity, says an estimated 120 students at Roseburg have written to foreign students this year.

Letters have been exchanged with Japan, Switzerland, France, Germany, Australia and New Zealand.

"Japanese students have written the largest number of letters to us," says Mrs. Lorraine. She reports the letters are very precise, contain good English and are done in excellent penmanship.

No letters have been received from behind the Iron Curtain.

Drain's March Boy And Girl Selected

Marjorie Bowker Gains Nomination

Marjorie Bowker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Morris C. Bowker of 1367 SE Main St., Roseburg, has been selected as the local nominee for a \$500 college scholarship from Consolidated Freightways Inc.

She will next compete for one of 18 "Highway to Learning" teaching scholarships offered by the company in cities of less than 75,000 population which have C-F terminals. Doubt Expressed Many JCs To Be Started In State

CORVALLIS (AP)—It is doubtful whether many junior colleges will be organized in Oregon under the law permitting communities to establish the two-year schools. E. B. Lemon, dean of administration at Oregon State College, said here Friday.

Although it is a "first class law," he said, the cost is a deterrent to communities. He explained that most communities in the state without institutions of higher learning are small in population. When the taxpayers start figuring the costs, he said, they decide they are paying all they want toward education.

Lemon said three committees were working on plans for OSC, to be able to meet expected increases in enrollment. He predicted that the next 10 years would see the college's staff of about 1,300 doubled.

Math Tournament Presents Teasers Of Big Proportions

CHICAGO (AP)—Students in 77 Chicago area high schools were in training Saturday for the math tournament at Northwestern University with such brain teasers as this:

"Find a single counterfeit (light) coin among 80 of the same denomination in just four weighings on a balance scale."

The problem, one used in a Russian math contest, is one of the warmup assignments given to 568 students registered in the battle of brains, to be held April 26 in Northwestern's Technological Institute.

Incidentally, if the brain teaser example has bothered you, here is a hint to help in solving it, provided for student contestants: A similar problem, using only eight coins, can be worked out in two weighings.

(No further help is given the students. But to find the light coin among eight, balance three against three on the scale, holding out the other two. Either the scales will balance, leaving it a simple matter of balancing the two unweighed coins, or, if the scale does not balance, then one of the three on the lighter side is the counterfeit. So, balance two of those. If their weights match, you are holding the counterfeit. And, of course, if one coin on the scales is lighter than the other, that one is counterfeit.)

(The sponsors gave this additional tip for those still sweating over the answer. The number held out on the first weighing is between 20 and 30.)

Earl, Libel Suit Loser, Undecided On Other Actions

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland City Commissioner Stanley Earl returns to his job Monday after spending most of last week at Coquille where he failed in his quarter-million-dollar libel suit.

He declined to talk about the case or say what new action, if any, would be taken in connection with similar libel suits he has pending against the Seattle Post-Intelligencer and the Oregon Teamsters' newspaper. Earl also has a libel suit pending against The Oregon Journal, but it has a different basis.

He contended in his suit against the Coos Bay Times, now the World, that his reputation was damaged by two articles which appeared in the newspaper. The articles, written by columnist Drew Pearson, said Earl was linked to the activities of Portland gambler Big Jim Elkins.

The suit against The Oregon Journal stems from publication of material in another court action. After the jury at Coquille brought in its verdict Saturday, holding 11-1 that Earl was not entitled to damages, the foreman, Gordon K. Brown, said a letter written by Earl in behalf of a pardon for Elkins was the biggest single factor in the verdict.
