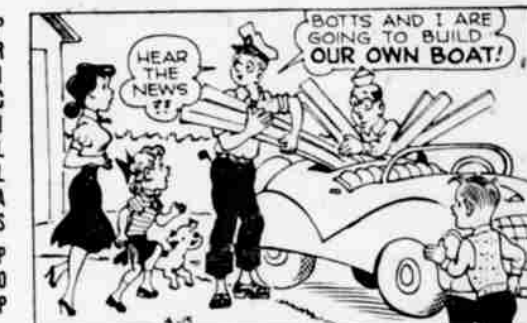
A fund-raising auction followed the business meeting. Mrs. Rattensperger and Mrs. Dick Frey acted as auctioneers.
