

2 Condemned Men Get Life Sentences On Second Trial

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Joseph Grillo and Silvio De Vita may have to spend the rest of their lives in prison — but they have been given the rest of their lives to spend.

The pair was sentenced to life imprisonment late last night at the end of their second trial for the murder of a policeman.

Thus ended six years of appeals, legal maneuvers and fencing with death. They had originally been sentenced to die for the fatal shooting of special policeman James Law.

A jury of 10 men and two women deliberated for 7 hours and 40 minutes before returning to a

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Porter (D-Ore) said here that he would appear Friday night on a four-member panel at a New York meeting arranged by the Greater New York Committee for Sane Nuclear Policy.

Also to speak, he said, are the Rev. John C. Bennett, dean of the factory of Union Theological Seminary; New York City Councilman Stanley Isaacs; Dr. Hugh C. Wolfe, chairman, American Federation of Scientists; and Norman Thomas, long-time Socialist Party candidate for president.

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hushed courtroom and pronouncing both men guilty of murder in the first degree.

The verdict carried a recommendation of life imprisonment at hard labor. Superior Court Judge Gerald T. Foley immediately imposed sentence.

Under state law, the sentence makes both men eligible for parole in 14 years.

Grillo, 28, and De Vita, 26, could theoretically be paroled even before that time, if the six years they have served since their first conviction is applied to the 14-year period.

The two men spent most of the six years in the death house at Trenton State Prison.

The U.S. Court of Appeals finally ordered the retrial last year on the grounds that one of the original jurors had himself been a holdup victim and may have been prejudiced.

Grillo admitted firing the fatal shot. De Vita said he never drew his pistol.

West Germany Invites Soviet First Deputy

MOSCOW (AP) — Western Germany today invited Soviet First Deputy Premier Anastase Mikoyan to visit Bonn next week to sign the new trade and consular agreement between the two countries.

The West German Embassy said Mikoyan, top Soviet expert on foreign trade, had accepted in principle. He will be the highest ranking Soviet official ever to visit the West German government.

Major Gets Reprimand, Fine For Mistreatment

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — An American major who piloted a helicopter carrying a young Korean thief nailed in a box has been reprimanded and fined \$200, half a month's pay.

Maj. Thomas G. James of Plymouth, Pa., got the maximum penalty under Article 15 of the Military Code which he chose to accept rather than risk trial by a general court-martial. If convicted by the court, he could have gotten up to three years and nine months in prison, loss of all pay and allowances while imprisoned and dismissal from the Army.

James already has been relieved of his post as commander of the aircraft maintenance center where 14-year-old Kim Choon Il was roughed up Feb. 25.

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — Five "dangerous and armed" prisoners broke from the Summit County jail Wednesday. One was shot and killed and another surrendered a few blocks away.

Dashing hot coffee in the face of a jailer, the five took two pistols and a riot gun from the jail, said Capt. Charles Capron of the sheriff's office.

Virgil Akers, 21, of Akron, was shot down by Sgt. Nick Van Doros of the Akron Police Department. Akers and George Huff, 23, Reseda, Calif., fled from the jail in a car stolen from the county garage across the street. The three others fled in another stolen car.
