Fricano was twirling along in a scoreless pitching duel with Spokane's Dick Hanlin in the second game of a twin bill at Seattle when Baxes, the first man up in the seventh inning, clubbed one of Fricano's offerings out of the park.

The blow gave the Indians a 1-0 victory and a split in the bargain bill. Seattle won the opener 3-2.

PORTLAND — Two players were clipped from the Portland Beavers' roster Wednesday, Manager Tommy Heath announced.

Plays Under Protest

Vancouver played the game under protest from the seventh inning on. Manager Charlie Metro protested a decision by Umpire Pat Orr under which Salt Lake's second run scored. Carlos Bernier's line drive, which bounced off pitcher Joe Hatten's glove and into the glove of shortstop Buddie Peterson, set up the disputed play.

Peterson fired the ball to first, presumably getting Willie Melendez, who had scooted around to home on the play.

Orr, however, ruled it was not a double play. He called Bernier out but Melendez safe, with the run to count. It was Melendez' run that eventually sent the contest into overtime.

Johnny Podres Fans 11 To Give Dodgers Victory

SAN FRANCISCO — San Francisco's Giants and Los Angeles play the deciding game of their first Pacific Coast series today. Johnny Podres squared accounts for the Dodgers 13-1 last night.

"I've never seen Podres pitch that well against us," Giants Manager Bill Rigney said.

Podres, who won two World Series games from the New York Yankees in 1955, set a personal strikeout mark, fanning 11 Giants. His previous best was 10 Chicago Cubs in 1953.

The left-hander allowed the Giants just five singles.

Rookie third baseman Dick Gray and veteran outfielder Duke Snider sent the Dodgers winging with two-run homers in the only National League game scheduled.

Goos 400 Feet

Duke's traveled more than 400 feet and completely over the right field bleachers. He connected in the third inning on a low change-up pitch from Giants starter Ramon Monzon, who also served up the ball that Gray put into the left field bleachers in the second inning.

For today, Manager Walt Alston of the Dodgers named right-hander Don Newcombe while Rigney goes with his best left-hander, Johnny Antonelli.

"Monzon didn't have his fast ball working at all and we didn't get too much help from the relief hurlers," Rigney said after Paul Giel, Jim Constance, Ray Crone and Stu Miller all had shots at the Dodgers; Giel was charged with

six runs and Crone three as Los Angeles batters collected 15 hits.

A pitch beamed Dodger center fielder Gino Cimoli, but the ball hit the protective helmet and although Cimoli left the game, he wasn't badly hurt and was named to play today.

The Detroit Tigers, long frustrated in American League pennant races by stumbling starts, had the makings of a souped-up getaway today — thanks to one trade they made and another that they didn't make.

It was Frank Bolling, the second baseman Cleveland wanted but didn't get, who wrapped up a 5-4 victory over the Chicago White Sox yesterday. With two out in the ninth, he hit a 3-2 pitch for a three-run homer.

A trade with Kansas City provided the payoff in Tuesday's 4-3 opening day victory at Chicago with Billy Martin, the big man in the big deal, getting the single that clinched it.

Cleveland Walloped

Kansas City held a share of first place with Detroit after wallowing Cleveland 9-4. Bob Cerv drove in five runs with two doubles and a homer.

Boston finally won one, defeating the New York Yankee's 3-1 on a two-run homer by Jackie Jensen and Dave Sisler's seven-hit pitching in the only other AL game scheduled.

The Tigers hadn't won their first two since 1950 — and that was the year they finished second.

Bolling, a 28-year-old Alabamian whose brother also is on the club, followed up his 2-for-4 day in the opener with 4-for-5 yesterday. He lined three consecutive singles off Dick Donovan before tagging the big right-hander for the home run.

The "powerless" White Sox had two home runs — Bubba Phillips' first and Sherm Lollars' second of the season — among 19 hits off six Tiger pitchers. Tom Morvan started, but George Spencer, No. 5, was the winner.

Hits Homer

Cerv built his two-day RBI total to seven with his first homer, a two-run shot in the ninth off Dick Tomanek, last of half a dozen Cleveland hurlers. Ray Narleski failed to finish the first, when the A's scored five. Ralph Terry struck out seven but needed relief in the ninth.

The Red Sox, who lost their first two, got rolling with Jensen's second homer in the first inning against Tom Sturdivant. Sisler, 6-2 lifetime against New York, then blanked the Yanks until Hank Bauer and Gil McDougald doubled in the fifth.

HAWKINS A JUNIOR NOW

SOUTH BEND, Ind. — Notre Dame basketball star Tom Hawkins, who set an Irish record of 576 points as a sophomore last season, is even better this season, says Coach John Jordan. Hawkins, a 6-foot-5 jumping jack, last year was called by Jordan "the best sophomore in Notre Dame basketball history."

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
