County Land Office Duties Explained To Yoncalla Lions

At the recent meeting of the Yoncalla Lion's Club, Bob Kischel of Douglas County Land Office was guest speaker. He outlined the duties of his office and answered questions following his speech. He stated Douglas County at one time owned 150,000 acres. Today, the county has only 4,800 acres, in-

cluding parks, real estate and sub-marginal land acquired by tax foreclosure. He said the bulk of the 150,000 acres was timberland that was sold at low prices partly due to inaccurate cruising methods used at that time. Duties of his office concern the lease and sale of county land, granting of right of ways for lumber operators, exchange of lands, contracting for fire protection of county land, containing timber, leasing mineral rights, acquiring land for garbage dumps and maintaining three county cemeteries. The land office was instrumental in picking out the Elkton site for State Tree Nursery, and helps the County Park Department find land for development, according to correspondent Mrs. George Edes.
